- 3. Addition to Clause 5 of the Constitution "Additional committee members may be co-opted by decision of the committee" Moved Mrs Gordon, seconded Mrs Macdonald, Carried.
- 4. Additional Clause to Constitution. There was constructive discussion of the clause (well guided by Keith Burnham as the Society's new President), the object being to improve the Society's Collection both on show and in reserve, and to be fair to past and future donors. Moved Mrs Davies, seconded Mr Boyle that Clause 35 read: "The Committee be empowered to sell, return or exchange with a similar institution, those artifacts in the Society's possession deemed to be on no local or Australian historical significance. The Committee shall present a recommendation regarding disposal of artifacts first to the donor(s) if known, and then to a General Meeting, together with a valuation in order that the method of disposal can be resolved." Carried.

## MUSEUM NEWS from Keith Burnham

Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences has advised that it plans to close the Albury Museum and withdraw the exhibits by 28th February 1983.

The N S W Division of Cultural Activities has provided a grant of \$6500 to the Society towards half of the salary of the Museum Director (\$5000) and \$1500 towards the conservation and reproduction of photographs and display storage equipment.

The Deputy Town Clerk has advised that Council's Art, Education and Cultural Activities Sub-Committee will consider the subject of Council's matching the State Government's grant for the continued part-time employment of the Museum Director and the future of the Turk's Head building at its meeting on 7 February to be followed by full Council consideration on 21 February 1983.

## DONATIONS from Mr C C Hazelwood for which the Society thanks him.

\* Nearly <u>500 slides</u> in 2 drawer boxes together with the index. These slides include copies of old photographs, many of Urangeline Station and the district and well as of Albury, some dating back to the 19th century. There are slides taken by Mr & Mrs Hazelwood of buildings, of artefacts and of historic occasions, and in particular of the Water Wheel saga - when the Wheel was found at Tallandoon, shifted and set up in Australia Park, Albury in 1968. These slides are a most important acquisition for which the Society is most grateful to Mr Hazelwood.

\* <u>Sale Catalogue</u> Subdivisional Sale on the famous Brookong Station, Lockhart NSW, Thursday 17th February 1910, 11,800 acres. This fascinating illustrated booklet describes not only the Brookong Estate and the farms for sale but also the town of Lockhart - schools, public buildings and railway - as well as "Typical District Holdings". It shows clearly what a prospective buyer would be looking for in 1910.

\* <u>A Scrapbook compiled by Mrs M L Hazelwood in 1963/4 about Albury's Concert Hall</u> now known as the Civic Theatre.

\* An Album of photographs.

\* Archival material, already acknowledged, which Mr Hazelwood has been storing.

\* Tobacco Pouch, sterling silver, hallmarked Chester 1907, engraved H.H. It is oval, rounded and with a hinged well fitting lid. It was brought by Mr G R Jackson from England in 1914 as a present to his manager, H. Hazelwood. It was used by his son, Claud Hazelwood, to carry a damp sponge and is much battered with use.

\* <u>Glove box</u> (prices inside), 2 leather rolls containing manicure sets, collection of 4 belt and 3 shoe buckles, a hair slide & a piece of braid, 2 "sweat absorbers and size adjusters" for Fayrefield hats (unused!).

MICROFILM Family historians and amateur genealogists have received a new fund of information with the release to the public of a microfilmed list of all

births, deaths and marriages recorded in N S W before 1900. Philip Geeves, the historian, welcomed this new research tool, saying it represented the crowning achievement of intensive lobbying by the Society of Australian Genealogists. People who find an ancestor in the index will be able to obtain any certificates they want from the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages of N S W at a lower cost than usual because his staff will know the details without a search.

A member of our Society has given \$150 to buy a copy of this list which Mrs Anne Halloway has ordered for use in the Local History Room. She expects it to be in the Albury Library in February. The Society is most grateful to the anonymous donor and to Mrs Holloway for her co-operation.



## MUSEUM REPORT from Keith Burnham

Albury City Council has taken some significant decisions, such as:

- \* Approval of a \$5000 grant towards the salary of the part-time Museum Director.
- \* Transfer of the whole Turks Head building to Albury & District Historical Society.
- \* Setting aside of funds for redecoration and renovation.
- \* Transfer of the Caretaker's Cottage to the Society at a rent of \$15 a week.

The Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences has moved out taking some exhibits but leaving those of local interest. Useful showcases have been left behind or given to the Pioneer Museum at Jindera. Renovating and reorganising a Museum takes time, but it is hoped to open the renewed Museum within 6 months. Meanwhile, the old Folk Museum will ain open at least until the end of April.

The Museum Sub-Committee comprises Mr Keith Burnham, Mrs Lois Humphreys, Mrs Jo Gordon, Mr John Alker-Jones, Mr Rob Simmons and Mr Robert Cohen with the possible addition of a local historian.

"ALBURY AND DISTRICT MUSEUM" was the name chosen by members at the June 1982 Society Meeting when the proposed museum was to be at the Railway Institute. The Museum Sub-Committee suggests that as the museum is now to be at the Turks Head, members may wish to re-consider; recommendations for discussion at the March meeting are TURKS HEAD MUSEUM, Albury and ALBURY REGIONAL MUSEUM.

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February Meeting Mr Richard Wesley, the Executive Director of the Museums Association of Australia, N S W Branch, presented some fascinating slides of

Mr Wesley said that the museum should be a focal point, telling the story of Albury, explaining why it was developed and be a community resource. Some museums had obviously been able to draw on quite large funds to set up the various displays, while others had created pleasing, worthwhile results through dedicated members' hard work and very little capital. # THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES

Prince Charles and the Princess of Wales are due to arrive at Albury Airport at 6 pm on Tuesday 22nd March. They will be staying at Woomargama until 17th April between their official engagements. They will be flying in and out of Albury several times but the best time to see and greet them is likely to be on their first arrival. They will be met by the Mayor and Mayoress of Albury and Mr Harold Mair and his daughter, and then walk to their car talking to us for about 15 minutes on the way. The closed car will then be driven along Borella Road and north through North Albury and Princess could be on Easter Sunday after Church when they may walk in the Civic Square of Albury.

## Professor Ernest G Moll.

Professor Moll was born in Murtoa, Victoria in 1900. Later his family moved to Gerogery, where he attended school at Gerogery West. As a young man he travelled and studied in the United States, obtaining his B.A. degree at Lawrence College, Wisconsin and his M.A. degree at Harvard University. In 1928 he was appointed Professor of English at the University of Oregon.

He has had many books of verse published, including <u>Sedge fire</u> (1927), <u>Native moments</u> (1931), <u>Cut from mulga</u> (1940) and <u>Brief waters</u> (1947). His poems have been published in a number of anthologies of Australian poetry and he has also written a work of poetic criticism as well as an autobiography (<u>Below these hills</u>). His poetry is held in high esteem by many, including his fellow poets. Vance Palmer, reviewing "The Waterhole" remarked that "Long residence in America has only deepened his love for his own country and sharpened his sense of its character."

The Upper Murray Regional Library has built up a good collection of Professor Moll's works (thanks, in large part, to the generosity of Mr H Stelling and Professor Moll himself).

Professor Moll and his work will be the subject of an evening to be held at the Albury City Library on Wednesday 13th April at 8 pm. Mr Horace Stelling will be talking with Cliff Chamberlain about his boyhood memories of E.M. and family and a local poet will discuss his poetry.



## A BRIEF GLIMPSE AT THE TURKS HEAD BUILDING

The Turks Head building seems to have been built as a private residence. It was originally of red brick with a timber shingle roof and a timber fence between the posts of the front verandah to keep roaming stock out.

Versions of its earlier history differ but it became known as the Turks Head Inn.

The Turks Head became the Travellers Rest in the 1870s under Mr Luke Gulson, licensee. During the building of the (1861) Union Bridge business had boomed and Mr Gulson catered for weary travellers.

The hotel became the Union Bridge Hotel and licensees came and went - William Green, J Oddie, Alex McDonald and the Fraunfelders.

Joseph Fraunfelder in 1895 renamed the Inn the Turks Head and welcomed visitors to Albury by supplying "home cooked meals" and "comfortable private rooms" for a short spell. Albury Ale was the favourite brew, rum having become too expensive. Elizabeth Fraunfelder, Joseph's widow, kept the licence in 1897 but the authorities frowned on a woman on her own keeping an Hotel.

Mr Parker became licensee and later Mr Joseph Hogan in 1899. With free trade between N S W and Victoria, there was a decline in patrons and the coaches and customers moved into the town centre. Mr Hogan failed to renew his licence in 1900.

As a private residence, the Turks Head also served as a small shop and a boarding house.

Albury City Council acquired the building in 1950 as part of the river frontage between Union Bridge and Noreuil Park.

The Turks Head, from 1960

In 1960 the then Mayor of Albury, Alderman C E Bunton, called a general public meeting to form the Albury and District Historical Society. In the following year the Society was looking for a suitable place to house an Historical Museum. The Turks Head Hotel seemed to be the ideal place. However it was discovered that the Albury City Council were going to bulldoze this historic building. The members of the Society were VERY much against this. Some of its members arrived at the Turks Head the morning when they knew the bulldozers were to go into action, and contacted the City Engineer, Mr J Sarvaas. They pointed out to him the value of the building from a historical angle. He then took this up with the Council, and so the Turks Head was saved from demolition.

The Society felt certain they would be allotted the whole building for a Museum. However, after a lot of discussion, this was not to be. The Applied Arts and Sciences Museum, which had been in recess in Albury from the mid 1940s was also looking for a building. As they were a Government concern they were given the Turks Head, except for the two very small rooms on the south which were allotted to the Society, by the Council.

Now the Applied Arts and Sciences Museum is again closing down in Albury, so at long last the Council have given the whole of the Turks Head to the Historical Society for a Museum.

Committee recommendation for the establishment of a Board of Trustees for the <u>ALBURY REGIONAL MUSEUM</u>

The development of the Society's Museum has been continued for about twenty years. Many hours of time and effort have been given by committee members towards the administration of the Museum and, more recently, its Director. This has of course been given gladly for the preservation of our artifacts and the fitting out of the museum. The committee feels that as the museum grows it will not be able to do justice to the requirements of such an undertaking or to provide the management resources needed. Because all our members have limited time, and enthusiasm will vary, it is felt that a management body, such as a Board of Trustees, will provide the continuity, objectivity and stability needed for any historic museum.

As was noted at the Society's last monthly meeting, the Albury City Council is prepared to consider the creation of a board of trustees to administer the museum. The committee believes that the society should consider this too, act to take advantage of all the efforts made so far and allow the museum to expand into a major regional resource.



HERITAGE WEEK last month included some most interesting talks and tours:

Mount Prior The occupants of 82 cars took advantage of Dr John Catchlove's offer to oper his historic homestead, Mount Prior, for Heritage Week. Groups were taken through the house and given information about the more notable pieces of furniture and artefacts. The house has been renovated and decorated to provide a suitable backdrop for a magnifice collection of antiques. Many of the visitors continued on to the Mount Prior cellars for tasting and buying. These cellars have a new sales and tasting room above the old cellars.

## Walking Tour of Central Albury

About one hundred people followed Cliff "The Pied Piper" Chamberlain (and were very lucky they did not finish up as drowned rats), as he led a two hour walk around one of the main commercial blocks of Central Albury on Sunday morning, April 10.

The journey started from the steps of the Civic Theatre when photos were passed around to give the image of some of the area to be covered. Cliff told stories of T H Mate, Jockey Jack, Johnny McEachern and Midnight Osborne and his horse.

During the tour Mr Horace Stelling mentioned the trial of miners from Broken Hill, which was conducted at the Albury Court House, when the jury was locked up for two weeks, one of the jurymen being Mr Stelling's father.

At the Post Office corner the story was told of John Roper who built the Globe Hotel in 1860. He was a member of Leichardt's expedition of 1844, Albury's first Clerk of petty sessions and a member of the first council.

The Rose Hotel in Kiewa Street (where Target car park is now) was run by John Nicholls known as "John the Cashman", who kept a bucket under the bar to receive the takings. When the telegraph line was constructed between Melbourne and Sydney no provision was made for it to serve Albury, and John Nicholls offered an office in the hotel building and whatever furniture was required if the cost of bringing the lines into town could be arranged. No doubt the hotel trade would have improved as a result of people doing business with the telegraph office.

At the corner of Olive and Smollett streets some of the history of the Catholic Church building revealed the story of Rev. Michael McAlroy, who has a reputation as a great builder, having been an architect, and acting as clerk of works on buildings at Yass, Goulburn, and in Albury where he built the Convent of Mercy, a primary school building for girls, an infants school, and St Patrick's Church which was opened in 1872. HERITAGE WEEK (continued) The Pied Piper's Walk

In Olive Street, on the corner of the lane where the supermarket now stands, there was a biscuit factory, which was later taken over by Wilkinsons, printers. Diagonally opposite was the private hospital, run at one time by the Misses Walsh, and at the south west corner of Dean Street was Ryan's Hotel.

Many thanks are due to Cliff Chamberlain for the time, and research which went into preparing a delightful morning's journey into the past. Helen Livsey.

<u>Wooragee historian Alan French</u> gave the Society a most excellent dissertation on his district. Geology, archaeology and history were all combined to illuminate the Wooragee valley and its people. Slides showed the lie of the land, old homes and sites (i.e. garden flowers in a paddock), school and family photographs, Chinese walling and the rough land left hummocky when it had been turned over for gold.

Two buses provided by Wodonga Council carried 92 people on Saturday to see the actual sites. What did we see? \* The old stone hut probably built by William Bowman who was the first settler in 1839. \* David Reid's homestead site and Reid's Creek goldfield near Woolshed Falls. \* Star Lane, but no Star Hotel as it has been taken stone by stone to Tooma. \* Magpie Creek where 3000 Chinese walked in single file the eight miles from Beechworth each day to minegold. \* The dam where the dredge was. \* The brick first school. \* The avenue of pin oaks. \* The church the tree fell on. It wa a most successful tour and the portable microphone enabled everyone to hear.

Alan's advice is "Keep recording, today becomes history very quickly".

Professor Ernest Moll - his life and work.

The library staff made visitors welcome at this Wednesday in Heritage Week. Cliff Chamberlain told of the Professor's early life on the land, first in Victoria and than at Gerogery. Horace Stelling and the Moll family contributed anecdotes. Merrick Webb assessed his poetry with insight and enthusiasm and read four poems. Though Professor Moll has lived most of his life in America, it has been to Australia that he has returned for visits and for much of the inspiration for his poems. The library has a good selection of his publications. Anne Holloway concluded the evening with a reminder that our Heritage was not only in buildings and landscape but also in people and their achievements.

#### River Bank Walks Sunday April 17th.

The last activity to celebrate Heritage Week for 1983 was in the form of a riverbank walk. Over eighty people, including several family groups, took advantage of the pleasant autumn sunshine to wander along the banks of the Murray River. The walks, lasting about an hour, were led by Historical Society members, who re-traced the early events and happenings since the explorers Hume and Hovell carved their names in the bark of two majestic river gums in 1824.

Robert Brown's slab hut, the Chinese market gardens and the Customs House are long gone but people were able to learn some of the early history of the river-bank and the township that developed not far away, beyond the reaches of the capricious floodwaters.

It was interesting to note that several people who came on the walks in 1982, came again.

The Newth Reunion James Newth (1823 to 1891) was born at Dursley, Gloucestershire, England, and his wife Catherine, nee Mathieson (1836 to 1888) on

the Isle of Skye, Scotland. After migrating to Australia, they were married at St John's Church of England, in Melbourne, in 1854, and settled in Tarrawingee, purchasing the land at the second land sale held in this part of the colony, at Beechworth. Later they bought land at Boggy Creek, and at Oxley Flats, and also at Tea Garden Creek, now known as Markwood. They had 5 children. The eldest Mary Anne, became Mrs Simmonds. They had a family of 12, and lived in the Tarrawingee-Peechelbar area, later moving to Albury. Christina Mary married James Smith. They had 5 children, and farmed at Oxley Flats, and later at Bonegilla. James Newth lived mostly in the Whorouly district. They had 10 children. Thomas lived in the Milawa area, and had 8 children. William moved to Yenda, in N.S.W. They had 5 children. (There are 639 known descendants.)

The descendants of James and Catherine Newth will be holding a Reunion at Tarrawingee Hall and grounds on 14th and 15th May. A church service will be held at St Paul's Church of England, Milawa at 11 a.m. on Sunday 15th May 1983, when Canon M.C.Newth, O.B.E.B.A., Th.L., F.A.C.E. will officiate. Canon Newth was Headmaster of St Andrews Cathedral School in Sydney for 38 years, and retired in 1979. Invitations have been issued to members of the Newth/Nuth Family History Society of England, (whose editor and secretary live at 27 Charville Lane, Hoys, Middlesex, England.)

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

## MAY MEETING

The "Bring and Tell" evening was made interesting by members' anecdotes and artefacts: from Mrs Odewan, programmes of cultural activities held in Albury during the 1920's and 30's including many familiar names in the Choral Society, and a farewell tour of Dame Nellie Melba in 1927: from Mrs Thurling a collection of local postcards from 1907 on. including some from Albury - same day delivery was expected. and afternoon appointments were made !; from Mrs Macdonald, part of a companionway from a sunken sailing ship in Bougainville Harbour; from Doug Royal, an aboriginal artefact from Queensland; from Holford Lempriere, a book of Natural History dated 1846 and bearing the signature of Mr Lempriere's great grandfather: from Marie Aney a report on Oral History lectures at the Continuing Education Centre: from Helen Livesey - using the microfiche in the library; and from Lois Humphreys (reflecting the influence of her Egyptian trip) an exposition of her new perspective of historical time using 100 people aged 50 to go back 5000 years instead of getting bogged down with generations!

# HISTORIC HOMESTEAD, Rochester

The historic home, "Random House", Bridge Road, Rochester is now open to the public. The 5D sq. house dates from 1868 and is typical of northern Victorian and Riverina homesteads of that period.

The house is open for inspection from Wednesdays to Sundays, 1 pm to 4.30 pm and on public holidays.

## 1. <u>Recording Oral History</u>

Several members of the society attended two lectures on "Recording Oral History" at the Continuing Education Centre. Ms Liz Weaver of the A.B.C. talked about her interviewing techniques and her own research into the depression years of the 1930's. She stressed the need to research background material and to be prepared with specific questions about memorable days eg. The great bushfire, a notable family event. Harry Stevenson, author and publisher with Hawthorne Press found tape recorders often caused people to feel inhibited and preferred to take notes and make tapes himself as soon as possible using his notes. He also carried a polaroid camera to copy treasured photos on the spot. He saw oral history as recollections and reminiscences and discussed the often conflicting views within a family, the admissability of material and the problems of copywrite on manuscripts and post 1931 photos. He, like Ms Weaver, also stressed the need for background knowledge and the need to home in on something and concluded with the reminder that the interviewer should never downgrade or ridicule.

## 2. The Microfiche in Upper Regional Library

There are so many people making use of the reader/printer in the archives room of the Library that the staff are now taking bookings for its use.

The recently acquired indexes to the Births, Deaths and Marriages records of N.S.W. prior to 1900 are of great assistance to people interested in researching their family history. The records are on microfiche and are mostly easily readable, although some are handwritten in copperplate style.

The entries are in chronological order. Marriages are indexed under the names of both the bride and groom. Births are listed under the child's name, and gives the Christian names of the parents. Deaths show the name of the deceased and the Christian names only of the deceased's parents. The place where the event took place is not given, nor is the exact date. These details can be obtained by writing to the Registrar and buying a certificate.

Many local historians will be grateful to the anonymous donor of the Robert Hatch Memorial Indexes.

A few of our members attended two evening sessions to learn the methods of tracing our family ancestors and the sources of reference available. It was held at the Continuing Education Centre at Wodonga on April 11 and 18. The instructor was Mr Sean Sloley from Wangaratta. He explained the various ways of making a search - through Shipping Records for assisted immigration 1839 - 1871, unassisted immigration 1852 - 1923/4, Land Offices, Probate and inquest records, education records and school rolls, as well as cemetery records. ## Background to the Sketches

## P.S. "ALBURY"

Owned by Capt. Francis Cadell of the River Murray Navigation Co. First River Steamer to reach Albury 1500 miles from the sea, on October 2nd, 1855 towing the barge "Wakool". "Albury" was prefabricated in Scotland and assembled at Goolwa, South Australia. Capt. George Johnston was in command of P.S. "Albury" most of her long life on the rivers.

#### P.S. "CUMBEROONA"

Built in 1866 at Echuca, Victoria by G Linklater for James T Fallon and Partners. Fallon was Albury's first mayor (1859 - 62).

"Cumberoona" named after the station situated east of Albury on the north bank of the Murray was of 124 tons and powered by a steam engine of 60 H.P. Well known between Albury and Echuca the speedy "Cumberoona" was a popular passenger carrier. She was wrecked on a rocky bar near Wilcannia on the Darling in 1889.



RAIL LINK - an eye-witness' account by Margery Gibson.

<u>Celebrations</u> held to commemorate the Centenary of the Railway link between Albury and Wodonga took place on the holiday weekend 11th, 12th and 13th June last:-

I arrived at the Albury Railway Station at 1.30 pm to hear the strains of the Sydney Railway Band holding forth in a rousing march theme whilst crowds milled up and down examining the displays of historical interest on the brightly coloured decorated platform. The old steam engine on the front of the train which was due to leave at 2.45 pm drew a lot of interest. I managed to obtain a seat in the back carriage and we headed off to the bridge spanning the Murray River, the band supplying music all the way. Our train halted at the approach of the bridge whilst we waited for the Victorian train to come from Wodonga with its own steam engine. Thereupon all passengers alighted & scrambled down the embankment to watch proceedings. Cameras were clicking everywhere. Coloured ribbons were stretched across one end of the bridge & dramatically snapped as the two gleaming engines approached & passed one another. We all clambered aboard to travel to Wodonga where a brief ceremony was held and Mr Crabbe, Minister of Transport (Victoria), addressed the people, then unveiled a plaque on the entrance to the Railway Station. Following this, the trains & passengers travelled to Albury Statio where the speaker and quests mounted a red carpeted dais where Mr Cox, the Minister for the State Rail Authority for NSW, unveiled a plaque which noted that the Albury Station is the longest undercover station in NSW. Members of the Sydney Railway Historical Society travelled down especially for the celebrations.

## "TOWNSEND'S MISTAKE"

(and I think you'll need a map! Edito

Addressing the June meeting of the society on the contentious issue of the State boundary between N.S.W. and Victoria, Holford Lempriere suggested that the Murrumbidgee River and not the Upper Murray should have formed the boundary line.

Mr Lempriere quoted Dr Arthur Andrews in placing the blame squarely at the door of Albury's surveyor, Thomas Scott Townsend, for perpetuating the mistake in carrying out the instructions of the governor-in-council in 1839 to survey the boundary line between the colony of New South Wales and the Port Phillip District. Townsend was ordered to survey the shortest line from Cape Howe in the east to the nearest tributary of the Murray River. This course should have taken him to the headwaters of the Murrumbidgee River near Nimmitabel which is many miles closer to Cape Howe than the Upper Murray.

Townsend chose the latter course.

By 1840, settlement was pushing across the Murray from the south into what became the Riverina. This survey should have taken the boundary down the Murrumbidgee northwest through what was to become the A.C.T. and westward past Gundagi and Wagga, Narrandera and Hay along the line taken by the explorer Sturt, to join up with the Murray near Swan Hill. It would have placed the two capitals of Sydney and Melbourne much closer to equidistant from the border than at present.

The survey was completed about 1842 and the separation of the two into the Colonies of N.S.W. and Victoria was proclaimed early in 1851 - along the line surveyed by Townsend direct to the upper Murray near Corryong. No official comment was made oublic, which signified government assent in Sydney. The proclamation was almost lost sight of in the upheaval caused the same year by the discovery of gold in great quantity The ensuing inrush of population resulted in the numbers of settlers almost doubling in the next decade in N.S.W. But in the new colony of Victoria, the population increase by sixfold. A Customs barrier was placed along the Murray by N.S.W., as well as an embargo on the shipment of gold between the two colonies.

Looking back, it is possible to surmise that no official action resulted from Townsend's "mistake" for at least two reasons - first that Victoria would take much less territory from N.S.W.; and second that Townsend's superior in government office was Major Thomas Mitchell. As a former explorer, Mitchell was himself very careless in his interpretation of his superior's instructions. Moreover, he was intensely jealous of the achievements of Capt. Charles Sturt in his exploration of the river Murrumbidgee.

Thus "a mere clerical error" was perpetuated into an interstate dispute which is still alive to the present time, even after the advent of Federation in 1901.

Just imagine the repercussions, were Wagga and not Albury the leading Border City after 1851, and had Riverina become a part of the territory of Victoria in the developments which followed.

## CAN YOU HELP?

1. Robyn Phillips, 91 Ely Street, Revesby NSW 2212, whose great-great-grandparents were William and Johanna O'Keeffee nee Burke who arrived in Sydney from Cork, Ireland as assisted migrants in August 1839. Sons William, Jeremiah and Daniel were apparently farmers in Albury....in the 1860s.

Mr Tucker has cause to believe that it may have been built to assist in the building of the railway bridge at Albury.

LANKESTER: On January 3, 1938, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Murray, Buckingham st., Albury, JOHN DE'LAPPE, beloved husband of the late Annie Margaret Lankester, and loving father of Alfred Ernest (West Australia), John De'Lappe (W.A.), Maude (Sydney), Reginald Campbell (Albury), Gertrude Mary (Mrs. Murray, Albury), Jessie Frances (Mrs. Nelson, S.A.), Charles Arthur (Ettamogah), William Sydney (Albury). Aged 100 years. At rest.

Border Morning Mail, 4 January 1938: DEATH OF ALBURY'S OLDEST RESIDENT

Mr. John D. Lankester.....Had Passed Century Mark...End Came Very Peacefully....

Albury's oldest resident is dead. He is Mr. John Delappe Lankester, whose death occurred yesterday morning at the age of 100 years.

Mr. Lankester died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. D. Murray, corner Mate and Buckingham Streets, Albury. He was 100 years of age on September 20.

He had been ill for the past month and the effect of the heat wave at Christmas weakened his resistance to such an extent that his condition became gradually worse, and he lapsed into unconsciousness on Saturday. He survived a severe attack of bronchitis last winter without any apparent ill-effects.

Mr. Lankester was born at Litchfield, in Staffordshire, England, and was called Delappe, as his second christian name, in memory of a French ancestor. When Mr. Lankester was aged 11 years, the family came to Australia, the passage in the ship: "Aztec" occupying 143 days. On the occasion of his birthday last year, he recalled incidents of the long sea voyage.

After some three years around Sydney, the family moved to the Patterson River district, but four years later returned to Sydney, where the father opened offices for Dr. Lindeman's wine business.

The young man was a ready student of wine vinting and selling, and in 1868 came to Albury as manager of the Murray Valley Vineyards for the late J.T. Fallon. In those days Albury was composed of a few hundred people, with a small number of shops and homes. After five years Mr. Lankester transferred to the management of "Ettamogah" a vineyard and wine cellars at Ettamogah (near Albury) owned by Harbottle, Allsopp and Biddle.

Simultaneously, the young man laid the foundations of his own property, "Emu Park", also at Ettamogah. He was granted 160 acres of land by the Crown in recognition of having served in the volunteer forces in Sydney, and he increased the area by selection. Four years before coming to Albury, Mr. Lankester had married in Sydney Annie Margaret Campbell, an Australian-born daughter of Scotch parents.

#### Expert on Wine

For 46 years he remained in personal charge of the two properties, and as a wine expert he knew no superior. He was appointed sole judge at the internationally recognised wine exhibition in Adelaide. In 1919 he sold "Emu Park" and bought "Ettamoga handing the latter over to his son and retiring after 46 years. When 82 years of age, he set out to travel the Commonwealth. For about 15 years he kept moving, visiting his sons and daughters and sisters. He travelled to South Australia, West Australia and Queensland, but at the age of 97 settled down finally and had lived since with Mrs. Murray.


It was his custom every afternoon to sip a glass of light dinner wine, but though a vigneron for so many years, he never drank to excess. He smoked a pipe from boyhood, yet at no time had he over-indulged; and he was wont to attribute his long life to moderation in all things.

Mr. Lankester's family numbered 10, but two died in infancy. He is survived by Messrs fred and Delappe (W.A.); Reginald (Thurgoona Street, Albury); Charles (Ettamoga William Lankester (David Street, Albury); Miss Maud Lankester (Sydney); Mrs. D. Murray (corner Mate and Buckingham Streets, Albury); Mrs. T. Nelson (Glenelg, S.A.).

In 1910 Mrs. Lankester died, and now there are 16 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren. Mr. Lankester also left two sisters. They are Mrs. Orr, Claremont, Queenslan and Mrs. Lloyd, Sydney. The former is 87 and the latter 85 years of age.

Burial will take place to-day, the cortege leaving St. Matthew's Church at 3 p.m. for the Albury Cemetery. Lester and Sons have charge of the arrangements.

PROFESSOR MANNING CLARK

Public Lecture

## Supper

Manning Clark was Professor of Australian History at the Australian National University from 1949 to 1975, and is now Emeritus Professor. His writings include: A History of Australia, Vols I - V; Select Documents of Australian History; Settlers and Convicts; Sources of Australian History; Earliest Times to the Age of Macquarie; A Short History of Australia.

Angus and Robertson who have helped sponsor Manning Clark's visit will have books on sale at the meeting which will be autographed by the author.

<u>July Meeting</u> Alderman Paterson and Deputy City Engineer, Mr Brian McLellan, spoke to the Meeting on the removal of street trees from Hume Street and Wodonga Place. As costs for an alternative route for the Hume Highway along Nurigong Street were prohibitive, Council had recalled the firm, Treemasters, to report on the condition f trees in Hume Street and Wodonga Place.

In Hume Street, there were seventy mature trees of which eighteen required immediate removal and sixteen would need removal in six to fifteen years. The remainder could last from forty to sixty years.

However, it was pointed out that whether the Hume Highway By-Pass was built by the Bi-Centenary or before, the projected amount of local traffic along Hume Street indicated that the street would need reconstruction within five years.

Reconstruction also involved moving of underground services such as water and sewerage pipes, electricity and telephone cables. Inevitably the root systems of the trees, which are not on a nature strip, would be damaged.

It was Council's view therefore, that the present trees should be removed and advanced trees be set aside now for planting along a nature strip when reconstruction of the highway has been completed.

A Visit to the Museum As the National Library was unable to provide the film, it was decided that members would adjourn to the Turk's Head to view renovations and proposals for the museum.

## A Visit to the Museum (continued)

The Turk's Head is now bright and fresh inside and out. Our previous small portion looks very happy, with new floor boards making all floors level. (It becomes harder to remember the gaps in the plaster and the flaking, mouldy paint!) This area now becomes the storage/workshop for the museum. It is good to have three doors to the museum - some of us used to get claustrophobia in our little area with its barred windows and one door.

As members progressed from room to room noting what displays were to be shown, with a little imagination it became evident what a fine museum we shall soon have!

Museum Report The Museum Director has now moved from her office in the Council Chambers to the Albury Regional Museum at the Turk's Head, Wodonga Place, Albury. Telephone number is 21 4550. Hours of work: Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday, 9 am to 4 pm.

Museum Attendant, Mrs Michele Bush, and her husband move into the cottage at the rear of the museum on 5th August. Mrs Bush will assist the Director in the setting up of exhibits.

The Museum Sub-Committee met three times this month, on July 6th, 18th and 25th, reflecting the amount of work required in order to ensure that the museum opens in September. In addition, several members spent two Saturday afternoons at the museum organising the storage area.

Orders have been placed for the enlargement of fifty seven photographs, and texts for the displays are being reviewed. The counter for the foyer is being built by London Craft Joinery for Albury City Council, and will be delivered shortly. Ervin Timber Supplies has donated all the wooden display panels.

The Society has requested Council to provide carpet in two stages, with the front rooms carpeted first, in time for the official opening which will be undertaken by the Premier of N.S.W. in the new year. Aldermen have been invited to view the progress made to date.

40,000 Years of Technology The photographs and video display in Myers proved to be of great interest to the public.

The photographs depicted the inventions of the Aboriginal people in assisting their hunting and fishing, as well as their inventions assisting the industrial society.

The display came from the Australian Institute for Aboriginal Studies in Canberra.

Presentation of Photographs On 18th July, President Keith Burnham, accepted on behalf of the Society twelve large, mounted photographs of historic Albury from the management of Myers.

Myers had used the. photographs from the Society's Archives for display in their restaurant, and had copies enlarged and mounted for us in return.

BONEGILLA The Albury-Wodonga Ethnic Council is seeking the Society's support to establish a commemorative site at the former Bonegilla Migrant Camp as part of the Bicentennial Celebrations.

From the mid 1940's to early 1970's many thousands of people lived at the camp as their first home in Australia. There is now little to show their families as they re-visit, and nowhere to park or even stop.

As well as the tremendous personal effect on the lives of migrants, the Camp signified wide-reaching historic changes to the social and economic structure of Australia.

The Ethnic Council envisages perhaps a garden, museum and landscaped tourist area on the site.

JROWA OUTING by Holford Lempriere.

On Sunday, June 26, a number of carloads of Historical Society members and their families visited Corowa Historical Society. They were met at the Corowa Museum by their members, headed by the secretary, Mrs Deirdre Izon, who made us most welcome over hot coffee and scones (on a day which did not exceed 7 degrees!). Then followed an inspection of the extensive exhibits, which date back towards Federation of the colonies, at the turn of the century. We were also shown the graves of many district pioneers, in the picturesque cemetery overlooking the Murray River.

After lunch we were escorted down river to historic Collendina Station, which was originally taken up in 1841 by Robert Brown, first settler at the Crossing Place, Albury in 1838. The huge selection of Collendina at first included the later properties of Sandy Ridges, Bull Plain, Cow Pastu Sanger's Mistake, Dry Forest and Buraja. In 1867, Brown disposed of the lease to Gayer and Crosse, retaining only 1000 acres which he sold in 1878 to W.Hay and Sons. Brown married in 1843 and left a large family, descendants of whom still reside in the area. He then selected near Tocumwal. He was buried at Mulwala on February 14, 1879.

At Collendina, Brown ran mostly cattle and as early as the 1850s, cropped up to 150 acres of wheat on the property, while John Foord grew a further 70 acres across the river at Wahgunyah. These two men also operated sawmills and built the first bridge across the river in 1863.

Under the Hay family, Collendina expanded and prospered over a long period. The property was again subdivided, Jilamatong being purchased by Mr Ned Nicholson. Chief among improvements to the property was the erection of a two storey brick homestead which at one time contained up to 40 rooms, and which is still in excellent repair.

The Hays were followed by the Carrolls who eventually sold to the present owners, Mr and Mrs Peter Howard. Mr Howard has embarked on a comprehensive programme of pasture improvement and spray irrigation, backed by intensive mechanisation, making Collendina among the highest producing properties in the country.

Our party was also fortunate to fit in a tour of Wahgunyah Township and its industries, and the grave of John Foord who pioneered the area. Under his guidance, the town became a major port for the Murray steamers from South Australia, allowing the important industries of the district wool, grain, timber, wine and meat - to prosper long before the advent of the railways.

EUROA Accepting an invitation from the Euroa Historical Society, Holford Lempriere recently gave a talk to them on the subject of "Seven Creeks and the Saxon Merinos". This covered the adventures of Mrs Janet Templeton and her family in importing the first shipment of superfine Merino sheep from the flocks of the Elector of Saxony in Germeny to Sydney and subsequently across the Murray to "Seven Creeks" near Euroa in 1837. Secondly, Mr Lempriere traced the expansion of this flock through the Ercildoun stud near Ballarat to the whole of western Victoria; as well as the blending of the Wanganella, N.S.W. flock of the Templeton brothers to form the Peppin type of Merino in Riverina. The children were all born in Albury between 1867 and 1879: Mary, Catherine, Margaret, Johanna, James and Elizabeth. The family moved to Grenfell in 1885 with the families of Cleary, Madden and Leonard. James Casey was said to be a keen cricketer and footballer, a strong Labor supported and member of the Catholic Church.

Bill Rourke, 2 Donald Street, Wangaratta who seeks information concerning his grandparents James and Mary (nee Ryan) Mitchell who conducted a bakery in Albury about

the 1880's and were long-time Albury residents.

Mr Justice Nagle


Society member, Mrs P Reed, has sent us a cutting from the Sydney Morning Herald Jr'w 8th, 1983 regarding the retirement of Mr Justice Nagle.

Justice John Nagle was born and grew up in Albury. He was admitted to the Bar in 1939 and during the war served in the Middle East with the 2/2 Field Regiment, A.I.F.

Justice Nagle was made a Q.C. in 1959 and appointed to the Bench the following year. In 1977, he headed the Royal Commission into N.S.W. Prisons.

"Justice Nagle intends retiring to his 1600 acre cattle and sheep farm in Albury used in the last century as a hide-out by 'Mad Dog' Morgan, the bushranger." according to the Sydney Morning Herald.

### August Meeting PROFESSOR MANNING CLARK

An overflow audience of 230 people packed the Civic Theatrette to hear the professor.

Manning Clark spoke of the contrasting reception given to his "Short History of Australia" and the first volume of "The History of Australia". He discussed the interpretation and style of writing of the longer history, and provided many interesting anecdotes of the background influences in his life which gave rise to the interpretation.

While the short history, written in six weeks, proved uncontroversial and sold well, "all hell was let loose" when the first volume of the long history appeared.

The theme of the long history was what the land did to the European settlers, and what they did to the land.

As the author now comes to judge his own work, he regrets that he gave insufficient emphasis to the aboriginal culture and the role of women in the history of Australia.

Just as Manning Clark's writing was in a narrative style, so was his address. Members of the audience felt they were being spoken to personally. Their respect for this foremost Australian philosopher and historian was more deeply enhanced by the evening's address.

## ALBURY'S MAYORS

Cliff Chamberlain, Community Affairs Officer, asked the Society for help in researching the Mayors of Albury. Mayoral portraits in the old Town Hall were to be removed and carefully preserved probably in the form of a bound book. Each portrait would be accompanied by a thumb nail sketch & it was here that Cliff hoped for the Society's help

Holford Lempriere offered to co-ordinate a programme on the mayors from 1859 to 1894. Helen Livesy, with Holford's help, spent hours in research, usually starting with the obituary. They have collected some information on W N M Edmondson, T H Griffith, W J Jones, W E Lamport, Kenneth McLennan, Arthur Phillips, Conrad Tenbrink, D S Watson & R M Wilkinson but they say more in needed. They hope that as the material is published gradually in the Bulletin, members may remember facts or anecdotes to add to their resea

## ALBURY'S MAYORS. James Thomas Fallon, Mayor of Albury 1859 - 1861

Albury's first mayor was an Irishman. Born near Athlone in 1819, James Thomas Fallon came to Australia at the age of 25. He started a business at Braidwood and was joined, in 1854, by his brother, Patrick. The opening up of the Victorian goldfields and the prospects of trade brought the pair of them to Albury, where they established their business in Kiewa Street, opposite the Rose Hotel.

The first Municipal election was held in Albury on 21 July, 1859. J.T. topped the poll and was elected Mayor. The occasion was marked with fireworks and bonfires.

During the year, the Victorian government was petitioned to provide a serviceable road to Wodonga and towards the end of the year, a contract was let for this work. Tenders were called for the erection of a bridge over the Murray River.

December 1859 saw the issue of the first rate assessments - many were dissatisfied and many appealed.

The years 1859/1860 saw progress in building. The Globe and Court House Hotels were built. There were extensions to the Exchange Hotel and work was commenced on the post and telegraph office on the corner of Dean and Kiewa Streets.

The Murray Valley Vineyard Company was founded in 1860. J.T. was one of its founding members and was later to become the owner of the Vineyard.

On 1 February 1860, Kidd & Brickell's tender of £7,500 was accepted for the erection of the first bridge over the Murray. J.T. drove the first pile on 16 August 1860 and the occasion was toasted with champagne.

Tenders were called for the Hospital and gaol and the site was chosen for the Mechanics Institute. The "Albury Banner" reported in 1860 that the main street, Townsend Street, was being ploughed and formed. Prior to 1860, the only buildings north of Dean Street had been the Court House, lockup and St. Matthew's.

The old National School site having been sold to T H Mate in 1860, W J Jones' tender was accepted in 1861, for the erection of a new school building in Olive Street. The census taken in April of that year showed a population of 600 in the town itself. The Agricultural Society was arranging for local wines to be sent to the London Exhibition of 1862 and the completion of the hospital was marked by a fancy dress ball.

The Council was making strong efforts to improve the streets of Albury and went so far as to prohibit the sale of meat on Sundays.

On 2 September 1861, Miss Chauncy opened the bridge over the Murray River, christening it "The Union Bridge" with a bottle of champagne. In 1861 there was `i glut in agriculture and times were hard. There were many appeals against rates this year and finally the rates were declared illegal. No improvements were carried out and a large meeting of residents decided to petition for the repeal of the municipality.

As indicated above, J.T. was one of the founders of the Murray Valley Vineyard Company. In 1864, the Company borrowed £2,000, after having altered its Deed of Settlement to authorise the borrowing. When the mortgage fell due 3 years later, the Company was unable to pay and the property of 640 acres, bounded on the north, east and south by what are now known as Kaitlers, Dallinger and Union Roads, was auctioned by the mortgagee. J.T. was the successful bidder. He made the Murray Valley Vineyard a success and, in 1867, he bought land in Kiewa Street, where he built his cellars. The building itself may have altered, but the cellar, with its huge beams, remains. Fallon's Cellars were to become famous and no-one, but no-one, came away from Albury without having visited Fallon's Cellars (though one journalist had the temerity to assert that he had).

In December, 1869, J.T. replaced T.H. Mate as the local member of Parliament and represented the electorate for 3 years. The "Albury Banner" recorded that "in Parliament and out he showed remarkable energy and shrewd commonsense, both of which qualifications were always brought to bear on any move for the benefit of the Albury area."

"James Thomas Fallon" (continued)

He was active in efforts to have State customs duties abolished. He had extensive holdings around Albury, on both sides of the River - even Jindera has its Fallon Street.

J.T. left Albury in 1871, to devote himself entirely to the development of the wine trade. In 1873, he made his first trip home to the old country. He took with him a large photograph of the Murray Valley Vineyard and gave a huge picnic on an island in the Shannon River. He made a tour of the wine producing districts of France and brought François Gaston (Leonce) Frere to Albury, to make champagne. While in London, he spoke out (unsuccessfully) for the reduction of duties imposed on Australian wines. For his second overseas trip, in 1876, J.T. was better prepared to argue for the relaxing of duties on Australian wines. He was armed with facts and figures certified by the appropriate officials and he won the day.

J.T. never married. He died at his Sydney residence, "Riverstone", Manly, on 26 May, 1886, at the age of 67. Although he had lived in Sydney for so long, he was brought back to Albury for burial. The Mayor, Geo. Billson, and Aldermen attended his funeral and businesses were closed. For 97 years, the memorial to James Thomas Fallon, Albury's first Mayor, has stood looking down the street which was named after him.

## ALBURY'S MAYORS William E Lamport, 1882.

Miss Struan Lamport of Pymble, great grand-daughter of William E Lamport, Mayor of Albury in 1882, has been corresponding with Society member, Helen Livesy.

Her letters correspond with our research surrounding the Mayors, for the Albury City Council. Limited information is known about William E Lamport. He owned land in Hovell and Macauley Streets and had done some mining at Black Range (Lavington), and previously at Snowy River and other goldfields. He worked in Albury as a road contractor, and died in 1890 aged 56 years. He had one son and two daughters.

Mr Lamport's son, Alfred was one of many members of the Lamport family who worked for the Bank of N.S.W. and he was seriously wounded during an attempted bank robbery while he was manager of the Henty branch in 1901.

Brothers Herbert and Joseph Minton tried to hold up Mr Lamport and Mr C J Hazelton, the accountant, in the manager's office. However Mr Lamport resisted, extracted a gun from a drawer, critically wounding one of the robbers, who in turn shot Mr Lamport. The Mintons were captured about an hour later and were subsequently sentenced to twelve years penal servitude.

Mr Lamport was rewarded for his courage when presented with a watch and chain, an address and, after he had fully recovered from his wounds, twelve months leave of absence on full pay, together with a cheque for £500 for the purpose of affording him the opportunity of visiting Europe.

The Government presented Mr Lamport with a gold medal for bravery. Other recipients of this honour had been Mr Keightly, Sir William Macleay, and Mr Bayliss, (police magistrate of Wagga), but Mr Lamport was the first recipient for 30 years.

Mr Hazelton was presented with a silver medal, given three months leave on full pay, and a watch and chain.


When the Bank of N.S.W. opened a branch at the Macquarie Centre, North Ryde, Miss Lamport was the first customer, in keeping with the family association with the bank in the employment of her great grandfather, David Maughan at Benalla during the Ned Kelly era, her grandfather Alfred W E Lamport, her great uncle and her uncle. September Meeting Frank Higgins has written a precis of his talk, but without anecdotes:

## CATHOLIC CHURCH ALBURY 1850 - 1868

During this period the colony of Victoria was constituted, payable gold discovered and significant changes made to the Land Act. Albury felt the impact of these developments.

Hardworking pious Catholic families commenced settlement in Albury from May 12, 1851. The names of some of them were Frauenfelder, Schubach, Rau, Dallinger, Dick, Gehrig, Stassen.

Following them were Fallon, Day, Bell, Keogh, Cullen, Dwyer, Daly, Mullavy, Devine, Plunkett, Keighran, Costigan, Gorman, Long of Irish origin and McLennan of Scotch.

The Albury parochial district was established in 1854 with young Father Maher in charge until 1857 when the practical Father Twomey took over as pastor until 1868. Albury was now part of the recently formed Diocese of Goulburn under Bishop Lonigan.

The mould of the Catholic Church in Albury was set in this period and was now ready for the impact of Dr. McAllroy and the Mercy nuns.

Museum Report The preparation of the museum continues for a likely opening date in October. All the display boards have now been erected by Council, and the full carpeting of the museum will be complete in early October.

The sub-committee has spent considerable time preparing the text. It has now co-opted the services of Frank Higgins to assist in reviewing and finalising the information before presentation.

The museum director has been in contact with various schools in the area and has prepared an outline museum education information sheet for 1984. We will have by then a very extensive display of the local history and development of Albury and region. John Alker-Jones.

#### TIBBITS EXHIBITION - MELBOURNE

The Society has loaned its painting of Table Top by William Tibbits to the La Trobe Library in Melbourne.

The Library is currently holding an exhibition devoted entirely to the works of Tibbits.

Whilst our painting is away the La Trobe Library has loaned the Society two lithographed views of Albury. One is a coloured view of Albury issued as a supplement to the Border Post in November 1888. It shows a panorama of Albury with the river in the distance and important shops, offices and hotels around the border. It is an interesting piece and one which the Society does not possess. ## ALBURY'S MAYORS

## Arthur Phillips

Member of Council 1889 - 94. Mayor of Albury 1892. Born at Goulburn, the son of N C Phillips of "Lansdowne", Goulburn. He came to Albury when in his teens to take a position on the staff of the Commercial Bank and was a smart and efficient officer. At the age of 21 years he was the manager of the Germanton (Holbrook) branch. His association and residence in Albury and district extended over 34 years and he became a stock and station agent and auctioneer. He was appointed a Territorial Magistrate and was Secretary of the Albury Racing Club and Albury Pastures Protection Board. When the Hume Shire was formed Mr Phillips was appointed clerk to the temporary council. He was Deputy Coroner, Justice of the Peace, and returning officer for state elections. A well read man who took a keen interest in public and general affairs, he had one daughter, Emilie, and two sons, Bowen and Lloyd. He lived at "Bowen Villa", Wyse Street, Albury and died on October 15, 1909 aged 55 years.

## William John Jones

Member of Council 1869-71, 75-90, 92-94, 96-99. Mayor of Albury 1877 and 1878. Born in the village of Carrabeg, County Roscommon, Ireland about 1827. At about 19 years of age he and his sister (aged about 8) sailed to America. He married in New York in July 1853 and came to Australia in October 1854 with his wife and infant son (who predeceased his father). They went to Goulburn where he engaged in the building trade for a couple of years. In June 1857 the family arrived in Albury the journey being made with a dray and two horses. He eventually purchased a house for £28, and also 22 acres of land at Corowa which he sold soon after. On this land was to become the township of Corowa. After spending a time on the Indigo Diggings he returned to Albury and the building trade, while also holding the position of Town Surveyor for two years. On his retirement from this position he stood for Council and was elected.

During his mayoral term of 1877 the Botanical Gardens were laid out, the planting of trees in it commenced and a lake formed in the centre. He was again mayor in 1878 when the planting of street trees was discussed at length and ultimately decided on the casting vote of the mayor. The planting commenced in August of the following year when elms were planted along the northern side of Dean Street, between Olive and Kiewa Streets at a cost of  $\pounds/1/2/6$  each.

Mr Jones was no public speaker but had a sense of humour and a capacity for seeing things in their right perspective. He was a foundation member of the H.A.B.C. Society which was established in 1870, and conducted a furniture store at the corner of Dean and Townsend Streets, and an undertaking business.

He died at his residence "Elsinoire", Dean Street, Albury on September 1, 1914 aged 86.

These two articles were researched and written by Helen Livesy at Cliff Chamberlain's request to the Society for "thumb nail sketches" of Albury's mayors. Pat Strachan's article on J.T. Fallon in last month's Bulletin was also specifically researched and written for this project. The Society is grateful to both of them. A.I.D.


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## THE MARGARET CARNEGIE COLLECTION, quoted from two Newsletters from R.C.A.E., Wagga Wagga.

The Library of books, journals and papers which Mrs Margaret Carnegie of Holbrook, N.S.W. has given to the Riverina College of Advanced Education is significant in terms of its contents and because it compliments other material held at and being collected by the Riverina College Archives and Records Service.

Mrs Carnegie's Collection, to which she is still adding material, has a number of strengths. These include extensive runs or complete sets of a remarkable array of journals; a substantial gathering of local history for the Riverina and North-Eastern Victoria; and much material on Australian art and Australian literature, especially Henry Lawson. The Collection also contains a great deal of 19th century Australian history.

The Collection contains a considerable number of rarities. These include maps, journals, contents pages & covers of volumes & books, both fact & fiction. It also contains a large quantity of notes & related materials used by Mrs Carnegie in her historical writing.

Born in Albury 1st April 1893, Walter Malcolm Neil McEachern was educated at the Albury Public School, and studied singing under the guidance of Mr Tracey.

Later he toured Australia, then seeking international experience, he went to London where he made his debut as Malcolm McEachern, bass baritone. He sang in London with Dame Nellie Melba and toured Australia as soloist with a company led by Melba.

He became famous as one of the Duo Flotsam and Jetsam. He died in London in 1945 at the age of 61 years.

Mr Cleaver Bunton, O.A., O.B.E, in rising to a vote of thanks to Mrs Boyes for her entertaining talk, told several amusing anecdotes of their experiences when he, Cleaver, and Malcolm were students with similar voices, under the guidance of Mr Tracey who gave lessons in the historic house "Kia Ora".

# A PORY'S MAYORS

# John Roper, Councillor 1859 - 62.

Mayor of Albury, February to October 1862 John Roper was born in Gayton Thorpe, Norfolk, England in 1820, the eldest son and third of ten children of Thomas and Frances Roper (nee Nurse) of Gemingham Hall. He was educated at King's Lynn, Norfolk, migrated to New Zealand in 1838 and arrived in Sydney in 1843.

He was a member of Leichardt's expedition to Port Essington in 1844-45 when he was speared by aboriginals and lost his sight in one eye. On this journey Leichardt named the Roper River in his honour.

Mr Roper was appointed Albury's first Clerk of Petty Sessions in 1847, and was also Postmaster. He became a Magistrate.in 1854. Elected to Albury's first Council on July 21, 1859, he was a member of the Show Society, Albury Co-Op store, Hospital and Race Club when he resigned due to insolvency in 1862.

He had built the Globe Hotel in 1860, but did not operate it and owned considerable township property including all the land on the north side of Dean Street from the Globe Hotel to Elizabeth Street, and a grain store and five room cottage in Kiewa Street, as well as land at Doctors Point. He also held small parcels of land planted t Probacco and vines. His team of draught stallions and farm machinery were some on the earliest in the district and included a Robinson reaper and binder.

The Border Post paid tribute as follows: "Much sympathy is felt for Mr Roper in the trying situation in which the depreciation in real estate has placed him. He is one of the oldest residents in Albury and has done much, both in public and private, to advance the interests of the town ... he has deserved well of the colonists at large, for he was one of the companions of Leichardt to Port Essington". He was released from insolvency in 1873.

John Roper moved to Merriwa, near Scone, N.S.W. where he was Stock Inspector until two years before his death in 1895, when he was a respected townsman, director of a flour milling company and owner of a substantial property, "Roseberry Park". In the Holy Trinity church yard at Merriwa stands a memorial to John Roper, which was built from a subscription fund raised by the Sydney Telegraph.

After his return from Port Essington, John's brothers William, Frederick and Walter, and his sister Frances, migrated to Australia. John did not marry but descendants of his brothers still live in the Victorian country not far from Albury and Mount Beauty as a reminder of the English family who made Australia their home.

Unfortunately it is probably the painting in the worst condition in comparison with the others & highlights the need for conservation work to be undertaken.

Between 1877 and 1896 William Tibbits lived in Albert Street, Windsor, Melbourne, and developed a richer clientele and a more professional and businesslike approach.

A copy of the exhibition brochure will be available for inspection at the November general meeting.

William Tibbits died on 15 December 1906 at the age of 69 and was buried at Waverley Cemetery, Sydney.


## NOTES ON VICTORIAN FAMILY HISTORY.

#### **J34 AIR RACE RECALLED**

Echoes of the 1934 London to Melbourne air race, in which the town of Albury featured prominently, are to be found in the proposed mock-up film of the race, at present under preparation by the Dutch authorities. During a wild night storm, the Dutch entry, a Douglas D.C.2 airliner the Uiver, made a forced landing on Albury racecourse, with the aid of headlights of cars. Next day, the plane flew on to Melbourne to finish second in the race. Uiver was piloted by Messrs Parmentier and Molle of the Netherlands Air Services.

Numerous photos of the Uiver and its crew were taken by Holford Lempriere on that occasion, when he flew down to Laverton airfield next day to review the air race, which was won by Scott and Campbell Black in a D.H. Comet. Holford Lempriere.

## 1884 - 1984 TABLE TOP CENTENARY

Preparations are well in hand for the publication of a district history to mark the centenary of the first school at Table Top in 1884. The story also covers that of nearby Table Top Station conducted over many years by the Mitchell family. Holford Lempriere has been co-opted to the local committee who are preparing for the celebrations in March next year.

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The Chiltern Outing Thirty five or so members, family and friends had a most interesting excursion to Chiltern and the State Forest. We succeeded in finding the rurt House, not now in use but still furnished and in good condition. The bricks are laid in the same fashion as those of the old Presbyterian church in Albury (behind St Pat's Hall) - both date from 1860. The National Parks Service have restored the Police Residence as a home for the State Park Ranger and rebuilt the kitchen in an excellent complementary style. The Police Stables still exist; the same design occurs throughout Victoria. The Lock-Up is strongly built of stone and brick; members agreed that there would be little chance of escape from the small high barred windows.

Mr Graeme Parkes, the Ranger, then led us to Frog's Hollow picnic place for lunch. When he returned, we all walked up to the site of the State Battery. The Government encouraged new miners by crushing their first three tons of ore free. We moved on to the Magenta Mine, a deep open cut mine, so called because of the colour of the rock when first exposed. Mines and batteries were operating in this area for seventy years until about 1930. We then visited the site of the Pioneer Cemetery, but it had been stripped of the wooden grave markers years ago by a firewood seller.

We thank Graeme Parkes for taking the Society on this tour and Holford Lempriere for arranging it. A.I.D.

Mr A.Kimber told members that there may be a branch of the Heritage Society formed at Tallangatta and he took away a copy of our Constitution.

Mr John Brett spoke about the book he has written on "The Life of Johnny Hunter" for the Albury High School P. & C. Mr Brett's research and writing has made him a profound admirer of the genius and character of John Hunter.
