

Community Employment Programmes.

Shirley Tucker spoke about her work researching non-European history prior to 1900. She felt she had exhausted the archives held in Albury and hoped to continue her research in Canberra, Sydney and Melbourne.

OBITUARY

With sadness we report the passing of Mrs Thelma Rigg. Our sympathy goes out to Husband Len in the loss of his life partner and to their daughter, Lorraine Bidgood.

We remember with gratitude Thelma's supportive role during Len's Presidency of the Albury and District Historical Society. We look forward to his continued interest in the work of the Society. A.L.Q.

ALBURY BAPTIST CHURCH Few churches can be said to have retained a quarter of their membership for 56 years. This is the case with the Albury Baptist Church, which started in 1929 with eight members. Two of these, Mrs Margaret Hedges and Mrs Daisy Passant, still worship there every Sunday. The church building was opened on November 15th, 1930, and the Sunday School Hall in 1936. The church still retains the bills of the builder, Mr F A Stow, who completed the hall for £866, 12shillings and $7\frac{1}{2}$ d. A minister's car, a Chrysler Plymouth sedan, was bought for £150 in 1937, when the minister's salary was £4 a week. The first minister, the Rev. James Baker, served from 1929 to 1937. The present minister, the Rev. George Crombie, is the 13th minister. A building master plan in 1964 led to the church being extended, and connected to the hall. As well, the pulpit was placed at the opposite end of the church, so the congregation now faces what was originally the entrance. The present manse is in Alemein Avenue, North Albury. The city council in 1940 refused to subdivide the church land at the corner of Macauley Street and Crisp Street to allow a manse to be built next to the church. This land is now a Howard Jones. car park.

Note: Howard Jones is writing a history of Thurgoona. Any members who can contribute facts or anecdotes are asked to contact him on 21 6589.

Mrs Wattie Fielder went to school at Thurgoona, at the old school house and schoolroom across the playground, back from the Sydney road. She walked two miles there and back for ten years; 10,000 miles. Palmer's coach came in the other direction, from Culcairn and Holbrook in the morning and from Albury in the afternoon, so the children never had a lift. The coach was red, like Cobb and Co's with two, sometimes three, horses. It carried passengers and mail. Helen would collect their mail from Wignell's (Mrs and Miss) who kept the Post Office beyond the church. It was further to walk after school. The newspaper was delivered (flung) on the afternoon run from Albury. She remembers the School of Arts being built; at Morning Tea time they would 'help' pour concrete into moulds to make bricks.

Community Employment Programmes

1. Local Historian. Since my last report I have visited the La Trobe Library, Melbourne and the Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies, Canberra. Both trips were extremely beneficial in terms of information about the Wiradjuri people who frequented the area between the Murrumbidgee and Murray Rivers. At the Institute I had the opportunity to discuss the Albury region with Archaeologists and Anthropologists who have over the years gathered many useful reports about this area. Much of the material I was shown is unpublished and not available anywhere else.

The Albury Aboriginal Lands Council kindly arranged for me to spend two evenings in the home of Ms Iris Clayton, a Wiradjuri woman living in Canberra. Iris spoke to me of her own experiences and the stories told to her by her grandmother. After I had read books about the beliefs of the Wiradjuri people, she explained that some of the subtlety and complexity of the stories are inevitable lost in the printed word.

I plan to return to Canberra on my way to Sydney, where I will visit the Mitchell Library and the New South Wales State Archives Office. Shirley Tucker.

2. <u>Library Cataloguer</u>. My work for the Albury Historical Society is a continuation of the cataloguing initially undertaken by Anne Mathieson. It has been extremely interesting being involved in the cataloguing of the Historical Society's collection of literature here at the Albury Library. Anne did all the ground-work necessary for the formation of the present filing system. My main work has involved completing that task and cross-referencing it all.

The Historical Room, when the systems are completed, will give the public easy access to the literature concerning the history of Albury and District. I am enjoying my walk through Albury's past; names of places and people now have a whole new meaning and interest. I would like to encourage anyone who is in the least interested in Albury as a town, to venture into the Historical Room for a browse around. The surrounding district is also full in intriguing history. You will soon have it at your fingertips and you'll find it really fascinating.





RIVER REFLECTIONS, Part III
(by Lloyd Holmes)

Away again in early spring, MARY ANN beat LADY AUGUSTA and LADY AUGUSTA'S big barge EUREKA out of the starting blocks by ten days. Now the race to be first up the rivers was on in earnest. Eighteen days after leaving the departure point of Noa-No near Mannum, MARY ANN was at the Darling Junction. Twenty-nine days after leaving she was seven hundred and seventy miles from the sea at the junction of the Murrumbidgee and Murray Rivers, just three days steaming time from Swan Hill.

Downstream of Swan Hill one outstation of Canally Station had not seen a bullock team with supplies for two years. Two wool clips were stored on the property awaiting transport. Fresh supplies of foodstuffs and other necessities were a distant memory, and news of the outside world had not been received for months.

Suddenly, the station folk were amazed to see smoke rising and to hear whistles blowing on the river as the paddlesteamers arrived bringing fresh supplies only a few weeks out of the Adelaide stores.

One night, while moored near the Murrumbidgee/Murray Junction, Randell was awakened by the noise of paddles thrashing water as LADY AUGUSTA with EUREKA lashed alongside steamed past. This was too much for Randell. Mooring lines were quickly slipped, the boiler stoked, and up the dark river went MARY ANN after her adversary LADY AUGUSTA.

LADY AUGUSTA arrived at Swan Hill on September 17, 1853. On the same day, but a few hours later, her rival MARY ANN tied up at Swan Hill, also. The entire population of the town, ten white men, two white women, and fifteen Aborigines, turned out to welcome the boats.

And so the Riverboat Era began. It was an era of enormous importance to the growth of the three young states whose boundaries encompassed the rivers on which the boats steamed, for the riverboats were the interim transport link between the lumbering bullock drays and the iron horses. Enormous areas of remote countryside could be opened up and fresh supplies traded for rural produce.

The South Australian Government was new thoroughly enthusiastic about South Australia's future as storekeeper to Western New South Wales and Northern Victoria and as a recipient of great volumes of those states' rural output. It encouraged the formation of the River Murray Navigation Company with Cadell as one of the leading lights and major shareholders.

SUMMER SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAM

The summer program for children was intended to be a forum for developing awareness of the environment and for placing natural and accessible resources in an historical context.

The theme of the first week of the program was body ornamentation. In the morning of the first day we walked around the park to collect materials to fashion into ornaments. The children showed many of the same qualities as Peter Tulley in their approach to found and readily accessible objects. They were open-minded and imaginative, and their walk resulted in a collection of feathers, reeds, gumnuts, pieces of dried orange peel, leaves, many varieties of grasses, seed heads, interesting gnarled pieces wood, pieces of broken glass, flip tops, fresh flowers, and discarded junk food containers. In the afternoon, the children used these materials and fashioned many clever constructions on bases of wire and/or string.

On the second day, at the suggestion of the children, participants brought along their soft toys and decorated them prior to a Teddy Bears' picnic at noon. Children were encouraged to make up stories about the favourite toys they had brought, and during lunch many imaginative and innovative stories were told and acted out. A cauple of the more sobhisticated guests sported tie pins and cigars. Party hats were popular both with the aldren and their guests. Some children brought special treats to share with the group.

On the third day of the first week the children learned how beads were made from clay and how additives of oxides and pigments were used to colour the beads. They also explored flat surfaces and design using bas relief. The fourth session turned into a dress up event. Discussion centered on the functional role of clothing, how clothing is linked to cultural identity, social customs and self expression, and how new materials for clothing have evolved. The fifth day was about body painting, and there was a discussion of how it reinforces cultural identity.

The second week of the program was about bush dolls. It started with collecting leaves, grasses and other natural materials. These were fashioned into exquisite dolls in all sizes. Embroidery was introduced and used to add expression to the dolls' faces. Some children extended their activities to providing beds for their new charges. By Friday, projects were completed and a wonderful dolls party complete with a dolls cake provided by a thoughtful mum was enjoyed by all. The week ended with a dolls competition in which the children alternated as entrants and participants.

Mud pictures week started off with a whole day spent on the river bank. Pictures were formed out of sand and the children attempted to decipher or to make up stories out the sand hieroglyphics. This activity was extended to drawings with a stick on the wet mud bank. The children were encouraged to evaluate the various mediums of communication. This was followed by an explanation of how drawing implements are formed and how they are all derived from different sources of earth combined with other materials. This activity was followed by the children making their own brushes from green willow sticks and mixing clay and raw earth pigments. These materials were used to produce many delightful mud pictures.

Special thanks are due to Cliff Chamberlain for his entertaining and informative contribution to the program. Darrell Smailes, Pty. Ltd. lent audio visual equipment and a carousel and slide projector were loaned by Albury High School. These were all deeply appreciated. Finally, we were encouraged by the strong support the media gave to the program and we thank them for it.

STORAGE AND PRESERVATION OF THE COLLECTION BEFORE REGISTRATION AND CATALOGUING

Artifacts owned by the Society and stored at the home of Claude Hazlewood were removed to the new storage building late in December with the help of Albury City Council workmen. The ACC mobile crane was used to lift the elton wheels, stump puller, chaft cutter, and other agricultural machinery onto an ACC truck. Loading was difficult as access for the large crane was limited. However, the ACC driver did an expert job and there was no damage done to any of the pieces of machinery.

In mid January, the 1858 Albion printing press, the paper folder and the composer were moved from Dalgety Farmers & Graziers Wool Store in Townsend Street to the new storage area Moving the one-tonne printing press was an intricate and delicate job, and it involved the Dalgety fork lift, the ACC mobile crame, a four-tonne truck, and several council workmen. All went well, and the press and other equipment have been safely transferred.

Later in January, two ACC workmen with the four-tonne truck helped clear the storage shed at the Albury Airport. Some of the objects which were transferred were a large set of bellows, a garden gate and bench, saddles, a large quantity of harness, a honey centrifuge a milk separator, a hip bath, numerous display cases, and old glass. In all, six trips were required to clear the shed.

The most upsetting aspect of this removal from the airport was the absolutely deplorable condition of the saddles. They were literally alive with cockroaches and silverfish. One of them disintegrated when I picked it up, and it may now be beyond repair. The occasional dose of napthalene balls/flakes over the years would have prevented this sad state of affairs and also warded-off the redback spiders which inhabit the shed.

The next temporary storage area to be cleared of the Society's collection will be the Albury Show Grounds. Whilst preparing to clear the show grounds and other areas mentioned above, I WAS UNABLE TO LOCATE THE FOLLOWING ARTIFACTS, all of which are listed in the Society's newsletter or in a preliminary registration book prepared some time ago by Mrs. Anne Davies: the buggy at the show grounds, wheels to the mortuary cart, a Bills horse trough, a hay cart with turtable steering, Dame Mary Gilmore's antique writing desk, a large number of various types of saddles, the eagle from on top the Albion printing press, and the swinging doors to the Turk's Head building.

PLEASE CONTACT ME AT THE MUSEUM, IF YOU KNOW WHERE THESE ARTIFACTS ARE TEMPORARILY STORED, so that I may arrange for their removal to the new storage area, and for fumigation registration, and basic preservation. Also, if you are aware of any artifacts in the collection which have been overlooked, I would be grateful if you would bring these to my attention.


ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

This will be a special meeting to discuss matters relating to the transfer of the Society's Museum to Albury City Council. The Deputy Town Clerk and the Chairman of the Management Committee of the Regional Art Centre will be in attendance to answer questions.

The committee of the Albury and District Historical Society and the museum sub-committee met on 19th February 1985 and resolved to recommend to the General Meeting on 12th March 1985 that Albury and District Historical Society:

- 1. Invites the Council of the City of Albury to become the legal custodian of the Society's Museum Collection.
- 2. Recommends that Council accepts the Acquisition Policy of the Albury Regional Museum (copy enclosed with this Bulletin).
- 3. Stipulates as a condition of the transfer of the Collection to the Council's custody that Council accepts clause 3.3 of the Acquisition Policy.

Mr Ray Stubbs, Deputy Town Clerk made the following recommendations to the Arts, Education and Community Services sub-committee. They were accepted, forwarded to the whole Council and approved:

- 1. That Council confirm its previous agreement in principle to accept financial responsibility for the continued operation of the Regional Museum, including the employment of the Museum Director.
- 2. That Council appoint a Management Committee of up to ten members under the provisions of Section 527 of the Local Government Act, to be responsible to Council for proper management of the Museum in the same way as the Regional Art Centre, and that Council invite nominations for such Committee.
- 3. That authority be granted to Council Officers to negotiate with the Historical Society regarding the transfer to Council of the Museum collection currently held in trust, and for the necessary financial negotiations concerning the takeover of the Museum's financial transactions.

Mr Tony Smith, Chairman of the Management Committee of the Regional Art Centre, will also be present to answer questions on how the management works in practice.

February Meeting Colin Frauenfelder showed us slides of many old shops and buildings around Albury. Some slides were from Mr Hazelwood's collection but most were his own. We saw the old Swimming Baths crowded with spectators and swimmers; the Baths were in the area of the Gertrude Colquhoun Park, Creek Street. There was a particularly interesting slide of Bellevue in Kiewa Street before the southern extension was added, showing the front door to the right and two windows on the left; now it is symmetrical. Blacklock's, the George Hotel, Sodens - it was difficult to keep up with the quick trip round Old Albury, especially when we found ourselves at Echuca! Thank you, Colin.

Also at the February Meeting Mr Harry Boyle sought from the meeting a definitive statement of the relationship between the Society and the Upper Murray Steamship Company. The reply was that the Upper Murray Steamship Company was a private company with limited liability and that it was not a project of the Albury and District Historical Society. Mr Boyle moved, seconded Mr Brown that "the Albury Historical Society, although not committed to the project, congratulates the enthusiasts who have launched the Upper Murray Steamship Company and extends best wishes for the successful completion of the project." Carried.

Committee Meeting, 26th February

Keith Burnham was co-opted to the committee, it's good to have him back.

The committee decided that original photographs be transferred from the Library to the Museum and that copies be progressively obtained for housing in the Library and further negotiations continue with regard to the Society obtaining a royalty for copies of photographs.

The committee considered that the inventory of the Collection should be completed before the Collection was handed over to the custody of Albury City Council. John Alker-Jones will report on this at the March meeting.

Mrs Margaret Carnegie was awarded the Order of Australia this year for services to Australian Literature. The Society congratulates her on the Award and is proud to have her as a Life Member.

Mrs Carnegie, Mr Des Martin and Mr Douglas Rolf have prepared a Musical called "Gabriel and Louisa" based on the life of Gabriel Louis Huon de Kerilleau. The Society warmly supported their application for a Bicentennial grant on the grounds that it was an historical and community activity. There should be news of the grant in March.

Helen Livsey visited Mr & Mrs W W Fielder and collected many items either given by them or held in their custody. They include photographs, special edition newspapers and other things for the Museum and the Library which we hope to list in the next Bulletin. The Society is once again most grateful to Mr & Mrs Fielder.

Thanks to the Law Society we have been able to photocopy the Bulletin free for the last two years. It was Pat Strachan who suggested that firms of solicitors might be willing to allow their photocopiers to be used. The Law Society agreed and a roster was arranged. But our membership and mailing list has grown so that we need not 160 copies as at first, but 250 - 2 pages - 4 sides. It was not fair to take over a machine for more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours with the risk of it overheating & breaking down due to continuous use. The committee have decided to have the Bulletin printed in future.

From the records of the old Turks Head Folk Museum .

"DAME MARY GILMORE'S TABLE AND CHAIR" acknowledged in the Bulletin March 1967

"The Historical Society is very fortunate to have been given Dame Mary's table and chair. They are from her King's Cross flat. The chair is now in the Society's Folk useum at the Turk's Head, but there is no space to display the table.

"The bequest happened this way: -

"John Farrell, the Australian poet, lived in Albury. He lodged at the Turk's Head and during the 1870s did most of his writing there. He was a great influence on Mary Gilmore and his daughter Olivia was her close friend. Olivia's daughter, Anastasia Cuddy, wrote to the Albury & District Historical Society in 1967 - 'The chair and table at which Dame Mary wrote for 35 years was willed to my mother, Olivia Macaninte nee Farrell, and now go to the Society in memory of her. My mother was born in Kiewa Street on March 28th 1883 and was the daughter of the Australian poet, John Farrell who in the 1870s boarded at the Turk's Head.'"



ACQUISITION POLICY OF THE ALBURY REGIONAL MUSEUM

1. AIMS AND DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 The Aims of the Albury Regional Museum are:
 - 1.1.1 To collect, preserve, conserve and present material evidence of man's existence in the Albury Wodonga region, including the Upper Murray Aboriginal tribes and exploration and settlement in the region from 1824 to the present
 - 1.1.2 To create a sense of community identity and an awareness of the cultural heritage of the region
 - 1.1.3 To supplement the program of local and regional history with temporary, travelling exhibitions, guest speakers, craft demonstrations, performances, and other social history projects and programs relevant to the museum, the museum's collection, and the community in which the museum is located
 - 1.1.4 To assist other museums in the region whenever and wherever possible, but particularly through seminars, demonstrations, lectures, and, as time permits, consultations.
- 1.2 The region represented by the museum parallels that of the Upper Murray Regional Library.

2. ACQUISITION OF OBJECTS

- 2.1 Objects will be acquired by purchase, gift, bequest, exchange, or field collection.
- 2.2 The Albury Regional Museum will only acquire objects if it can provide the adequate resources and procedures to protect, document, store, preserve, research, exhibit and interpret them.
- 2.3 The Albury Regional Museum will co-operate with other museums, historical societies, libraries and educational institutions, in order to avoid duplication of collections.
- 2.4 The Albury Regional Museum will accept on a permanent basis only those objects which are relevant and consistent with the aims of the Museum.
- 2.5 All objects entering the permanent collection will be accompanied by a legal document giving full and unencumbered title to their ownership to the Albury Regional Museum, without restriction as to use or future disposition.
 - 2.5.1 The Albury Regional Museum will maintain an accession register and, as time and resources permit, a catalogue.

- 2.5.2 The Albury Regional Museum will encourage maximum utilisation of its collections provided that the preservation of the objects is not compromised and their use is consistent with the overall goals of the Museum and ethical museological practice.
- 2.5.3 If for any reason objects which are important to the aims of the Museum cannot be collected, the Museum will make a complete documentary record of them, if possible.

3. DEACQUISITION OF OBJECTS

- 3.1 The Albury Regional Museum will intend that the objects shall have permanency in the collections as long as they retain their physical integrity, their identity, their authenticity, and their documentation.
 - 3.1.1 If all members of the Museum Management Committee agree to the deacquisition of an object in the Museum's collection, the Albury Regional Museum Committee may recommend to the Council of the City of Albury, recognised as the legal custodian of the collection, that that object be returned to the donor, sold, exchanged, or placed in another private or public collection to the benefit of the Museum and/or the Museum's collections.
 - 3.1.2 At the Albury Regional Museum Committee's unanimous recommendation that an object be returned to the donor, sold, exchanged, or placed in another public or private collection, and before action is taken, the Council of the City of Albury shall present notice of the disposal of an object in the Museum's collection first to the donor(s), if known, and then to a general meeting of the Albury District Historical Society.
 - 3.1.3 In the event of dissolution of the Albury Regional Museum for any reason, the Museum's collections shall be offered first to the Albury and District Historical Society or its successor, and then to either an appropriate museum in the region, or the Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences, Sydney, at the discretion of the Council of the City of Albury.

4. LOANS

- 4.1 The Albury Regional Museum will accept on a temporary basis, for a clearly defined period of time, materials which are to be used for documentation, research, educational or interpretative purposes, and materials to be used in temporary exhibitions.
 - 4.1.1 All objects entering the collection on a temporary basis will be accompanied by appropriate documentation setting forth the responsibilities of both the lender and borrower as regards the use, care, maintenance and insurance of the objects.

ARM Acquisition Policy 1 March 1985, page three

4.1.2 The Albury Regional Museum will lend materials from its collections only to museums, historical societies, libraries and other organisations which in the Museum's judgement can comply with the loan conditions as set by the Museum Committee. Loans will generally not be approved for extremely fragile materials, or materials that will be used soon in forthcoming exhibits at the museum.

5. ETHICS

- 5.1 The Albury Regional Museum will only acquire collections in accordance with State and Federal law and international agreements between Australia and other countries.
- 5.2 The Albury Regional Museum will only acquire objects having a legally and ethically clear title.
- 5.3 The Albury Regional Museum will not identify or authenticate, for any purpose, objects owned by individuals or other institutions and organisations.
- 5.4 The Albury Regional Museum will not provide appraisals for tax-deduction or other external purposes, but may assist donors to obtain appraisals from certified appraisers.
- 5.5 The collection of objects by the Albury Regional Museum will always be conducted in accordance with the highest professional standards as set out in the Code of Ethics of the Museums Association of Australia.
- 5.6 Collections will be made in the interest of preserving local and regional heritage.
- 5.7 The Albury Regional Museum will actively promote the education of the general public to the ethical and legal responsibilities of cultural heritage preservation.

Section 3 of the ARM Acquisition Policy is presented on page two as it will be when the Council of the City of Albury assumes responsibility for the Museum and its collections.

Following is Section 3 as it is currently, whilst the Albury and District Historical Society is still entrusted with the Museum and its collections:

3. DEACQUISITION OF OBJECTS

- 3.1 The Albury Regional Museum will intend that the objects shall have permanency in the collections as long as they retain their physical integrity, their identity, their authenticity, and their documentation.
 - 3.1.1 The Albury Regional Museum Committee, which is a working subcommittee of the Albury and District Historical Society, may recommend to the Albury and District Historical Society, recognised as the legal owner of the collection, that an object be sold, returned, or exchanged.
 - 3.1.2 At the Albury Regional Museum Committee's unanimous recommendation, the Executive Committee of the Albury and District Historical Society shall present notice of the disposal of an object first to the donor(s), if known, and then to a general meeting of the Society.
- 3.2 In the event of dissolution of the Albury Regional Museum for any reason, all written and photographic records and materials of the Museum shall be transferred to the Library of the City of Albury and all other assets of the museum shall be transferred to the City of Albury.



Society Meeting, 12th March 1985

Report by John Alker-Jones, Society President and Chairman of the Museum sub-committee.

The meeting held on 12/3 was a special one to discuss the committee's recommendation that the Society transfer the administration of the museum and the custody of the artifacts to the Albury City Council.

Members will recall that several years ago the Society began negotiations with Council to undertake the administration of the museum.

Now, after extensive discussions, council has offered to undertake fully the financial and administrative responsibilities and to create a community management committee to liaise between council and the museum.

To assist in the discussions of the transfer the deputy town clerk attended the meeting and, to give the views of a similar community management committee, Mr Tony Smith of the Regional Arts Centre also attended.

The debate which followed centred principally on the responsibility of maintaining the collection. The meeting agreed with the committee's recommendation that, should council wish to dispose of any item, it firstly gains the concurrence of the Society. Secondly, the debate discussed the accessibility of the photos previously held in the Local History Room at the library. The library felt it could no longer adequately conserve and administer the photos and they were returned to the museum. The meeting agreed by vote that, for proper conservation, the photos should remain at the museum, that steps be taken to provide a catalogue of available photos and that copies of the photos be made for the Local History Room in due course.

All the motions that were previously circulated in the Bulletin were carried.

The present two storey brick homestead was built by the Barber family following the marriage of Charles Henry Barber to his cousin Mary Hume in 1845. Gundowring had been in the possession of the Barber family since the occupation of the 20,000 acre run by 18-year-old Charles in the drought years following 1838. As a minor, he held the property in the name of his mother, Isabella Barber, until 1857 when the title was transferred into his ownership. Isabella, daughter of Andrew Hamilton Hume, was a sister of Hamilton Hume whose expedition was first to cross the river near the present site of Albury in 1824.

Frederic Street, who helped to occupy the run for the Barbers in 1839, reported the presence of many friendly aborigines. These gradually died out or left the area following the influx of population, including many Chinese, with the finding of gold in the district in 1851. Gundowring was the corroboree site for tribes from the Omeo, Ovens and Devil's River districts. Commissioner Bigg, in his 1839 survey, reported the presence of seven residents in seven slab huts with three acres of cultivation, 800 cattle and 21 horses. These huts were probably of log construction, with bark roof.

In 1860, the district was surveyed and lands thrown open for selection, but on July 2, 1857, Gundowring licence had been transferred by his mother to C H Barber who held it till his death at Beechworth in 1886. Sometime, due to an error in the issue of deeds, the name Barber was also spelt Barbour. Gundowring was taken over by John Macdonald from Terang in Victoria after close to half a century in the Barber family. The Macdonalds had come out from Cromarty, Scotland to Geelong in 1848 on board the "Aurora" and John had married Catherine Susan McWilliam at Terang in western Victoria. They then moved to Gundowring where he remained till 1923, though portions were sold following his wife's death in 1899. Their sons Alex and Simon each retained a portion. Simon sold to B Goldsworthy and went to live at Somerset Park, Narrandera.

Gundowring subsequently saw numerous owners pending its purchase by the present owners who both hailed from the Sale district of Gippsland. Jolley Dale Crooke was from The Holey Plain, Rosedale and his wife was Gwyn Foster from Boisdale House, near Maffra. They have three sons, Foster, David and Stephen.

Both Hereford (beef) and dairy cattle have been bred at Gundowring, as well as horses formerly as remounts for the Indian Army.

Mr Dale Crooke is well known as the present president of the National Trust in Victoria.

The Society Visit to Gundowring, Saturday 2nd March.

Members met at the Anvil at midday, drove up the Kiewa valley and then back to find Gundowring homestead hidden among trees near the river. Yarrawonga Society was already visiting the house so we were directed to a picnic place by the Kiewa river. It was a beautiful setting by the clear swift flowing river. The original willow trees were cuttings from Napoleon's grave at St Helena. After lunch we drove back up to the house which was thrown open for us. Mr Crooke spoke of the property and its owners. The name Gundowring is from the Aboriginal for Clear Water after a local permanent swamp.


The present two storey house was erected sometime after 1845. The builder was Eli Thornley The foundations were of granite, the bricks used were fired on the property and the roof was of shingles later covered with iron. The 12 foot verandah posts were kauri ship's masts. The original balcony roofing was striped canvas; when it was replaced with iron this was curved to follow the sag of canvas. The main house has four rooms on each floor with a wide two storey verandah on three sides and an internal and external staircase.

The precise date of the building is not recorded but there is a photograph dated 1865 which shows a well established creeper up the front verandah and balcony.

The bathroom tower was a later addition; two bathrooms were built, one above the other and topped with two water tanks. Later still, when regulations permitted a lavatory inside a house, another bathroom was fitted upstairs above the front hall.

Mr and Mrs Crooke showed us all over their home; the furniture and historic treasures are all you would hope for in a National Trust house. The Society is indeed grateful to them for the tour and to Holford Lempriere for arranging it.





"LOCAL ABORIGINAL HISTORY" Speakers: Shirley Tucker and Jean Whitla.

Shirley was employed by the Society for 26 weeks under a Community Employment Programme grant. Her research was on "Non-Europeans in Albury Wodonga prior to 1900 - A Social History Project"

Jean Whitla will show some of her Aboriginal artefacts.

Members could bring their local Aboriginal artefacts.

The Thurgoona History Night, held as part of Heritage Week, was Last Meeting highly successful. The attendance of 120 was made up of former and present residents, society members and members of the Albury-Wodonga Development Corporation, including the N S W Deputy Chairman, Mr Richard Howell. One purpose of the meeting at the Thurgoona Colf Club was to help Howard Jones's research into Thurgoona's past, a project commissioned by the Development Corporation.

Mr Jim Bell and others certainly provided a wealth of information that filled many gaps. This touched on early pioneers, the schools, the farms, the speedway races, the bush fire brigade, the hotels and wine shop, along with the Mitchells, Days, Bells and other families.

Keith Burnham arranged a display of photographs and this was supplemented by many items brought to the meeting by former residents. Among unusual items was a brick from Mrs Elizabeth Mitchell's Thurgoona homestead (from Mrs Jean Macdonald of Galloway Park) and a key presented to Councillor Benjamin Bell when he opened the School of Arts in 1913 (from Mr Jim Bell).

A highlight of the evening was Mrs May Bishop's recitation of a poem written for her by Father Hartigan - the poet "John O'Brien" of "Around the Boree Log" fame. Mrs Bishop is 89 this month and has a clear memory of Fr Hartigan living at the Another amusing item was the tape of extracts from the Public School punishment book read by Philip and Robin Jones, complete with "ouches".

Howard showed a series of slides illustrating present landmarks and historical features together with old photographs supplied by Helen Livsey. The chairman was John Alker-Jone The ladies provided excellent food for the social part of the evening.



In November 1982, he addressed the Society on "Aime Huon" and kindly gave to the Society photographs and his research notes on A A Huon.



SUPPER AND CONVERSATION

Bring your name badges and get to know each other, Last Meeting: Shirley Tucker spoke most confidently on the results of her six months research into Aborigines in the Albury district. Albury was within the territory of the Wiradjuri tribe. Their territory was not linear but marked by important places. The country near the Murray river was very rich - the women found plenty of vegetable food and the men trapped fish or hunted birds and small animals. The coming of Europeans disrupted their pattern of life. By 1880 there were only four aborigines living in Albury. No one alive now in Albury can tell about first hand encounters. Shirley has turned to written records for her research but as Aborigines had no written language, the records are necessarily by Europeans. She has collected an impressive amount of information from sources in Albury, Canberra, Sydney and Melbourne about which she told us most fluently. We look forward to reading her report. The Society hopes to publish a shortened account in the "Albury's History" series of broadsheets.

Jean Whitla complemented Shirley's talk when she showed some of the collection of artefacts which she has found or been given on her outback trips. We handled the artefacts and were left with a sense of wonder at the simple ingenuity of the tools. Photographs were enlightening once we knew what we were looking for. Jean observed that aboriginal intelligence has been undervalued, for instance, an intricate knowledge of aerodynamics is needed to make a returning boomerang.

The erudition of the first speaker and vigorous enthusiasm of the second added up to a stimulating evening and we thank them both.

Mr & Mrs Boyes have also given a \$200 sponsorship for the printing of another "Albury's History" sheet. The Publications sub-committee can now go ahead with the next chapter in the series.

TREASURER Helen Livsey has done the Treasurer's work for a year and a half now but she is longing to do more research and answer some of the "Can You Help?" letters. She is too conscientious to leave the Society in the lurch. She feels strong!" that it is time for someone else to be Treasurer. It is not arduous. It just needs someone who can keep up-to-date with a small account. It is logical that the Treasurer is also Membership secretary but if need be, Helen will continue to do this which entails: sending out receipts and membership cards & keeping the list of members, and therefore the mailing list, up-to-date. Please, oh please, nominate as Treasurer at or before the Annual General Meeting.

Guest Speaker Gerry Curtis spoke on "Local History between the two World Wars" to an attentive audience of about forty West Albury Rotarians. His talk was appreciated and many questions were asked. Holford Lempriere accompanied him.

The following account is taken from John Francis Huon Mitchell's book, published 1906: ABORIGINAL DICTIONARY (Woradgery tongue)...also Customs & Ceremonies of the Tribe.

I here take the opportunity to add a few remarks on the ceremonies and customs of the "Woradgery" Tribe.

"NURMUNG" Every youth, entering manhood, before he can claim to be received among men, to carry arms, fight, hunt, fish or join in a Corrobera, must have one of his front teeth knocked out from the upper jaw. A place, once chosen, is always used for the purpose, and that place is called "Yerung" or "Yerin", a tooth, ever after.

A perfect circle is formed, about 20 feet in diameter, the boundary well defined by throwing up earth to the height of several inches. No one but men can enter this circle during the ceremony.

(This is) my brother James' account, who saw the ceremony, as a boy, from under the opossumcloak of King George. The "Crargee," or Doctor, receives the lad from his father, or near relative, who, after he has made certain cabalistic signs over him, causes his hair to be singed off, plasters his head with some white pigment, prepared for the purpose, making him what they designate a "Gibbo", white head. He is now prepared for the ceremony.

The operation is simple but painful. The "Crargee", Doctor, places a piece of hard wood (part of the "Crargee's" outfit) against the tooth, which he strikes with a nulla-nulla, knocking out the tooth. He is now a young man, but for some time he is not allowed to mix with, or even speak with anyone, black or white, under severe penalty, and all that can be got out of him during his novitiate, is, "Yaho" or "Gibbo". Should he, while hunting, succeed in getting game or fish, he dare not partake of it, until his father or an elder gives sanction: the punishment for eating of it without consent of a warrior of the tribe, is very severe, sometimes death. After the "Nurmung's" hair has grown, and he becomes a presentable young buck, he is presented to the ladies, may fall in love and marry, living happily ever after, provided he is not "buckeened", speared, knocked on the head with a mulla-nulla, or cut to smithereens by a fighting boomerang: of these dangers he is in constant dread, day and night, and to relieve the monotony of such a life, he paints himself with white pigments, to make himself as hideous as possible, goes on the warpath, to do unto others what he fears will be done unto him. The Aboriginals have a superstition, that to rub themselves with the fat, "Gouri" of an enemy, is to acquire his strength, so they go "Buckeening" to get "gouri".

"BUCKEENING". Every tribe dreads the "Buckeen" or a night attack from another tribe, near or far remote. Should anyone die (when not from old age) the old men have a meeting to try and find out the tribe who caused the death, for nothing would make them believe the death was from a natural cause. The great man of the tribe, the "Crargee", is deputed to find out, and a very small matter points the way to the offending tribe: a passing cloud: distant smoke or a bird's flight, etc, and when he indicates the tribe by signs he considers conclusive, a party of warriors, duly dressed, in best war paint, sets out to make reprisals, and woe be unto that tribe, for it is sure to lose some of its members by spear, waddy or boomerang.

NOTE: We hope to include John Mitchell's account of a "Buckeening" raid in a later Bulletin. John and James were younger sons of Mrs Elizabeth Mitchell of "Mungarbareena" Station. For more on James Mitchell and family we suggest you read "TABLE TOP - A History of the District - 1824 to 1984" or visit the Local History Room at Albury Library.

MUSEUM SEMINAR planned by the Museums Association of Australia and the Royal Australian Historical Society and organised locally by Connie Kordell will be held at the Albury Regional Museum on 22 & 23 June. Watch out for the advertisements. There will be a series of workshops on subjects such as conservation of leather, caring for photographs and oral history.

"HISTORIC ALBURY" - copy enclosed

This is a most satisfactory leaflet. It has 16 pages of descriptions and pictures of historic places mostly in central Albury. It is introduced by Rob Simmons (credits at the back). It describes the architecture and records the history most excellently and is marred only by "Murray Cod". Any discrepancies are probably accounted for by differing sources of information.

memorials, fences etc etc. School text books have altered! "History Around Us"
is by Lionel A Gilbert and William P Driscoll and published by Methuen, Australia.
This revised enlarged edition is \$14.95 less 10% if ordered by Society members from
Angus and Robertson or Riverina Books.

Donation from Miss Lucy Staton of an account of the farewell "PRESENTATION of an Illuminated Address by the Albury Chinese Mission to Rev David Smith of the Presbyterian Church, Albury". The mission was inaugurated about 8 years previously. Thomas Allan presented a framed photo of the teachers and scholars; Thomas Foo, Philip Kee and John Quing You bore testimony to the high esteem in which they held the Rev D Smith. Walter McEachern was a singer in the concert which followed the presentations. Many of the Chinese scholars are mentioned by name.

The editor was intrigued that the Superintendent of the Chinese Mission was a Mr Morrison and wondered if this was "Chinese Morrison".

Chinese Morrison. The story which connects Ernest Morrison with Albury is that in the early 1880s, Morrison, then a first year medical student .. "with the coming of the university long vacation, put aside his notes and textbooks and, in the spirit of adventure, canoed 1,650 miles down the Murray River from Albury to Lake Alexandrina, near Adelaide. By day he had to contend with savage whirlpools, and his canoe was frequently holed by the rocks, while at night he got what sleep he could on the snake-infested river bank, tormented by mosquitoes. This thrilling journey took 65 days." Cliff Chamberlain has recorded that "The late Jack Gulson, whose father, one time Mayor Luke Gulson, once kept the Turk's Head, used to recall how as a youngster in the 80s he helped a man named Morrison launch his tiny canoe Rob Roy on the historic trip."

Ernest Morrison was born in Geelong in 1862. He led an adventurous life travelling to Europe, America and China. He was in China at a time when Europeans were loathed & persecuted and yet he himself was treated with friendliness & respect. He was corresponde for the London "Times" at the time of the Boxer uprising and for many years.

However, Lucy Staton has now told the editor that Rev David Smith left Albury about 1904/5 so the dates do not fit and Mr Morrison of the Chinese Mission in Albury was not "Chinese Morrison". Pity about that theory, but it was interesting finding out. Thank you to Helen Livsey for the loan of a scrapbook of newspaper cuttings and the book "Six Great Australians".

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1985

The President's term this year, has been short due to our change in the financial year from October to May but it has been one of considerable importance to the society.

The major events this year have been the acceptance by the Albury City Council of the financial and administrative control of the museum and staff; and the publication of the first in a series of 'broadsheets' by the Publication and Research Sub-committee. I believe these publications will be of major benefit not only for the residents of Albury, but also for tourist and educationalist alike. The support of this Sub-committee should be maintained as this is now an important new direction for the Society to take.

Similarly, I should congratulate all who have helped our museum to grow from a small collection in a series of little rooms, and who had the foresight to encourage the Council and the Government to support such a project to what is now an immense and acclaimed historic resource in this area.

Committees

To help in these projects and other organisational matters of the Society, has of course been the untiring efforts of your committee members. The committee met eight times up to May this year, and consists of John Alker-Jones - President and Chairman, Museum Sub-committee; Gerry Curtis - Vice President, and Heritage Week Co-ordinator; Mrs. Jo Gordon - Secretary; Mrs. Ann Holloway - Minute Secretary - Chairman Research and Publication Sub-committee; Mrs. Ann Davis - Vice President - Bulletin Editor; Mrs. Helen Livesy - Research Officer and Treasurer; Mrs. Mary Thurling - Publicity Officer; Mr. Holford Lempriere - Tours Officer; Mr. Dave Chitty - Chairman Historic Buildings Sub-committee and Committee members Messrs Alec Savidge, Keith Burnham, Harry Boyle and Doug Royal.

Museum

The Management of the Museum has now been passed over to Albury City Council. The Council has agreed to be custodian of the collection for which this Society has worked long and hard. Several spirited debates with the Society took place before the final agreement in principle was made. To assist and guide the Council a Local Management Committee of nominated citizens has been appointed. These include all the previous A D H S Museum Sub committee, two other members of the public and two councillors.

Hume & Hovell Commemorative Ceremony was held on 16 November 1984 to celebrate the arrival of the explorers on the banks of the Murray River. Mrs. Boyes gave a talk and presented books to the local schools; also the Society received sketches from Miss Fellowes of the Hovell Tree, and a residence in the Botanic Gardens.

Community Employment Programmes

These programmes were completed this year, and consisted of:

- i) Museum Education Officer
- ii) Albury Aboriginal Historic Research Report, completed and presented to the Society bound copies will be produced
- iii) Library cataloguing of ADHS items, completed
- iv) Photographic record of historic Albury buildings, completed and a public exhibition is now on display
- v) Museum Cataloguer this programme is almost finished, but the extent of the need is considerable and will probably require further additional work.

Other Society Activities

Heritage Week - again another very successful tour of our historic buildings and areas. We toured the central residential and commercial areas, the Botanic gardens, the old Show Grounds and poetry was read at the cemetery. Again the Society presented a plaque to commemorate the efforts of people to conserve historic buildings. The recipient this year was the Albury Campus, C.A.E., for its renovation of a group of buildings in Olive Street. A photographic display was also exhibited at Myers.

Tour of Gundowring Homestead - was undertaken by about 30 members and their families who thoroughly enjoyed the outing.

General meetings - Guest Speakers - again provided a wide variety of topics and generated lively interest. Topics included - Albury's Aboriginal History, Discussion of Museum management and acquisition policy. A special event was the meeting at Thurgoona with the past and present residents who reminisced on the events and characters of historic Thurgoona. Also a slide show of old buildings and places in Albury was presented.

Conclusion

The success of any organisation does not rest with one person, it is a combination of individual efforts. In this regard your Committee has been untiring and I am grateful for all their efforts, and members support. The Society's direction, I believe, for the next year or so is to continue to publish its research reports and documents and to attempt to widen its membership.



Report from the Building Preservation Sub-Committee

by D Chitty.

- 1. Mr Graham Younger has obtained support in principle from the A W D C regarding the construction of a working steam saw mill on the site of the old Sommerville homestead including restoration of the homestead and outbuildings. This project has the blessing of both our Society and the Wodonga Historical Society.
- 2. New information on the old Wodonga Court house indicates that major changes have been carried out on the building sometime between 1920 and 1930 including lowering of the main roof some 8 to 12 feet. The building has a reserve of \$70,000 and was passed in at auction. The old court house is on the corner of High Street and Wodonga Street. The National Trust declined to Classify it.

RESEARCH Helen Livsey wrote to Vonnie Wharton asking for her family memories of Albury and Collendina. Mrs Wharton is a great grand-daughter of Robert Brown, Albury's first businessman. As a child she lived with his daughters who were her great aunts, Fanny and Louie. Mrs Wharton spent the long week-end re-living her childhood and has sent Helen a most loving and vivid collection of incidents and memories. She wrote "I am sure Fanny wanted the history to be known and the family remembered ..." We hope to publish extracts from her letter in future Bulletins.

RESEARCH Hume Weir Mary Thurling has many slides of early stages of the building of the Weir. Alec Savidge has been putting them in order.

Gerry Curtis brought Joe Dempsey to see them. Mr Dempsey started work on the Weir in 1919 when he was 15; the slide show jogged his memory and he told story after story. Alec has been out studying the area (industrial archaeology) and plans to put together a slide show or better still, an audio visual, for showing at meetings.

YACKANDANDAH HISTORICAL SOCIETY has won an important award and a prize of \$500 for best museum in its class in Victoria. The competition was conducted by the Museums Association of Australia (Victorian Branch). The contest, in three sections, drew 80 entries, 50 of which were in category C, limited to museums staffed by volunteers. Yackandandah museum was in this category. Yackandandah Historica Society was started in 1969 with the purchase by town and district people of the one-time Bank of Victoria and a simple timber cottage, used long ago as the manager's residence. The cottage, originally a slab hut, was built about 1858, and the stone bank about 1860 or soon after. The judges congratulated members on the convincing representation of a bank and residence in the gold era, and on their uncluttered furnishing.




ALBURY'S HISTORY

WODONGA COURT HOUSE

The original court house was built in 1856. In 1876-77 there were extensive alterations to the Old Court House and Lock-Up; Lindsay Wheeler, the auctioneer, has the plans of this Police Station. The whole surrounding block was the Police paddock. About 1921, Bill Moulder re-modelled the interior of the Court House by putting in partitions and false ceilings. The original ceilings are still above, for proof, look up in the cupboard.

Copy of a letter from Mrs Vonnie Wharton to Helen Livsey, A & D H S Research Officer.

I would like to refer to the book "The March of Methodism" by Isobel Williams, Chapter II, page 17:

"Mrs W Clark, a grand-daughter of Robert Brown earlier mentioned and his wife Elizabeth, one of the first white women to come to Albury claimed that they began the first services of the Wesleyan Church in the Albury district."

The Robert Brown of this paragraph was not Robert Brown refered to in paragraph 2 on the same page. Robert Brown, the first white man to settle at what was later named Albury, was a Catholic and his wife, whom he married at Appin in 1842, was Ann Crowe of Appin. She, too, was a Catholic and all their children were brought up in that faith.

Apparently there was another Robert Brown in the early days of the Albury district, for I know that Robert and Ann did not have a grand-daughter Mrs W Clark.

PEOPLE OF ALBURY Howard Jones.

A list of 300 residents of Albury in 1857 has been compiled by studying the Border Post files from January to June. Almost every man in the town signed a petition which was printed in the newspaper in full on May 9. Several names of men who did not sign the petition were taken from news items and advertisements. The list, now arranged alphabetically by computer, is believed to contain the names of almost every male adult resident. Women were rarely mentioned in the newspaper, except perhaps as drunks or women who had run away from their husbands. Further work will list the people by occupation. Later it is hoped to record their ethnic origin. Copies of the alphabetical list will soon be in the Local History Room of the Albury Library or may be obtained from Howard Jones for the price of photocopying. Howard's home phone number is 21 6589.



On Sunday 18th August about 50 people took advantage of the opportunity to see and hear the history of these Olive Street churches, both of which are on the Heritage list. In 1977 members of the Methodist, Presbyterian & Congregational Churches became the Uniting Church of Australia.

Mr Graham Stocks was our genial host for the two-hour tour and, as well as telling of the history of the buildings and personalities, he treated us to a short

musical interlude on the organ in each place of worship.

The tour commenced at the Wesley Methodist Church, with the building on the corner of Olive and Swift Streets which now houses the Opportunity Shop. It was built in 1865. In 1875, when the church had only 62 members, the foundation stone of the present church was laid by Rev Flockart. The silver trowel used on that occasion was on display. The building is 55' by 35' with a sloping floor.

The centre aisle pews face west; the side pews are slanted towards the centre so that members of the congregation face the minister. The windows originally had frosted glass, but in the 1930's this was replaced by art deco design mainly in pale green and peach colouring. When some stained glass windows were donated, the art deco ones were carefully stored. If the congregation moves to another church, they can take their windows with them, leaving the building intact.

The Minister's residence, which is now Wesley House, was built in 1906 by

Mr Ernie Sharp, who also built the Town Hall.

The detailed history can be read in "The March of Methodism" written by Isobel Williams, copies of which were for sale during the tour.

The tour continued at St David's Church with Mr Stocks again as guide

and organist.

Presbyterian services were first held in Albury in a building in Townsend Street, next to where the Federal Hotel was in later years. In 1842 Rev Peter Gunn made a missionary tour extending from Melbourne to Albury. He travelled 600 miles in 78 days. In 1851 Rev Ballantyne was the first resident clergyman in Albury – of any denomination.

A church was erected in Smollett Street in 1858, and a hall at the rear in 1885. On the western wide of these buildings was the manse. The Catholic Church bought the area in 1904 for £2250, and the supper room of St Patrick's Hall is all that now remains. The manse was used for some years as the St Vincent de Paul shelter.

St David's was built in 1905 on a former saleyards site. The church with tower and spire cost £2045 and was built by Frew and Logan, whose business premises were diagnally opposite the church site. Internally the church plan is similar to the Wesley Church, in that it has a sloping floor and pews facing towards the minister. S.M. Logan brought five craftsmen from England to build the ceiling. One of these was Mr Thorman, whose descendants are still in the area.

The two-storey manse was erected in 1924, replacing a building to the south

which later became Cleith Private Hospital.

STREET NAMES


The Albury-Wodonga Place Names Committee met on 16th August.
The Thurgoona Industrial Estate will have roads named after pioneer families who have not already been honoured elsewhere. The names have yet to be chosen.
The Committee is to recommend the use of sheep breed names for Thurgoona Park, the housing estate planned north of the Thurgoona Golf Club. Names of Thurgoona pioneer families are being kept in reserve for further developments.

St Hilaire Estate will have names associated with the wine industry,
St Hilaire itself being one of the best known of Thurgoona's former vineyards.
A recreation park at Thurgoona, adjoining Corry's Road, will be called Ian Barker Park
in honour of the late Mr Barker's contribution to sport.

The Committee expressed the hope that all street name derivations should be recorded in a register. Howard Jones has undertaken, on behalf of the Society, to compile one for Albury. As there are more than 600 streets in Albury this will be a huge task.

AUGUST MEETING

It was pleasing to see many visitors and new members when COLIN FRAUENFELDER spoke about LOGANS. Colin has a good knowledge of the firm, having been employed there for forty years.

The business was started in 1898 by Stuart McKenzie Logan and Alec Frew, who set up under a tree in Young Street, where Dalgety's Woolstore now stands,

with an ordinary set of carpenter's tools.

After two years on that site, they moved to the north east corner of Olive and Wilson Streets and erected a shop. In 1904 a circular saw was installed, driven by a motor bicycle, and also a hand power jigsaw. In January 1910 a 10 hp benzine engine was installed and later a 40 hp suction gas engine. About this time the firm was served with a writ claiming damages and the discontinuance of noise caused by the machines. This caused the partners to move their operations to the corner of Swift, Macauley and Spencer Streets in June 1912.

Frew and Logan were often hampered for want of bricks and, in 1907 founded their machine-made brick works at the north end of the old showgrounds (where Scots School is now). In 1928 the brick works moved to the north end of David Street. In 1903 they bought the undertaking business of the late Mr F A Selle,

which was later sold to Lesters.

Frew and Logan were involved in the building of St David's Church, Reis' Model Store, the Union Bank at the corner of Dean and Olive Streets, many large homes in the Upper Murray area, and five houses in Wilson Street, Albury for Mr Alf Selle.

Many interesting photographs were on display showing Logans' premises and staff, and thanks go to the Logan family for their assistance.

1. Mary Thurling answered: "The solid brick, slate-roofed building is the old powder magazine which is at the back of Skills Galore (formerly the North

Eastern Dairy Company building), on the Lincoln Causeway."

It was used to store explosives used in connection with deep lead mining in the North East, and was built after receiving approval from the Wodonga Council on May 29, 1877. The Government Gazette dated 26th April 1878 carried the following: "POWDER MAGAZINE, WODONGA. The Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, under the provisions of the 5th section of the Gunpowder Statute, appointed a building erected on the Customs Reserve at Wodonga, in the rear of the Custom House, to be a Public Magazine for the storage of Gunpowder. Peter Lalor, Commissioner of Trade Department of Trade and Customs, Melbourne. 25th April 1878." and Customs. The Customs House was situated where the Dairy Company building now

We are indebted to Mrs Jean Read for providing information on

this building.

The gentleman from Kiewa Street who had a passion for expensive

American cars was John Cecil Dight MACKAY.

He was a descendant of Capt and Mrs William Mitchell and lived at what is now the Albury High School Principal's residence. He owned a 16 cyl Cadillac which cost £3,000, which he replaced with a 12 cyl costing £4,000. At other times he had a grey single seater Dodge, and a green single seater Cadillac, about a 1929 model.

Information was provided by Mr John Mollison, whose wife is descended

from the Mitchells, and by Mr Ron Braddy, who had lived opposite Mr Mackay.

Ron remembered that whenever it rained, Bill Clark, a cab proprietor who lived in Olive Street, had the duty of driving Mr Mackay to the Albury Club, so that Mr Mackay's car did not get wet.

When the High School took over the Kiewa Street home, Mr Mackay built

the house at 635 Olive Street, which is now the doctors' surgery.

The 1924 Albury Centenary Cake was nine feet high, 6 tiered and 3. weighed 1,000 pounds. It was made by W. Malcolm, caterer and pastrycook of Kiewa Street, Albury (where the Commodore Motel is), and was distributed amongst 6,000 school children, some of whom were at our meeting. The ingredients were 160 pounds sugar (How many dentists were in Albury in 1924?) 150 pounds butter, 230 pounds flour, 360 pounds fruit, 1400 eggs, 200 pounds icing sugar, 80 pounds crushed almonds, 1 gallon wine, and 1 pound spice.

Malcolms also made a cake for the 150th Anniversary of Australia in 1938. It was decorated by Miss Alma Malcolm and was ten feet high, 8 tier,

and weighed 1200 pounds.

Information was provided by Mrs Olga Butt, and many people who were present at the meeting, including Mrs Margaret Cottrell of Mountain Creek who brought along a framed coloured picture of the 1924 cake, showing a miniature Hovell Tree on the top.



THE CHINESE

The latest addition to our archives collection is a Sesquicentenary Publication from the Victorian Government China Advisory Committee.

"The people of Australia 100 years ago were ruled by the moon"

PROFESSOR GEOFFREY BLAINEY told a capacity audience in Albury on September 6. The noted historian was addressing a meeting arranged by the Society and held at the Civic Theatrette.

Moonlight, he explained, very much affected people's movements in the days before proper roads and lighting. Country dances, lectures and long journeys were arranged on the basis that a full moon was the safest time for travelling. Professor Blainey had discovered that even Ned Kelly knew the movements of the moon and planned his famous hold-ups at Euroa and Jerilderie to coincide with brightly-lit nights.

The Professor, the author of many very readable books, clearly believes that history is about people. Instead of speaking in vague terms about "economic conditions" or "social impact", he told us what they put in their bellies, and where they got their food from. The pioneers were great meat-eaters. Beef was popular because the cattle could be driven to the population, for example, on the goldfields. A century ago the average Australian ate twice as much meat as a British worker, and four times as much as a German.

Tea was consumed in great quantities, almost all of it coming from China until late in the 19th century. Ice was obtained from Boston, USA, until a Geelong inventor produced ice artificially. Professor Blainey said he had traced the Australian hot-dog to Ballarat in the 1850's, though tomato sauce wasn's used until much later, as it was so expensive in the early days. Butter came from Ireland.

Gerry Curtis presided at the meeting, and Bruce Pennay moved a vote of thanks to the Professor.

SEPTEMBER MEETING The Elm Court Motel was a truly historic venue and we were made most welcome by Anne and Jack Dempsey.

Our celebrations were not quite so glamorous as those of Oct 2, 1885 when James Higgins, coachbuilder "celebrated the completion of his new building by a ball, to which about seventy couples were invited. Dancing was carried on in the upper room, which was suitably decorated, and a very pleasant time was spent".

The "upper room" is again "suitably decorated"as the home of the Dempsey family and we thank them, and Noel Wighton for inviting us to hold our meeting in their Conference Room. Frank Higgins told of the Higgins coachbuilding family from information supplied to him by Bernard Higgins, son of Ignatius, who carried on the firm from his father James, who died in 1919. It was a lively meeting with a lot of audience participation, particularly in answering

THE PRESIDENT'S QUESTIONS

- The last Town Crier in Albury was Bill Swann, who was a short, thick, swarthy man who came from England and was thought to be an ex-seaman. He wore gold earings, a red and white kerchief around his neck, and a large straw hat.
- 2. The three important things that happened during the First World War, and which affected the standard of living of Albury citizens were:
 - (1) The building of the Hospital in Wodonga Place in 1917,
 (2) Electricity, which was turned on in 1916, and (3) Sewerage.
 Other events of those years were the building in Kiewa Street of the
 Theatre Royal by Blacklocks in 1914. It was also in 1914 that drivers'
 licences became compulsory (Vehicle registrations were introduced in
 1909). In 1916 the present Fire Station was built in Kiewa Street.
 The 1917 flood was a record. Dr Andrews, then aged 71, left Albury for

ALBURY RESIDENTS LISTED IN THE BORDER POST, January-June, 1857.

THIS list was compiled by Howard Jones and Helen Livsey in 1985 after consulting microfilmed files of the Border Post from January-June, 1857.

Most names were included in a petition published in the Post on May 8. This related to the conviction of William Bird Evans, former manager of Mate's store, Albury, on an embezzlement charge. The petitioners sought an inquiry into the case, believing Evans innocent.

Other names were taken from a testimonial to John Maher, a Catholic priest who left Albury in mid-1857. This was printed on June 27.

Names not included in either of these lists were taken from news items or advertisements.

Residents of the Thurgoona/Newtown area are included. Separate lists of residents of Wodonga and adjoining districts, and Holbrook are available.



SAINT MATTHEW'S ANGLICAN CHURCH, Kiewa Street, Albury

Sydney architect, Edmund Blackett designed the church for which the foundation stone was laid in 1857. However Blackett's design was never completed. A portion of "his" church was used from 1859, and at a meeting held in 1872 Mr W.N.M. Edmondson "referred briefly to the example that had been set them by the Roman Catholics of the district, and hoped that every member of the congregation would contribute all in their power towards the erection of a building more suited to the requirements of the district".

The worshippers had rather a long wait for a more suitable church, the foundation stone of which was laid in 1874, and the edifice was dedicated in 1876.

LAST MEETING

Jim Purvey displayed about 30 pieces from his collection of

1857 LIST

The last page of this Bulletin is a continuation of the list published last month of residents of Albury in 1857. The list was compiled by Howard Jones and Helen Livsey from the microfilmed files of the Border Post January to June 1857. It is hoped to publish the remainder of the list in the next issue.

The 125th anniversary of the founding of the Albury Hospital was celebrated in October. The hospital's Annual Report contained a wealth of extracts from board reports and minutes. Some items of interest are

STREET NAMES


The Duke of Edinburgh is due to visit Albury-Wodonga next year. Early in the 1950's, there was a proposal to name two Albury streets "Queen Elizabeth Street" and "Duke of Edinburgh Street". The City Council decided that the former should become Queen Street, while the latter become Randle Crescent, after Mr David Randle, who owned land in the area. The Randles still live in Queen Street, in a house called "Eldnar", which is their name spelled backwards.

A more unusual street name is Milro Avenue, East Albury. This is a hybrid, taken from Mr Tom Miller (Mil-) and the late Mr Fred Roach (-ro) Mrs Shirley Miller tells us that Saunders Avenue was named in honour of her father, Jack. Some members have been finding out about Mrs Elizabeth Mitchell, Lady Franklin, early midwives, Mother Hugh (Sister Mary Hugh), Sister Burt and Miss Acock.

Who was the architect of the War Memorial? Who was the builder? The President asks What other structures were they involved in?

Barbed wire seems to have been an American invention of the 1860s. Last Month's Answers The framed display of barbed wire at the meeting was lent by Sue and Terry Clarkson (friends of Helen Livsey). Wire netting was needed to try and keep out rabbits. And as for <u>corrugated iron</u>, here is a quotation from "Industrial Archaeology in Australia" by J Birmingham, I Jack and D Jeans: "Corrugated iron was imported into Australia in the 1830s and made locally from the 1840s. Galvanising a coating of zinc - was added to reduce the rate of rusting, and the industry was well established in Sydney and Melbourne by the 1860s."

Mylons Motorways was started in Wodonga by Patrick (Paddy) Mylon in 1906. Last Meeting The family business was carried on by his son Jack and grandson Bernie. Together Jack & Bernie had compiled a History of the firm which Bernie read to the November meeting and then Jack commented and answered guestions. His father, Paddy, started with two cabs each carrying 8 passengers. He always had two horses to each cab. After work, the horses were turned out, there was more grass in Wodonga when there were only 500 people! The journey between Albury & Wodonga took 20 minutes, the fare was 6d until 1917 when it rose to 1/=. The Weir brought the change, by 1922 it was under construction and Mylons changed to motor buses to serve the townships of Mitta Junction in Victoria and Hume Weir, N S W. Later their buses served Bonegilla Migrant Camp and the Army in World War II. They served the Woollen Mills in Schubach Street where 3 shifts worked from 6 am to 10 pm. As well, they ran special trips to Dances, Race Meetings and Picnics. Jack gave descriptions of the cars and buses used, Chevs, Dodges, Ford, Studebaker etc, details of which may be found in the History which they have given to the Society for the Local History Room of the Albury City Library.

SAINT MATTHEW'S ANGLICAN CHURCH, Kiewa Street, Albury.

Bishop William Grant Broughton came to Albury on 1st February 1850 to meet Bishop Perry of Melbourne to plan with him the establishment of the Parish of Albury. These two bishops called a public meeting which was attended by the principal inhabitants on each side of the river. Later that year the Rev. Henry Elliot came to Albury as its first resident minister.

Services were held in homes, on the banks of the river, in public halls and sometimes in the old Customs House.

In the year 1855 a meeting was called to plan for the building of St Matthew's Church. The response was great and by the end of the year over £1600 had been given or promised. By November of that year plans were considered and decided upon. Tenders were advertised and accepted. On 24th July 1857 the foundation stone was laid. The Church was built from voluntary subscriptions.

The parish of Albury was 200 miles long and 70 miles wide. Population of the parish at the time was 3000 persons.

The Rev Henry Elliot died in April 1858 and is buried in the old Albury Cemetery.

The old Church was opened for worship on the 13th March 1859. It was designed by Edmund T Blackett, the tender price was £2317. The new Church was designed by Mr Boles of Sydney. The tender of Frew and Co was accepted, the cost was approximately £6000. The foundation stone was laid by T H Mate on 20th March 1874.

The Church was dedicated on 13th January 1876 by Dean Macartney of Melbourne.

Today's value is far more than \$100,000!

The pipe organ, specially built for the Church at a cost of £700, was installed in 1876.

The panelling behind the altar, the pandelling and doorway at the entrance and also the font were designed, manufactured and installed by Gerry Curtis.

HISTORIC BUILDING PRESERVATION

No major demolition of historic or locally important buildings has occurred during 1985 with the exception of the area demolished for the new K Mart.

Buildings identified as being on the danger list are the Albury Club building and the old butcher's shop in David Street.

A proposal to restore the old customs house powder magazine near the Lincoln Causeway has been planned but needs permission from the Dairy Company before starting the actual restoration. It is intended that this be a joint Albury and Wodonga project.

Restoration and development of the "Carriage Way" building in Smollett Street has commenced and it is to be converted into accommodation and offices.

A number of private restorations of residences have been completed in the Albury area during 1985 and it would appear that, other than in the central commercial area, the trend is towards restoration rather than demolition.

The first llkm of the 450km Hume and Hovell Walking Track through N S W were Officially Opened by the Minister for Natural Resources, Mrs Janice Crosio. This lady from Sydney dropped down by helicopter for a country walk in her high heeled shoes. Other M.P.s hitched a ride to the dinner in Albury that evening. Bush Bandicoots Band played cheerfully. Speakers held their notes firmly so as to remember who to commend. Spectators sat amiably under a great tree admiring the handiwork of Crown Lands and C E P staff. Henry Angel's descendants were important - a grand-daughter, great grandson and great great grand-daughter. The latter had attended an Angel function at Albury - "the one arranged by Lady Boyes ..."

he Henry Angel campsite has been well placed near the Tumbarumba/Tooma road allowing for a 6.5km walk upstream and a 5.5km walk south along Burra Creek. There is an excellent leaflet with a map and history of H & H and of the settlers and the goldfield. Gradually more sections of Track will be prepared and will link up by 1988 so that ardent walkers may spend 20 days exploring from Gunning to Albury.
