A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

The following items are gleaned from the pages of "The Albury Banner" of March, 1862, the paper then being in its second year. At that time it comprised but four pages, and was published twice weekly.

March 1st issue reports the colony to be plunged into mourning, for intelligence had just arrived by the mail boat of the death of Prince Albert on December 14, 1861, at Windsor.

S. F. Blackmore advertises he is in practice as a solicitor in Dean Street. (Blackmore was Albury's first town clerk, and was also founder of "The Banner".)

Dr. J. Knight Barnett, surgeon, has his residence in Kiewa Street, where he performs vaccination against small-pox, every Monday.

The Wodonga Steam Flour and Saw Mills, conducted by Pyke and Dumbrell, quotes the price of flour at £12 per ton and sawn timber 20s. per 100 feet.

A new store is advertised for letting in Albury by John Roper (in turn explorer, Albury's first clerk of Petty Sessions, magistrate and mayor).

J. Walker Jones is managing the Bank of N.S.W., where "gold is purchased and advanced upon".

Robert Thompson has his saddlery in Kiewa Street (next Fallon's Store), and has a large stock of hogskin and buckskin saddles, also kangaroo stock-whips.

John Peard begs to inform the inhabitants of Albury that he intends to commence business as blacksmith and horse-shoer.

The extent of vine-growing in the district may be gauged from an advertisement inviting splitters to supply 28,000 stakes deliverable at the Barnawartha Vineyard.

Notification is given of a bank holiday. "Notice—On Monday next, the 17th inst., being St. Patrick's Day, will be observed as a holiday at the Banks."

At the foot of the column a position is vacant. "Wanted, a strong lad, to go messages and to cut chaff. Apply at the office of this paper."

A stir is caused in the little old town by news of a gold-rush to the Lachlan Diggings. J. Montgomery announces that his six-horse waggon will pass through Albury on Saturday, 8th inst., for the Lacklan Diggings, and has room for passengers and swags.

In a report of the Albury Police Court it is stated that Samuel Martin was summoned by Daniel Driscoll, lessee of the Albury Bridge toll bar, for crossing the river with cattle with intent to evade the toll payable on the bridge.

Some news trickles through from the diggings. A correspondent from the Lachlan, writing to a friend says: "We can get gold by the shovelfuls", and there is no doubt whatsoever that, although there is much exaggeration around this, the Lachlan is undoubtedly one of the richest goldfields in N.S.W. Many farmers round Albury have taken their produce to this market and been well repaid for their trouble.

Speakers:

The Society's speaker for March was Mr. J. J. Wright, who chose for his subject "Pioneering Days". As the descendant of a family or early settlers at Clear Springs, on the Upper Murray, Mr. Wright was able to draw from a storehouse of reminiscences and give a most interesting account of day-to-day life on a pastoral holding nearly a hundred years ago.

Speaker for this month is to be Mr. T. W. Mitchell, M.L.A., of Towong Hill, Corryong. The subject of his address will be "The History of Skiing in Australia", and place of meeting is the Albury Town Hall, on Monday, April 9, at 8 p.m.

Excursion:

Arrangements are being finalised for the excursion to Beechworth on Sunday, April 8. The bus leaves Union Road at 9.30 a.m. and travels via Mate, North, Young and Dean Streets, picking up as required; and to leave from Mate's Corner, Dean Street, at 10 a.m.

Intending passengers are requested to contact the Secretary (2802). The fare is 10/-, school children 5/-, payable in advance.

Please Note: As the Victorian regulations prohibit the entry of fruit into that State, passengers are advised to take no fruit of any kind on this occasion.

As there is also a ban on pig-meats, it would be well to remember this when making sandwiches.

Historical Exhibition:

An area 20 ft. x 14 ft. in the south-west corner of Farmers and Graziers' (No. 5 site) has been allotted our Society for exhibiting items of historical interest, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 3, 4 and 5.

Are you willing to send your name to the Secretary, Box 223 (or 'phone 2802) as being available for supervising exhibits for, say, two hours any day or each day? The Exhibition is open from 10 a.m. till 10 p.m. We intend to encourage members of the public who view our stand to become financial members (10/-per annum).

Equipment

Very suitable glass show-cases, 12 ft. x 2 ft., have been made over to the Society by the Albury City Council for exhibition purposes. This ensures the safety of valuable items which do not admit of handling and can be locked away.

Life Members:

Two new Life Members were welcomed at our last General Meeting, they being Mr. and Mrs. P. D. Burrows, bringing the number to twelve. Not only are individual life memberships (7 guineas) encouraged, but also those from business firms, clubs and other organisations.

Old Court House:

The National Trust of Australia has shown further interest in the preservation of the century-old Albury Court House. When referring recently to our application to the Trust for a classification which would ensure the preservation of this building, the Trust informed us of communications with the Minister of Justice with a view to the future use of the building. We have every reason to feel we have the likelihood of success in our venture.

Correspondence:

F.H.—The cradle commonly used by early gold-diggers was a wooden box about 3 ft. in length and 20 in. in width. It had a movable hopper and slide, and was fixed on two rockers. When in use it was placed on a sloping bank near the water supply.

Mrs. F.D. (Wodonga).—The writer of *The Life of Edward John Eyre* was not Hamilton Hume the explorer, as is generally believed, but by a Londoner of the same name. The

book was published in 1867.

J.McK. — Australia's first newspaper was *The Sydney Gazette and New South Wales Advertiser*, beginning March 5, 1803. The publisher and printer was George Howe, a convict. Howe was in 1800 sentenced to seven years' transportation to N.S.W., and on arrival in the colony was appointed government printer.

APRIL — 1861

Whilst in April, 1861, the Public Hospital, the Union Bridge and other important institutions were nearing completion, the townspeople were still awaiting the erection of larger schools, as the following item in *The Banner* indicates—

NATIONAL SCHOOL:

"We were in hopes that ere this some beginning would have been made in the erection of the National School; as it is, however, through the dilatoriness of the Board in Sydney, things remain at a standstill, notwithstanding the repeated appeals of the local patrons. . . . Here are a large number of children cooped up in a small room, and the teachers put to the greatest inconvenience. The land and a large sum of money have been lying idle for some twelve months past; surely, it is time that we reap some benefit from it. The school is in a flourishing condition, the teachers give great satisfaction to the parents and the patrons, and all that is wanted is a little activity on the part of the National Board."

At this time efforts were also being made to establish a proposed National School at Newtown. In this case, prospects were more encouraging, and the opinion was held that if a suitable teacher could be obtained the school would have the patronage of all the residents in the neighbourhood.

Because of the need for national schools locally it appears that private schools were thriving concerns. One advertises—

"Vineyard House, Albury: Academy for Young Ladies, conducted by Mrs. Edwards, assisted by a competent governess."

As well as the regular course of instruction the following extras were available: French, Piano, Singing, Painting and Drawing, Harp, Washing.

The town's leading auctioneer, John Solomon (also an alderman of the Municipal Council), called readers' attention to a number of forthcoming auctions—

"All that parcel of land at the corner of Townsend and Smollett Streets, having erected thereon a two-storey stone building and now in the occupation of the Commercial Banking Company, and leased for a term of four years to run."

Richard Swete was then manager. The site of this building is now occupied by the Gloucester Hotel.

Also up for sale was the Albury Brewery, opposite the "Fanny Ceres" Mill, in Dean Street; and "a team of twelve working bullocks, together with draw, bows, yokes".

The Commercial Hotel, in Swift Street, is offered for sale. "Righ in the heart of Albury 15 rooms, bar, stabling, &c., &c."

Even then Gerogery had its local industry. Robert Gregson advertises: "Lime! — Lime at the Gerogery Kilns, 2s. bushel; delivered to Albury, 3s. cash on delivery."

Mount Pleasant Hotel, Sydney Road, advertises its goods, accommodation and stabling. The proprietor at that time was A. S. Curtis. This house of yester-year is still in use as a residence, and formerly was a changing place for coach-horses.

The most exciting news of the month was the rising of the diggers against the Chinese at Lambing Flat. At a "great monster meeting" 1500 people were present, when the angry miners aired their grievances and demanded legislation to exclude the Celestials from gold-fields.

So serious were the outbreaks of violence that a military detachment of artillery and mounted troopers was hastily sent from Sydney. Barracks were set up and trenches dug, and it was many days before the Government saw reason to withdraw this protective force.

Speakers:

The Society's speaker for April was Mr. T. W. Mitchell, M.L.A., of Towong Hill, Corryong. From the word "go" Mr. Mitchell captured us with his easy eloquence and very evident enthusiasm for a sport, followers of which, we were told, formed the first Ski Club in the world — the Kiandra Snow-shoe Club, in 1870.

The speaker for May will be Mr. A. Laidlaw, who during recent months has exchanged the beauty of Beechworth for residence in Albury. His subject will be "The Chinese Graves in Beechworth Cemetery"; and the place of meeting will be the Albury Town Hall, on Monday, May 14, at 8 p.m.

Excursion to Beechworth:

Favoured by good weather and an almost embarrassing roll-call, our Coach Captain, Mr. Cunningham, was ready to leave Mate's Corner right on time. Thanks to our President and Mr. Laidlaw, accommodation was made available in their cars for some of our patrons. Only one of our party paid the penalty to the fruit-fly inspector.

Even well before leaving Wodonga, Mr. Laidlaw gave us some facets of local history, which we hope all our members will eventually hear. One item which might surprise readers is that in its heyday—the early 'seventies—Beechworth was the thriving centre from which a branch, say, of the Bank of New South Wales could come to Albury. Beechworth then had nearly twice our present population.

Undulating pastoral properties with sleek fat cattle flanked our route until tapering vistas to our right, the Chiltern Valley, and to our left, sun-splayed Yackandandah, revealed the choice pastures of our sister State.

Rocky outcrops of granite and a change of vegetation, notably the native pines, heralded the approach to Beechworth.

The tree-lined streets made favourable first impressions as our company from across the Murray, at cruising speed, slipped past the massive turreted walls of the century-old gaol to halt in front of the imposing Shire Hall and Council Chambers.

Here we were welcomed by Mr. R. C. Harvey and his daughter, while we prepared for our feast of history, combined with the pleasant asides of a happy picnic party.

Right away Mr. Harvey introduced us to the basement of what was started as a Town Hall, but because of lack of finance was completed as a Municipal Court House with three lock-up cells with a communicating stairway to the floor above. We filed into the very cell where Ned Kelly, as a lad of 16, awaited his sentence of six months in 1870.

Mr. B. T. Beard became associate guide, philosopher and friend for the afternoon tour, but even lunch was all but

forgotten when the Burke Memorial Museum became our rendezvous. It would be of no use trying to describe the very valuable items of interest in this spacious edifice. There could be at least fifty bound volumes of newspapers, they alone being a veritable mine of history. Period costumes from Europe and the East, gold-miners' licence papers, native weapons, mineral specimens, all, and more, formed the highlight of the day.

Then lunch in the pleasant setting of the Town Hall Gardens, where Sequoisias, Atlas Cedars and Bunya Pines took us back to the seventies when Baron von Mueller, of world fame in botany, presented these now stately trees to Beechworth.

The Chinese section of the Beechworth Cemetery, with its twin ceremonial burning towers was next visited, after which the Golden Horseshoes monument claimed our attention. At Ingram's Rock, Mr. Harvey recounted the last free days of Ned Kelly, while we gazed down the wide panorama of Reid's and Woolshed Creeks, whose surrounding hills echoed to blasts from Joe Byrne's shot-gun that killed Aaron Sherritt, his one-time boon companion.

The school (where in his earlier years Sir Isaac Isaacs taught) and the various churches were passed on our way to the old Ovens District Hospital, the facade of which was the cynosure of all eyes.

Lake Sambell, with its amazing tail-race through solid rock, to be followed later by a tunnel half a mile long under the town, was declared to be one of the greatest engineering feats in Australia.

Indeed, in all, a pretty full day! So after thanking our generous guide, our President announced that after a short break for afternoon tea, we would head back through Yackandandah to Albury.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

The following items of interest have been gleaned from the pages of *The Albury Banner*, printed May, 1862—

Albury Municipal Council.—At the usual meeting on Wednesday evening there was no quorum, only Aldermen Miller, Mills, Middleton and Solomon being present. No business was therefore transacted and the meeting adjourned.

Wanted in Albury.—A great want exists in Albury which could surely be easily supplied — namely, for a speculative coach-builder to take up his residence amongst us and commence a business which would well and amply repay him. Numerous persons keep buggies and vehicles, and many more would do so if they could, but whenever a trifling or serious matter of repair arises necessity compels it to be sent to Beechworth or Chiltern to the great inconvenience and additional expense of those who plead guilty to the charge of respectability in keeping a gig. Will no one avail himself of the opportunity to make a certain fortune?

PRODUCTS OF ALBURY.—As a specimen of what may be done in horticulture in Albury, we may mention that there is now in the garden of Mr. J. Roper, the Mayor, an orange tree, only four years old, and which now has on it upwards of three hundred oranges.

Even before that, there is no reason why, say, Townsend Street could not be explored by a party of enthusiasts, some Saturday or Sunday afternoon, with one of our members familiar with the locality to be our cicerone for the occasion. The writer had such an experience in Sydney with the well-known late C. H. Bertie as guide, around Macquarie Place, Bridge Street and its environs. Our motto should be "Know your city", and the corollary will be imperative: "Erect tablets".

Postscript:

Thanks to the good offices of our local Postmaster, the P.M.G. Department (Sydney) has approved of transmission of

our Bulletin as an educational publication at a reduced postage rate. This makes it possible to reach farther out and so widen the scope of our Society.

Correspondence:

G.H.A. (Wodonga).—The name of the township was changed from Wodonga to Belvoir in 1861 by the Victorian Government, and for a period the town and parish had been so designated in all Government documents. To the unofficial world, however, the place had remained simply "Wodonga" and the name of Belvoir did not become generally known or used. Because of public taste no doubt, the name was again altered, and in 1874 the town once more became Wodonga, the allocation being announced in the Victorian Government Gazette.

The Melbourne Age on June 18 printed The Albury Banner (June 1862) extract concerning the Old Burial Ground in South Albury, which appeared in our Bulletin of last month. This free public lecture is one of a series on Australian literature, sponsored by the Commonwealth Literary Fund.

A Gracious Gesture

For those of us who know our worthy Treasurer, Mrs. R. H. McDonald, it was not surprising that, when confronted last month with an unusual clash of dates, Mrs. McDonald postponed her paper on the Wool Industry, with special reference to Younghusband Ltd., to allow our members to hear Dr. Colin Roderick address a public gathering on "The Literature of Convict Life".

This distinguished scholar was delivering a series of lectures on Australian Literature, sponsored by the Commonwealth Literary Fund. A Fellow of the Royal Australian Historical Society, his lecture entailed deep research into source material, and it was a fitting climax at the conclusion of the address to have our President, at the request of the Mayor, pass a vote of thanks to the lecturer.

Our Excursion:

At this August meeting the date most suitable in late September for our Walla Walla excursion will be determined. The fare will be 10/— as previously, but there will be need to procure a ticket as soon as possible, because of the limited number of 'bus seats. You might remember that our departure

to Beechworth was fraught with unnecessary indecision as to the personnel of the party. This time a full 'bus will be aimed at, and no alternate transport is contemplated. Tickets will be procurable at this August lecture.

Federation:

This might be called an age of Federations, or Unions, among people in all walks of life.

Well, Historical Societies, feeling this same urge, and with the lead expressed in a letter (quoted in our July *Bulletin*) from the President of the Richmond River Historical Society, intend doing something in this matter.

With this in mind, our President, Mr. A. J. Allan, suggested that, while at the present a State-wide Federation of country Historical Societies might be premature, it would be a move in the right direction for the southern societies to form some such bond. In this matter the Murray Valley societies, including Wangaratta, could join with our sister societies of Wagga, Deniliquin and Junee, and draw up, say, a list of alternate centres where annual conferences could be held.

We would like to hear the views of other societies on this matter.

Gifts :

Mrs. R. A. Smith (Vice-President) has on several occasions added materially to our Society's archives. Just recently, through her representation, came the "History of the Country Women's Association, Riverina Group", from Mrs. D. B. Ashcroft, Henty.

From Mr. F. C. Griffith, "Toonallook" Station: A written biography of his father.

From Miss Ella Barnes (member): A number of old photographs of local interest.

Turk's Head Hotel:

Those of our Society who read in *The Border Morning Mail* of 27th July, of the offer made by the Historic Buildings Advisory Panel, to give free architectural advice on buildings erected before 1901, felt that, in the foreseeable future, we could well have an historical museum rivalling any in the State.

Let me quote from our first Annual Report, 11th December, 1961—

"We close the year with a membership of over one hundred and a substantial bank balance. There is a tremendous amount of work still to be done . . . our Folk Museum is still a long way off . . ." Well, we might have come that "long way" at last. Here is an opportunity for our City Council to go the whole way in aiding tourism very substantially. Even the State could be a partner to this project.

At the very gateway to the premier State of the Common-wealth, what better introduction, or *adieur*, could send the motored millions on their way than this Turk's Head Folk Museum?

Little Beechworth, with its magnificent Bourke Museum, receives Shire and State subsidies.

An appeal could be made to those genuinely interested in this project, to give support to our President's and Secretary's suggestion that the former hotel would be a "most appropriate home for the Society".

"Bank Notes" :

This is the magazine title of the Commonwealth Bank Golden Jubilee brochure.

We congratulate this institution on its valuable fifty years of service to Australia, and recall that its first governor, Sir Denison Miller, K.C.M.G., was a pupil at the Fairy Meadow Public School, just north of Wollongong.

Riverine University:

All cultural bodies will applaud the efforts of the Riverine University League, under the presidency of Dr. W. A. Merrylees, of Carrathool, to promote interest in their project—that of establishing a University in this area.

Our Society's membership of the M.V.D.L. is a practical step in this direction, because of the high priority this League gives this ambition.

Other Societies:

Royal Australian Historical Society: At the Jubilee Congress of the Australian and New Zealand Association for the Advancement of Science at Sydney University, August 20-24, Section "E" of the Congress is devoted to History.

Professor R. M. Crawford will speak at History House on "George Arnold Wood", a one-time leading member of the R.A.H.S.

There is mention of an interesting publication entitled "Historic Sydney: Where to Go and What to See", produced by the Tourist Bureau of N.S.W.

Riverina: Birthplace of the Modern Australian Novel

The important influence on Australian literature devolving from southern N.S.W. and north-east Victoria was discussed by Dr. Colin Roderick in a talk with "The Mail".

Dealing with sources of literature in this part of the world, Dr. Roderick said that the Monaro was the setting of the first important novel in Australian literature—"Geoffrey Hamlyn", written in 1859 by Henry Kingsley, a brother of the famous Charles Kingsley. This was the first time that the Australian scene anywhere fell naturally into place as a setting for an Australian novel. It marked the beginning of the pastoral novel in Australia. The background of that novel came from the high country between Bogong and Omeo.

It was followed soon after by William Howitt's "Tallangetta", a rare novel of station life in the border country.

The pastoral novel came to the forefront in 1903 with "Such is Life", by Joseph Furphy, one of the Shepparton family, who wrote under the name of Tom Collins. This novel ranges over the Riverina from Echuca to Yass, and is the first important novel of the 20th century in Australia. It smells of the Riverina and makes the Riverina the birthplace of the modern novel in Australia, said Dr. Roderick.

In 1928 came "Up the Country", by Miles Franklin, a woman writer belonging to the Franklin-Lampe clan that settled first on Talbingo and Wambrook, and who wrote at this time under the name of Brent of Bin Bin. This story dealt with the settlement and pioneering of the high plains in the 1840s, and succeeding novels brought the story up to our own times.

"All these novels are splendid works that ought to be familiar to all students and their parents in the district", said Dr. Roderick. "But all these novels bear the stamp of mood and tone that was first set by the convict writers of the first sixty years after the foundation of Australia.

"Minor writers of the border country who are important are E. O. Schlunke, with his short stories, like 'The Man in the Silo'; David Campbell, with his bucolic poems like 'Jack Spring'. Moreover, the district has provided the subject for one of the best Australian dramas, 'Ned Kelly', by Douglas Stewart.

"Among factual writers Elyne Mitchell, with her 'Australia's Alps', has shown modern descriptive writers the way to weave the beauty and the poetry of life into topographical writing," said Dr. Roderick,

Albury Show Supplement of "Border Morning Mail"

In its Show Supplement (September 11), *The Border Morning Mail* printed an interesting article dealing with Robert Brown, who built the first slab hut at Albury in 1838. Brown is described as the founder of Albury and as a pioneer of the Albury and Murray River Agricultural and Horticultural Show Society, founded on March 3, 1857.

100 Years Ago

The following items of interest have been extracted from the columns of *The Albury Banner* of October, 1862—

Young Australia

We would give a hint to the police to give a look-out for certain fast young "nuggets" who congregate nightly, after dark, by Babbington's corner in Kiewa-street. We have received more than one complaint from neighbours and passers-by of the sayings and doings of the young rascals who meet there, and, with most offensive conversation and larking, annoy respectable folk. A night in the "black-hole" and a lecture next morning might prove of salutary effect by way of suppressing the growing nuisance.

CRICKET

We remind our readers and friends of the old game that a meeting is to be held this afternoon at the Rose Inn, to further advance the popularity and well-being of the "Border Club". We hope to see it established on a basis which shall do honour to the district, be a means of turning out some good cricketers, and provide a most healthy and most interesting amusement.

MORE BUGGY ACCIDENTS

Our list of killed and wounded under the above heading this week amount to two. On Sunday the dog-cart of the Mayor, Mr. Roper, was run away with by its equine appendage, which took a sudden flit homewards, and, on making his way to the stable, brought the vehicle into contact with the posts and snapped the shafts. On Wednesday afternoon the Police Inspector, Mr. Blight, went out in all the respectability of a gig, but soon returned with all the mortification of a thorough break-down. Such is the buggy experience of every-day life.

FLOUR FOR THE LACHLAN

Twenty bullock teams laden with flour, principally from Messrs. Dale and Co., millers, Wangaratta, crossed at Albury this week for the Lachlan diggings.

The tenders for the building of the Institute, under the amended plans and specifications, reduced to meet the circumstances of the Institute and the funds at the disposal of the committee, were opened on Wednesday evening.

NEW POSTMASTER

Mr. G. L. Coleman, who has been appointed to relieve Mr. Edmondson as local postmaster, has arrived and commenced his duties this week. We do not hear anything yet of the post-office which was promised to be built.

To the late appeal on behalf of the Lancashire operatives Albury responded at once and liberally, and now, we observe that another claim for sympathy comes forward in favour of the distress known to be existing in the west and south of Ireland. Speakers for 1963

Our Tallangatta member, Mr. A. E. Ried, has received an assurance from Messrs. Ronan and Lee that we can look forward to an address on the history of Tallangatta early next year.

Mr. D. M. Whittaker, who is at present compiling a history of Wangaratta, is mentioned in a similar capacity.

The Turk's Head Hotel

At next General Meeting (12th Nov.) our President, Mr. A. J. Allan, will submit a report on an inspection of the old Turk's Head Hotel, on the west of the Hume Highway, approaching the new bridge over the Murray. An interesting discussion is sure to ensue.

The Court House Pump

Correspondence from the Sheriff's Officer of Albury, Mr. M. A. Shaddock, will add considerably to the history of Albury's early water supply. We hope, eventually, to be able to piece together the definite place the Court House well had in this regard.

Wagga Wagga Historical Society

The Secretary of the newly formed Wagga Wagga Historical Society graciously invited representatives from our Society to their first General Meeting. A copy of their Newsletter gave proof of the fact that our nearest northern city has launched a strong Historical Society, with which we can envisage joint and reciprocal excursions. Our past-President, Mr. W. Bloomfield, is an active member.

A Suggestion

At our last Executive Meeting, Mr. O. Schilg, whose voice is often raised in the interest of preserving our flora and fauna, invited discussion on the possibility of requesting the Civic Authorities to establish a miniature Zoological Park in Albury for Australian native animals. Your opinion is canvassed in this matter.

Royal Australian Historical Society Newsletter

In its October issue interesting questions and answers discuss: "How and when was the Nepean River named?"; "Old Government Houses in Sydney and Parramatta"; and "The 'Admiral' of Osborne College".

It would appear that a Miss V. Gibbins took over, in 1923, a large disused last-century building in the Blue Mountains, near Blackheath.

It was unique in that, as the Osborne Ladies' College, it had the atmosphere and practique of a naval college. The girls, from six to sixteen, wore navy blue uniforms with gold-plated buttons. Seniors were lieutenant and lieut.-commanders, while juniors were simply "middies". Miss Gibbins was the "Admiral" with her next in line—"Commander". Saluting was formal practice.

The various rooms were named Sirius, Sydney, Sussex, Revenge, and, for good measure, the huge St. Bernard dog was "Nelson". Flags, bells and room inspection completed the facsimile.

Rural University

Various cities, towns and rural areas of Northern Victoria and Southern N.S.W. are urging their respective Governments in their efforts, through the Riverine University League, to have established a Rural University. At the present juncture it would appear that it will be a far cry until some crusader of the cause convinces a landholder, of substance and magnanimity, to bequeath to posterity a suitable site for such a venture. That is the story of the New England University at Armidale.

Thurgoona Public School Centenary

Our Society, through our President, received an invitation to be represented at the Thurgoona Public School celebrations, at the present school, on Saturday, 27th October. Our President and Mrs. Allan, Mr. and Mrs. W. Fielder (the latter being an ex-pupil of the school), Mr. and Mrs. P. Burrows, and Br. O'Malley attended this pleasant function.

Mr. Fred Heath, who was chairman of the Organising Executive, was ably assisted by his brother, Mr. Harry Heath, a member of the N.S.W. Public Service Board. Both these gentlemen are ex-scholars of Thurgoona.

Mr. Simon Kaitler, 90, and Mrs. Ellen Maxwell, 84 (formerly Miss Ellen Hill), were the oldest ex-pupils present among the four hundred at the gathering.

Mr. A. Fitzpatrick, the present teacher, received the commemorative plaque and a clock, presented, on behalf of the pupils, by Graham Knobel, a fourth-generation pupil.

A dance and social in the adjacent School of Arts Hall concluded a memorable day.

Walla Walla Excursion

Favoured by fine weather, our 'bus left Mate's corner as scheduled with somewhat fewer than a full complement.

Proceeding through Lavington, we were reminded that its original name, Black Range, came from its surrounding range of hills, where settlement began with the discovery of gold in the late 1850s.

Our party were soon made aware of improved grading and straightening of the road through the Jindera Gap and, with Mr. E. A. Paech as official guide, we sensed the glint of eyes, not unlike that of the 56 Lutherans who in November, 1868, first glimpsed their "Promised Land" as did Moses of old.

Some hundred yards off the Walla Road we halted at the oldest existing house still used as a dwelling, the near century old home of Johann Gottfried Scholz.

Next "Brae Springs" welcomed us, originally the homestead of Thomas Hodges Mate (founder of Mate's Ltd.), who was an early selector. We are very appreciative of the kindty reception of our party by Mr. and Mrs. R. Bethune, who pointed out a Morgan hide-out in the honeycombed outcrop north of the homestead. An inspection of the grounds and original site made us conscious of the fact that its present occupants are well aware of its historic associations.

The township of Walla Walla loomed up, after traversing some mile of delightfully lush pastures in spring growth. The

well-cared-for homes, with their array of flower-beds, first attracted our attention, and before long Messrs. R. Kotzur, L. Wenke, D. Klemke, G. Barber and K. Jacob joined Mr. Paech in a big welcome to a thriving and most homely township.

Our itinerary arranged that we proceed to Morgan's Look-out, one of the many hideouts of Dan Morgan—the Riverina's only bushranger.

But we were to be favoured with a short visit to St. Paul's Lutheran College (opened 1948), where the Headmaster, Mr. Schultz, outlined the history of the College.

Lunch was enjoyed amid surroundings which provided the young, and not-so-young, with the setting to emulate New Zealand's Hillary. I'm certain Morgan would have thought twice before negotiating the rickety ladder and handrail up to his look-out.

After doing justice to our hampers, and having enjoyed the superb panorama, we got underway, our next stop being the huge "Walla Park" wool-shed. This was the original Walla Walla sheep station on the Billabong owned by Dr. Stitt. This station gave the pioneers' Ebenezer, the present name of Walla Walla (plenty water).

We next inspected the second Lutheran Church (built 1889), and then the very capacious present church (1924), where we signed the Visitors' Book.

The early school buildings proved interesting, then the first country power-house in N.S.W. (1915), a chaff-milling plant, at its peak in 1945, and then, what to us was the most interesting of all, Edward Heppner's waggon factory, whose forerunner, C. J. Wiesner, a blacksmith, built the first stripper in Australia at Walla Walla.

Well, it was a delight to roam around this spacious foundry and waggon factory. If a siren sounded, the men would be able to man the forges—the tongs and quenching-drums were ready. The rims lay at hand to be applied, red hot, to the sprays of spokes so firmly fixed in the solid hubs. Anvils could resound again, if weighty hammers could be wielded. It was all so Rip-Van-Winkle-ish.

And now, finally to "Sunnyside", on the Wenke estate, near the gum-tree, where the pioneers spent their first night, we gathered. On this spot now, a slab, rough-hewn, carries the plaque: "The first Lutherans to settle in this District arrived at this site, January, 1869."

Photographs in the lengthening shadows of the sentinel gums, followed words of farewell, and our happy party turned, via Gerogery, our heads for home.

Programme for 1963

Names have been recorded of several persons who are likely to be our monthly speakers in the coming year.

Our President has intimated that the Society's recommendation on the old Turk's Head Hotel would be made to the City Council, say, in February. This would be an opportunity for Mr. Schilg's suggestion regarding a Zoological Park to be also heard.

Mr. P. D. Burrows has proposed to the incoming Executive that a certain field of research be allotted to each of our members so that the important work of compiling items of historical interest be further stimulated.

Biographies (including family histories), our schools, churches, neighbouring townships, could be on this list. Properties, hotels, business houses, streets—all have stories waiting to be told.

Cemeteries, newspapers, a possible selection of documents from the old police station, letter-books from the Pastures Protection Board would await those with an urge to carry out worthwhile research.

It will be noted that members unable to attend the Society's monthly meetings would still feel that they were performing an important function in this way.

Regional Conference

It is with regret we record the passing of one of our foundation members, in the person of Mrs. A. G. Colquhoun. The Society extends its sincere sympathy to Mr. Colquhoun and relatives in their bereavement.

A Museum Piece

Mrs. Gertrude Murray, an old resident, has kindly presented the Society with an old-time Tennis Racquet of a most interesting type. It is in splendid condition and, as the donor used it in her girlhood days, it could be quite seventy years old.

On Aboriginal Affairs

Booklets and brochures from "Aboriginal Affairs", c/o Post Office, Parkville, N2, Victoria, containing a wealth of bibliography, etc., are now in the care of our Secretary.

A carefully compiled and authoritative paper by Professor Geddes, of Sydney, on "Maori and Aborigine", is printed in full, and is available to our members.

A schools' edition on "Aboriginal Affairs", under a tactful heading, "Terms to Avoid", proposes Aborigines (with a capital "A") which can be respectfully used alongside Maoris, Papuans, Eskimos and so on.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

In the gold-rush years, when reports of rich strikes were an almost daily occurrence, Albury found its population diminishing at a most alarming rate. In order to stem the drift the fathers of the "border city" established a fund which guaranteed a handsome reward to the first fossicker who discovered payable gold in this locality. In his leading article of 6th December, 1862, the editor of the *Albury Banner* wrote encouragingly—

"ANOTHER ATTEMPT

"Albury, not to be beaten, is about to make another essay, having for its object the development of a payable Gold Field within its boundaries, or, in its immediate neighbourhood. As time passes by, so experiences gained in other places still

points, like a finger-post, to the ranges about the Border City and the flats in the township, as quartz-bearing, and auriferous. Not a single practical miner looks at the bearings and the indications without at once expressing the most favourable opinions as to results, if only properly looked after and tested. At other places energy is shown, money is spent, trouble is taken to develop far less likely indications, and yet Albury is satisfied with leaving all to fortune or to fate. No one will say but that a Gold Field would be the making of Albury, and yet we talk about it and leave it to the next generation to bring it to light . . .

"It is not enough that we can just rub on, pay our way, talk of nothing but vines, and sheep and fat cattle, wool and boiling-down. We know that there is gold in the ground at our feet, and we must have it out. . . . Who would not throw up his hat into the air if Albury Diggings were a fact, rejoicing in a Koh-i-Noor Flat at Mungabareena, or a Golden Valley at Thurgoona? . . . and so we call attention to the meeting to be held on Monday evening. Let Albury then make a new start; and, let us find our own field. . . . What should be done is, for a fund to be raised, which need not be a large one, to purchase the necessary apparatus. Give us this, with proper scientific knowledge and experience of the manual working, which is easily obtainable, and then a small weekly outlay cannot fail, before a very short time to produce the desired result."

NOTE.—In this year of 1962 it is interesting to reflect that while Albury safely survived the "golden plague", many of the boom towns of a century ago are to-day rated as places of slight importance.

A GOOD CRUSHING

We learn that 76 tons of stone have lately been raised at the Rose Reef, at Madman's Gully, close to Beechworth, and produced 97 oz. 10 dwts. 12 grs. This is something like a show, but there is no reason why some of the ranges around Albury should not produce quite as good results.

More of Boring

By the *Lachland Observer* we see it stated that "over the river, two boring machines are engaged sinking on the supposed line of the lead". Add this to the others on "this side of the river", and we cannot fail to conclude that the Lachlanites are more ready to adopt means which Albury is only just beginning to think about, and to bring into operation. However, better late than never.
