A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

(Gleaned from issues of The Albury Banner of March, 1866)

Our Orchards.—Kentish and Devonshire men would look with pleasure upon our apple orchards in Albury this year; and, although we fancy we can make good wine from our vineyards, we should not be surprised if Albury cider is heard of some day. It used to be stated that the old-fashioned Ribston pippin could not be grown to perfection out of the wealds of Kent and the hursts of Sussex. An excellent crop of this variety has been grown in Mr. Watzelhan's orchard, but even these have been surpassed by Mr. Pankhurst, of Mullengandra, whose fruit trees are worth travelling 17 miles to see.

The Colony.—Seventy-eight years since, when Captain Phillip pitched his tents on the borders of the Tank Stream, the live stock of the colony consisted of one bull, four cows, one bull calf, one stallion, three mares and three colts, with a few sheep, goats and pigs. The population consisted of 757 convicts (of whom 150 were women), and about 200 troops. From this very unpromising beginning the colony has grown into a large dependency, with a population of 400,000.

North as hon. secretary.

Members of the Victorian branch of the National Trust of Australia who plan to arrive in Albury on April 14 will be received by the Historical Society that evening in the C.W.A. rooms. During the reception the guests will be shown slides of buildings and other features of bygone Albury.

As the evening will conclude with supper, our lady members are kindly requested to bring a plate.

On the following morning a short tour will be made of the city and surrounding areas to enable the visitors to view buildings of historical or architectural interest. Our senior Vice-President, Capt. Phil Heywood, of old "Hawksview", will be guide to the party.

Important Change of Date

Ordinarily our next meeting would be taking place in the Town Hall on Monday, April 11. However, as Easter Monday falls on that date and the Town Hall will be closed, the committee has decided to hold the meeting on Tuesday, April 12, in the Turk's Head building, and we feel sure that many of the members will welcome this opportunity of inspecting the building which is to house the Society's Folk Museum. As it is important that the exhibits be displayed to their best advantage, members are requested to inspect the various rooms and make any suggestions which might be helpful in this direction.

An assurance is given that the spacious meeting-room for Tuesday next is well lit and has a sufficiency of comfortable seating. Perhaps it should be explained that, because of its distance from the city's centre, the Society has no plans to use the Turk's Head as its regular meeting-place.

The Story of Mohonga and Urangeline

In response to a recent request, our member Mr. C. C. Hazelwood addressed the students of Woodstock Girls' School. His talk on the history of Mohonga and Urangeline Stations, interwoven with the story of pioneer Robert Rand, was well received by the young people and teachers alike. Moving In

Turk's Head building for possible future use.

The Riverina Boundary

Following is a delineation of the Riverina as appearing in

The N.S.W. Gazetter of 1866-

"Riverina is the name given to a vast territory forming the West part of N.S.W., and comprising the whole of that part of it from the Western boundary, eastward, to an irregular line drawn from the Northern boundary in a Southerly direction along the Culgoa river, and the Bogan river, as far as Bullock creek, thence in a Southerly direction across the Lachlan river to the Cowal lake, thence along the Narraburra creek and Houlahan's creek to the Murrumbidgee river, a few miles West of Wagga Wagga, thence in a nearly straight line to a point lying halfway between Albury and Howlong."

The Glory that was Greece

At our last General Meeting members had the pleasure of a talk by Mrs. N. Buckmaster. Her address on Ancient Greece, illustrated with a specially fine collection of colour slides, was quite unlike any we have ever had before.

The bright description given by Mrs. Buckmaster of her exploration of the ruins of what were once stately buildings of wonderful architecture and ornamentation, was a story which must have impressed everyone present. Some reference was made to the excavations which had been carried out by parties of British and German archæologists.

To latter-day historions of our kind, whose thoughts dwell fondly on buildings ranging from wattle-and-dab to those made of stone fetched from Table Top quarries, it did perhaps seen a strain on the imagination to realise we may still see buildings which were once gazed at even by Herodotus, the "father of history".

At the conclusion of this very informative talk some of our members must have found within themselves a finer appreciation of the arts and crafts and the wisdom of Ancient Greece—the cradle of our Western civilisation.

As it had not been possible to arrange for a speaker at our last General Meeting, we were fortunate in having Mr. Des Martin (Wodonga) with us on this occasion. An impromptu talk by him on the last night of Melbourne's old Tivoli Theatre filled the gap nicely.

As Mr. Martin saw it, the Tivoli Theatre as a place of "live shows" was the heart of Melbourne's entertainment, and with its closing has gone the theatre-goers' last source of real enjoyment.

Describing the theatre's last night, Mr. Martin stated the feeling was that the arrangements fell flat and it was especially disappointing that little attention was paid to the many old-time artists in the audience, most of whom had at some time or other endeared themselves to the public.

As a patron of "The Tiv" over a long period Mr. Martin recalled happier times when its packed houses were entertained by such celebrities as George Wallace, Roy Rene ("Mo"), Tommy Trinder, Sophie Tucker, Jim Gerald, Joy Nichols and latterly Jimmy Edwards. He well remembered the early appearances of Bob Dyer, who had arrived from U.S.A. in the late 1930s.

Victorian Visitors

The meeting of Albury historians with visiting members of the Victorian branch of the National Trust of Australia proved to be a pleasant gathering in every way, the tourists expressing their appreciation of the varied programme which had been arranged for the occasion.

Previous to coming across the border the party had spent the day on a rambling tour through the North-eastern District inspecting places of historical and architectural interest. Leader of the party was Mr. Colin Angus, of El Dorado. In the evening there was a large attendance of our members at a social held in the C.W.A. rooms to receive the tourists. By way of entertainment there was a showing of slides of old buildings and other features of local historical interest, Mr. John Henwood giving the commentary. A talk of much interest to the visitors was given by Mr. Claud Hazelwood, who told the history of Mohonga and Urangeline Stations and screened some rare old photographs befitting his subject.

Before their departure next day the visitors were taken

on a conducted tour of Albury and its environs.

Leaving Albury Hotel, the visitors journeyed by bus to the "Turk's Head", viewing the old Bank of N.S.W. in Townsend Street *en route*. In the role of leader, Captain Phil Heywood described each place of interest as it came into view until reaching the Hovell Tree, where Mr. P. D. Burrows used the microphone in giving a quick chat on Albury's beginning. He told of Robert Brown building the first store and said the site is marked by a plaque at Noreuil Park. He referred also to the overland journey of Lady Franklin, and the location of the river wharf was pointed out.

Proceeding along Dean Street, Captain Heywood resumed his travel-talk in passing the Court House, old Mechanics' Institute, Civic Square and public buildings. In Olive Street the party paused to take a close-up look at the dwelling which long ago was occupied by Police Magistrate Thomas Alexander Browne,

alias Rolf Boldrewood.

Farther along the route Newtown Orphanage was viewed from the bus, as the tight schedule did not allow of a visit to the institute itself. A halt was made at Thurgoona Hall for

morning tea.

On the road to Hume Weir, Captain Heywood directed the party's attention to several points of interest; but unfortunately for want of time a stop could not be made at his "Hawksview" estate. The visitors were impressed with the magnitude of the Hume Weir construction and the reservoir, and especially with the views of distant mountains.

A return to Albury via the aerodrome road completed the outing. Mr. Colin Angus (secretary of the North-east Historical Society) expressed appreciation of the efforts of our Society, while Mrs. Hazelwood said that we of Albury found much pleasure in the visit from members of the National Trust and all looked forward to further visits.

VERY LIKE A WHALE.—A short time since the bullock-driver belonging to one of the snagging parties a short distance above Tocumwal was swimming across the Murray at night, when his foot was seized by a large cod-fish, which nearly pulled him under the water, and from which he had much difficulty in extricating himself. His foot was badly torn by the teeth of the fish.

Great Wedding.—Nearly all Albury assisted to celebrate a wedding on Tuesday last (May 8), when the marriage knot was tied between Barbara, eldest daughter of Mr. Henry Rau, and George, the son of Mr. Reis, both old-established, well-known, and much respected members of the German population. Mr. Rau was one of the earliest pioneers of vine-growing locally, and by steady industry and perseverance has raised himself both in public and general esteem, now filling the office of one of the Aldermen of the Municipality. Open house was kept on the occasion day and night, when the greatest extent of liberality was displayed. The inhabitants and friends came to the dinner and ball by tens and twenties until they amounted to hundreds, and the sun was high over the hills before the party broke up. We understand that nothing less than three hogsheads of Albury wine sufficed to do honour to the occasion and to help drink health and happiness to the young bride and bridegroom on this important event in their career.

NATIONAL SCHOOL, BLACK RANGE.—This school was examined during the week by J. McCredie, Esq., Inspector of Schools for the district, and master of the Model School, Albury. At the close of the examination Mr. McCredie expressed himself highly gratified at the progress made in the school since his last visit. He remarked that the discipline of the school was satisfactory; that the classes were much improved in general scholarship and also in mental knowledge; and concluded by complimenting Mr. Swindlehurst on his success as a beginner in teaching "the young idea", and hoped the same would mark his further career as a teacher in connection with the National Board.

Passed On

Most recent of Australian poets to join the choir invisible is Edward (Ted) Harrington, who was born at Shepparton seventy years ago. As a boy he attended the Wanalta State School, but like so many others of his class he received his real education at the "University of Hard Knocks". During World War One he served with the 4th Light Horse in Palestine. Although he had resided at Swan Hill for some time, much of his earlier life was spent knocking about Australia, and the Albury district was not unknown to him.

Harrington's poems and ballads were distinctively Australian, and as such were well received. His first book, Songs of War and Peace, published in 1920, was followed in 1936 by Boundary Bend and Other Ballads, and The Kerrigan Boys in 1944. My Old Black Billy and other of his Australian bush songs were set to music in 1940 by Allan and Co. He was an original member of the famous Bread and Cheese Club, of Melbourne.

Great South Railway.—The Government has accepted the tender of Messrs. Larkin and Wakeford, who made the lowest offer for cash, for laying the ballasting and permanent-way of that portion of the Great Southern line of railway lying between Fitzroy Iron Mines and the termination of No. 6 contract, near Marulan, being a length of 31 miles and 6 chains. The whole of the permanent-way on the southern extension Picton to Goulburn is now let, as the contract for No. 7 section (in the hands of Mr. Faviel) includes ballasting and permanent-way, as well as formation.

Venture of Faith

In a paper prepared by Mrs. C. C. Hazelwood and read by her at the last month's meeting, a large attendance of members and friends were told the remarkable story of the Hermannsburg Mission Station, in the Northern Territory.

In an endeavour to redeem the tribes of natives in that region an expedition of Lutheran missioners set out from Bethany (S.A.) by horse-waggon in 1875, intent on making Central Australia their destination. Since there were no railways or made roads in the outback at that time, the journey was a daring one, to say the least. In their trek towards the proposed settlement the missioners' spirit and powers of endurance were to be tested to the limit, for they were to experience many unforseen hardships and setbacks. Blistering summer winds and blinding duststorms, scarcity of water and fodder, and break-downs in their vehicles were some of the things which tended to make the journey a wearying one. Added to their troubles was the problem of finding pastures en route for the herds of cattle and sheep being taken to the Fink River settlement. At times, however, they were fortunate in receiving help from settlers in the sparsely populated areas through which they travelled.

Eventually in 1877 the long-drawn-out journey came to an end and for their faith and courage the weary travellers were rewarded by reaching the promised land. That the venture of these pioneering missioners was a success is now to be seen at the Hermannsburg Mission Station, where there are places of worship, schools, hospitals, dwellings and a system of agriculture for the betterment of the previous owners of this rich land now in our possession.

A series of fine colour photos screened by Mr. Hazelwood gave abundant evidence of what has been achieved at the Mission Station and surrounding area.

One of the Old School

The 16th of July marks the centenary of the birth of William James Wye, remembered by many as one of the last of the bush poets. He was born at Beechworth and was well known in the north-eastern and border districts.

In his time he had wandered far and wide throughout Australia following various callings — gold-mining, droving, horse-breaking, dingo-trapping — but all the while he was a poet and writer. His contributions regularly appeared in the Sydney "Bulletin" and other newspapers, and he received high praise for his two books of verse: "Souvenirs of the Sunny South" (1915) and "Bush Minstrelsy" (1941).

Although both these publications are now hard to come-by, the Albury Historical Society recently had the good fortune to receive a copy of the last-named as a gift from Mrs. Margaret Johnson, of Stanley, (Vic.).

Like the late Edward Harrington (mentioned in last issue), Billy Wye was a fellow of the Bread and Cheese Club, of Melbourne, and had also served overseas with the first A.I.F.

He made many friends in Albury, where he spent his declining years in residence at the Wanderers' Club. He died on 9th October, 1952, and was buried at Albury.

The River Traffic.—The Murray this winter affords but little attraction to traffic. It is now not three feet above summer level at Albury, and is at present falling. The smallest of the river steamers could not get up beyond Wahgunyah; and we cannot expect, unless under very extraordinary circumstances, a high river this year. There is much less snow than usual out on the Kiandra and Snowy ranges, so that floods or water bank-high are both out of the question.

The new Albury steam vessel, "Cumberoona", is reported to be ready for service or as nearly so as to make her trial trip. She is complete with a few exceptions, as regards decoration, and probably will be seen at Wahgunyah in the next week or ten days.

Between Gundagai and Albury the works in progress are clearing at Tarcutta, forming at Umutbee, metalling at Kyamba Hill, and culverting from Mullengandra to Woomargama, and the general repairs of all the bridges in the district.

Something Like A Reef.—Beechworth residents are quite jubilant, and not without cause, respecting some quartz raised from a depth of 20 feet at Twist's Creek, near Yackandandah, and which is expected to go 1,000 ounces to the ton. It is spoken of as a perfect "wall of gold". We would like to see a few such walls on this side of the border.

Last Month's Speaker

One of the Society's newest members, Mr. H. B. Barnes, entertained a good attendance of members and visitors at the July general meeting. An old soldier, Mr. Barnes related his experiences in World Wars I and II, in both of which he served as a signaller.

In speaking of the part played by Australian troops in the Dardanelles campaign, he gave a detailed account of the landing at Gallipoli and of the desperate fight to gain a footing on the peninsula. That the Turks were well aware of the pending attack was shown by the "warm" reception extended to all allied troops on that early dawn of April the 25th, 1915. Apart from the effective coastal defences of the enemy, the rugged nature of the terrain added greatly to the difficulties of the attacking forces and hindered advancement. Eventually came the evacuation. But this was not the end of the war for the men of Anzac. as they fought on for three years more in the Middle East and on the battle fronts of Europe.

On his second venture into soldiering Mr. Barnes, like so many others at the time, had the misfortune to be captured and held for four years in a Japanese prison camp in Malaya. He told his listeners of the many hardships suffered by the 14,000 people in captivity, and stated that it was mainly due to the spirit of comradeship which prevailed within the camp that so many were able to bear-up and survive.

On his arrival at Albury it was Mr. Barnes's pleasure to renew acquaintance with Mr. John Roxburgh, an old friend who had shared with him the long term as prisoner-of-war.

A bright feature of Mr. Barnes's address was the account of his re-visit to Gallipoli with an official party last year on the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of Anzac. In a screening of colour slides of memorials and war cemeteries of allied soldiers it was pleasing to observe that all are being well cared for by the Turkish people.

In 1964 Mr. Barnes was invited to appear as commentator for the B.B.C.'s television series for "Anzac Episode". This was part of the B.B.C.'s Great War series made for national purposes, which has also been shown in Australia.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

CAUTION.—We understand that the police of Albury have instructions to summon at once all parties having carts and drays without names, &c., painted thereon in letters of certain dimensions. Many a forty shillings may be saved by attending to this at once.

New Steamer Snagged.—The new steamer Cumberoona, which left Echuca on Thursday afternoon (July 26) for Wahgunyah and Albury with Mr. McCulloch and Mr. Higinbotham among her passengers, struck a snag when she had gone about 150 miles, and sank. Information of the occurrence reached Echuca on the 29th, one of the crew having made his way down with a note from Captain Mace to his agents there. The forward cabin and one side of the deck are above water, but the saloon aft has about three feet of water in it. The Government snag-boat was to proceed from Echuca on Monday to raise the sunken vessel. The occurrence took place near Yelima Station (McLaurin's).

New Gold-field Regulations.—In the new regulations which have been approved by the Executive Council, the following Rules as applying to a Miner's Right are given:—Alluvial Claims: Each person holding a miner's right shall be entitled to 1,600 square feet of alluvial ground, and such claim shall be marked off in a rectangular form, the sides of which shall be in proportion to the number of claim holders, that is to say: For one miner, 40 ft. x 40 ft.; for two miners, 40 ft. x 80 ft.; for three miners, 60 ft. x 80 ft.; for four miners, 80 ft. x 80 ft.

MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.—At the annual meeting of this Institution a report was brought up, unfortunately showing the names of but few subscribers, and stating that the Government subsidy of 1865 having been lost, nothing had been done in the way of pushing the claims of the Institute or of creating the beginning of a library; but hoping to be able to do better in the future. Mr. Alpen promised a concert within a month in aid of the library, which we shall gladly see make a beginning.

MURRAY STEAMER.—We learn that the little vessel *The Pride* of the Murray has been specially chartered with a small cargo of goods for T. H. Mate & Co., and may be expected at the wharf by Monday next. She will be the pilot of a larger fleet without doubt.

Little Old Bridge

Since the recent report that it becomes due for replacement within a few years, quite a lot of attention has been directed towards the small arched bridge in Smollett Street which spans the Bungambrawartha Creek.

Whilst the Country Roads Board claims that the march of progress makes such change needful, it also recognises that the old bridge is one of rare type and worthy of preservation for posterity. Because of the outstanding beauty of the structure and its association with Albury's past, the Historical Society views this suggestion with much favour and could no doubt easily select a suitable spot to which it might be transferred.

An arched bridge is not only one of the most classic forms of bridge but also one of the strongest. The principle of the arch is that the weight is carried down each side the curve to support the piers. Compared with a photograph of 70 years ago, the appearance of the sturdy little bridge seems to have changed not one iota in all that time; and it is easy to accept the statement of Albury City Council's engineer (Mr. J. Sarvaas) that its upkeep has never been of great account.

The bridge dates from July of 1887, when the contractor, F. Romero, began operations after the work had been set out by Mr. Bowyer-Smyth, the Government Superintendent of Roads. The contractor's responsibility included the masonry and construction, but the bridge itself, which is of iron, was supplied by the Government.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

(Gleaned from issues of The Albury Banner for September, 1866)

Albury's Fire Brigade.—Albury has had a great immunity from fire for some years, but it might come upon us suddenly, and then there will be no end of jeering at the Fire Brigade, which in times of security no one will assist or support. We still have a good engine going to decay; we have the elements of a Brigade; but if those who are most concerned do not care to help to carry it on they must not expect others to do all the work for them. It is recorded that Emperor Nero played the fiddle while Rome was burning. Is anyone in Albury in a position to do the same if he saw his store, shop, hotel or private dwelling-house in flames Insurance may cover the actual loss in bricks, mortar, or stock, but there is a good deal behind this which no insurance will cover to the honest man.

RAILWAY FROM ECHUCA TO DENILIQUIN.—We learn that Messrs. Jones, Roberts and Alexander have been delegated to proceed to Sydney, to give evidence before a Parliamentary commission on the proposed scheme of railway extension from Echuca to Deniliquin. The Deniliquin people appear to be more alive to their interests than are the Albury people.

MINING AT LAVINGTON.—The Melbourne proprietors of the Lavington crushing machine are courting business. There is no stuff being brought up to the mill, and they therefore notify that they are ready to make reduction in prices, commensurate with the golden results. If the stone should turn out under 15 dwts. to the ton at 10s., and if over at 15s. per ton in quantities of not less than 150 tons.

The "Cumberoona".—Our Albury steamer has made her second trip upstream, and this time with more success. She arrived all safely and rightly on Wednesday morning about 11 o'clock, and as soon as possible discharged cargo. She was an object of attention all day, and a few minutes before six o'clock in the evening turned her head round and went away in good style with several passengers, including some of her owners. The river is nearly bank high and running fast, so that she ought to make a good run down to Wahgunyah at not less than 20 knots an hour. She is expected back again immediately with more loading, as it is evident she must make hay while the sun shines.

Water Scheme.—According to the Ovens and Murray Advertiser, the Victorian Government has decided—as a first instalment of the scheme for supplying the Ovens with water—upon purchasing Lake Kerferd from the Beechworth Borough Council, and also the works of the Ovens Gold-fields Water Company. Should this report prove to be correct the burgesses of Beechworth will have ample cause for rejoicing, as will also the shareholders in the above-named company; but it is feared the news is too good to be true. No better plan could be suggested for providing this portion of the district with a plentiful supply of water—seeing that the Little River scheme is impracticable—than the purchase of these two undertakings, and carrying them out to the extent originally contemplated.

A Book to Enjoy

James Hackston's recently published Father Clears Out is a book of short stories with such local colouring that it is certain to have strong appeal for many of Albury's and Lavington's older residents—and probably not a few of the younger ones. The author, who spent his boyhood days of the 1890s at what was then the Black Range, tells true-to-life tales of the time befitting that old gold-mining town which by then had had its day.

Whilst the identity of most of the characters who light-up these stories is so thinly veiled as to be easily guessed, the author himself has for a long time remained hidden beneath the penname of "James Hackston". Perhaps the greatest surprise of all for the reader is when he (or she) learns who the writer really is.

The illustrations are by one who does use his true name—Hal Gye, whose enchanting kewpie-like figures are found adorning *The Sentimental Bloke* and other of C. J. Dennis's books of verse.

Father Clears Out, which has an enlightening foreword by Douglas Stewart, is published by Angus and Robertson, and should be available at local booksellers.

The address and showing of colour movies presented by Mr. J. J. Wright (member) deservedly attracted a large attendof members and visitors. Through his association with the Royal Over Seas League in London, Mr. Wright said he always found it possible to arrange a very satisfactory tour of Great Britain and was able to visit many places not taken in by the ordinary run of tours.

As a result of his attendance at a reception in St. James's Palace he was able to describe to his audience the magnificence of the interior of the immense and ancient building, which he explained, is the residence of the ruling sovereign. The Queen Mother, who was principal guest on the occasion, held a reception in the throne-room and moved freely amongst those present.

Another place of great interest described by Mr. Wright was Westminster Palace, meeting place of the British Parliament

since 1537.

Also included in the travel-talk was Glastonbury in Somerset, where the first Christian church in England is believed to have been built by Joseph of Arimathea, who arrived from ancient Phoenicia with the navigators who traded along the south coast of England. Glastonbury in earlier times was known as the Isle of Avon, and, according to legend, Jesus as a boy was taken there and cared for until ready to fulfill his mission.

Many other places historically important in England and Scotland were visited by Mr. Wright, all of which were interest-

ingly described and shown on the screen in colour.

THE MURRAY.—We have had further rains during the early part of the week, with a good thunderstorm, which are now showing their effects on the river, and it has now consequently risen fast, the waters being well up the bank and fully 12 feet above summer level. There is much water to come down, and any steamer may safely come up.

The River Steamers.—A steamer named the Victoria has made her first trip up so high as Albury, arriving on Saturday afternoon and discharging on Monday. She brought a general cargo of goods from Echuca. On Tuesday the Albury steamer, Cumberoona, put in another appearance with a very heavy cargo, which was at once landed, stored and bonded; and, under the steersmanship of Capt. Mace, she returned on Wednesday for more loading, hoping to make another trip in a week.

The Burrumbuttock Road.—A good deal of agitation has been going on lately in respect to the dangerous condition of the road from Albury to Burrumbuttock by way of Lester's Gap, where a few hundreds of pounds being spent would save travellers going far out of their way to a better road. There are many free settlers on the road, and they want to send their produce to town, and squatters want to sell their wool, &c., but the road is so bad it is hardly passable, and not at all for half the year. So bad is the state of the road that persons have actually to leave it altogether and strike off to the Howlong road 12 miles away, and come thence to Albury, so that they travel in fact from 20 to 25 miles to accomplish a journey of only seven miles.

THE KILLERS.—The most extensive slaughter of kangaroos which has ever been recorded in Victoria took place recently on the station of Mr. Whitehead, near Caramut. About 120 gentlemen and a few ladies (!) assembled at 10 a.m., and commenced to drive the kangaroos towards a large enclosed space beforehand. In the course of the day over 3000 were killed.

Visit of Rutherglen Historical Society Members

The recent visit to Albury by members of the Rutherglen Historical Society was most successful, there being a good attendance and a day of glorious sunshine.

Following a welcome to the guests by our Vice-President, Mr. Alan Mitchell, an inspection was made of the Turk's Head Museum and some of the relics stored there. Secretary of the Albury Society, Mr. W. Fielder, then gave a short talk on the history of the old building, which for a long period had functioned as one of the town's principal hotels.

The party then adjourned to the Botanic Gardens, where a picnic lunch was taken in very pleasant surroundings. Features of historical interest here were the Hamilton Hume memorial and the tall "Lone Pine" which originated from a cone brought back from Gallipoli fifty years ago.

Later from the site of the Soldiers' Memorial on Western Hill the visitors had a panoramic view of our city with its close surround of hills and mountain ranges in the distance.

Mr. Ralph Ellis (member), who as a boy had lived on his father's holding west of Albury, gave an interesting description of the sparsely settled area as he remembered it. Pointing out the Black Ranges and Nail-can Hill, he stated there had been rich finds of gold in both places in bygone times.

A descent of the hill brought the party to the Hovell Tree and the site of Albury's earliest settlement. Within this area are many points of historic interest, several of which were referred to by Mr. Fielder. Taking Captain Hovell's tree as a starting point, he said that a companion tree near-by had been blazed by Hamilton Hume but later carelessly destroyed. A description was given of the river's discovery and of its safe crossing four days later some miles up-stream. Close by the Hovell Tree, Robert Brown built the village's first store and later the Hume Inn a little to the east.

It was also at this spot that Lady Jane Franklin forded the river whilst on her overland journey to Sydney in 1839. The camp site of her party of dray-men and other attendants was pointed out to the gathering of historians, who were also interested to hear a record of Lady Franklin's description of Albury at that early period, when there were but two habitations: that of Robert Brown and a police station built of stringy-bark.

Some details were also given of the arrival in 1855 of the first river boat, the *Albury*, captained by George Bain Johnson.

The party was then taken on a tour in and around the city viewing the first Bank of N.S.W., the National School (1861), Court House, Rolf Boldrewood's home and others points of interest. During a short stop at the Albury Grammar School,

Mr. P. Burrows as an old pupil briefly told the story of the school and its development into one of the largest of its kind in the country.

The tour ended with a return to the Museum building, where the lady members served afternoon tea. Prior to the departure of our guests, Mr. Brian Jasper and Mr. D. Shepard expressed thanks to members of our Society for their friendly reception and arrangement of an interesting tour.

A Fish Story

Our speaker of last month, Mr. Arthur Roy, was in fine form and delivered his talk on "Trout Fishing in the Mountains" in a most entertaining manner. As well as a large attendance of members, there were also some visitors who obviously were devotees of the piscatorial art.

As a follower of the healthful and fascinating sport for many years, Mr. Roy dealt with his subject in all its phases. Speaking historically, he stated that although Brown Trout were introduced into Tasmania as early as 1864 and were acclimatised in Victoria soon after, it was not until the year 1888 that they were first liberated in the streams of N.S.W.

In Victoria and N.S.W. there are now several hatcheries which specialise in the breeding of Trout. As soon as the fry have attained a desired size they are sent off to stock selected streams, the usual method of transport being in large drums of water of the right temperature and having provision for replenishing the oxygen.

The two species of the fish which have been successfully acclimatised in N.S.W. and Victoria are the Brown Trout and the Rainbow Trout. The first-named is of European origin and prefers the deep still waters in which to move slowly as it feeds on insects floating on the water's surface. The Rainbow variety, which is a native of North America, differs from the Brown Trout in that it likes the swift-running rocky streams where it can dart about snapping the insects as they pass by.

One of the essentials of success in this kind of fishing is a close study of the feeding places and habits of both species. Such knowledge can be gained only by a long experience coupled with information picked-up from old-hands at the game.

Through his own knowledge of the mountain tracks and whereabouts of suitable streams Mr. Roy was able to give valued service as a guide to Government fisheries officers who journed to the mountain regions for the purpose of releasing fry in the various rivers and creeks.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Roy for a delightfully interesting address, moved by Mr. P. Burrows, was supported by Mr. N. Douglas.

Hovell Tree Gathering

Final arrangements for the celebration to take place at the Hovell Tree on Friday afternoon, November 18, are in hand; and it is hoped the weather clerk will show his usual kindness on this day. Patron of our Society, Ald. C. E. Hume and Hovell Commemoration

This year's gathering at the Explorers' Tree was highly successful, though unfortunately fewer schools were represented because of examinations and sports fixtures during that period. The Society's Vice-President, Capt. P. Heywood, then gave an inspiring address to the students assembled. In paying tribute to the explorers for their courage and determination, the Captain reminded his young listeners that, in the world of to-day, there

is still a need for the pioneering spirit of old.

By the combined efforts of pupils of Woodstock Girls' School and Albury Grammar School, considerable interest was added to the celebration by a representation of the scene which took place on that spot in the November of 1824. In a tableau arranged by the girls of Woodstock the narration was read by Lynette Pollard. Students of the Grammar School who completed the setting were John Broadhurst (Hume), Michael Buss (Hovell), Peter Harris (Boyd), Roger Taylor and Michael Coates (travellers).

Sixth Annual Report of Albury Historical Society — 1966

Ladies and Gentlemen:

A summary of our doings for the past year reveals a financial membership of 146, showing a gain of seven for that period. Life members total 21. The gain of 22 new members has been offset by the oversight of about a dozen members failing to renew their subscriptions. We much regret the death of two of our members: Mr. Edmund Paech and Mr. Ernest McDonald.

Average attendance at the 10 General Meetings was 32.5; and attendance of the 14 Executive members at 11 meetings was as follows: O. Schilg (Pres.) 9, Capt. P. Heywood (Vice-Pres.) 7, A. Mitchell (Vice-Pres.) 6, W. Fielder (Sec.) 11, Mrs. Fielder (Treas.) 0, C. Hazelwood (Min. Sec.) 9, Mrs. Hazelwood 6, J. Wright 11, P. Burrows 6, N. Douglas 8, Mrs. R. H. McDonald 10, N. Whitehead 3, Mrs. A. Z. Clark 3, A. Allan 3. After attending one meeting, Mrs. P. Heywood found it necessary to resign on account of other responsibilities.

On invitation from the City Council in January we met the Works Committee to discuss the matter of sharing the prospective Turk's Head Museum with the Sydney Museum of Applied Arts and and Sciences. In July we again met an official from Sydney, who inferred that our Society would be expected to forego its original plans of furnishing a Folk Museum. This was followed in August by a letter from Albury City Council stating that the Sydney Museum authorities would be allotted 80 per cent. of the floor space of the Turk's Head Museum, and our Society 20 per cent. Prior to this, one of our Committeemen, Mr. Douglas, in an effort to "get going", inaugurated a private interest-free loan offer to Albury City Council as an Establishment Account to provide for the appointment of a local caretaker. The sum of \$1200 was subscribed in cash and promises, but Council declined the offer. The result is that we have been waiting a whole year for the "green light", despite the fact that a temporary caretaker in the person of Mr. H. Barnes (a Society member) is in charge. It appears that Council is not prepared to allot us any rooms without direction from the Sydney designer.

Nine members favoured us with addresses during the year. These consisted mainly of travel-talks supported by colour slides and movies. Following are the speakers, who addressed us on various subjects: Mrs. N. Buckmaster, "Ancient Greece"; Mr. Des. Martin, "Last Night of the Old Tivoli Theatre"; Mrs. C. Hazelwood, "The Hermansburg Mission"; Mr. H. Barnes (a veteran of World Wars I and II), "The Gallipoli Campaign, and a Re-visit after 50 Years"; Miss Lucy Staton, "Horticulture and History of the British Isles and the Continent"; Mr. J. J. Wright, who gave two sessions featuring Westminster Palace, a reception at St. James's Palace by the Queen Mother, and places of historical importance in Scotland and southern England; Mr. Arthur Roy, "Trout-fishing in the Mountains 50 Years Ago"; Mr. C. Hazelwood, "A Journey through Western N.S.W., the Gulf Country, Darwin and the Ord River".

Invitations for addresses by our Society members were accepted as follows: Your President, as one of the speakers at the Australia Day gathering by the Harrietville Historical Society; and Mr. C. Hazelwood, on three occasions, when he gave his "History of Urangeline Station" to the Woodstock Girls' School, the Lockhart Rotary Club and the Wagga Wagga Historical Society.

Inter-Society Visitors. — We were favoured by a visit of members of the National Trust of Victoria early in the year, and recently by members of the Rutherglen and Wangaratta Societies.

The annual pilgrimage to the Hovell Tree organised by our Society was most successful, and attended by a fair number of Albury citizens as well as students of several of the primary schools.

Publicity by *The Border Morning Mail*, stations 2AY, 2CO and AMV4 throughout the year was greatly appreciated.

While thanking all members for their continued support, I must say there are some who are deserving of high prase for the great amount of time and labour they have given in the interests of the Society—particularly in connection with the Museum.

In concluding my hasty report in order that it may be included in *The Bulletin* for members' perusal before the Annual Meeting, I hope I will be forgiven for missing out on some matters which time does not permit me to mention.
