Curator of the Albury Botanic Gardens, Mr. Ray Stewart, is to be the speaker at our general meeting at the Turk's Head building, on Monday evening, 10th inst., beginning at 8 o'clock. Mr. Stewart will speak on the "History of Gardening", with some reference to Albury's parks and gardens.

Last Month's Speaker

Guest speaker at the Historical Society's last general meeting, Reverend C. S. Boyall, had an appreciative audience as he related his varying experiences since he was a teacher at the Albury High School in the 1930s.

As a missioner with the Presbyterian Church in India he told of his work during the long period he had spent in that country. Later, following his capture together with others during the second World War, he was in enemy hands for a number of years. Of much interest was his description of life as a civilian prisoner in a Japanese camp.

Mr. Boyall is temporarily filling the vacancy at St. David's Presbyterian Church, Albury, since the departure of Reverend H. Norwood to his new charge at Kerang.

Swan Hill Folk Museum

Lunch was enjoyed aboard the old paddle-wheeler *Gem*, which has been restored and converted into a floating museum. It houses a magnificent display of folk relics of the district's pioneering days.

No less amazing is the outdoor round-up of many old-time implements and machines used in farming and other rural industries, as well as a number of early settlers' buildings brought from up-country and re-erected. Pride of place is given to a slabwalled smithy, which seemingly contains just about everything associated with a craft that is now almost forgotten.

The Wangaratta Hotel, built by the late Mr. James Meldrum at a cost of between $\pounds12,000$ and $\pounds14,000$ —some 15 years ago—was recently sold for the low sum of $\pounds300$.

RIVER NAVIGATION

The Murray steamer *Alfred* is at present undergoing repairs and additions at Echuca, while the *Lady Darling* will be placed on the slip next week and receive a thorough overhaul.

Instructions have been forwarded to Mr. Shelley, superintendent of the clearing operations in the Murray, to resume work which has been suspended so long. This has given general satisfaction at Echuca and surrounding district.

A vessel is now being built at Echuca for Messrs. Smith and Banks, in place of the steamer *Beechworth* which was destroyed by fire some time back. The new steamer will be of the same length as the *Beechworth*, two feet higher, and will have an improved construction stern.

ALBURY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.—At the usual meeting on Wednesday evening (24th inst.), the business was again very slight, and only a bare quorum was made. A financial report was adopted, passing £5 9s. 3d. to Mr. F. O'Sullivan in respect of lighting the town lamps. The Mayor* intimated that it was possible that Albury would shortly receive a visit from the Governor of N.S.W., and, on his motion, seconded by Ald. Henry Rau, a sub-committee, consisting of Aldermen George Mott, Thomas Field, Murphy and the mover, was appointed to prepare an address to be presented to his Excellency on his arrival.

How We Got Our Gardens

The pathway leading from the Garden of Eden to Albury's Botanic Gardens is perhaps a long one. Nevertheless Mr. Ray Steward's listeners were with him all the way as he told the fascinating "History of Gardening" at the meeting of our Society last month.

Mr. Steward, who is curator of Albury's parks and gardens, said that the world's earliest gardens were of an austere nature. Usually they were walled in and consisted of large tracts of ground with woodlands and pastures. So severely simple was the method of cultivation that only trees and plants of a useful kind were grown—some for their shelter and fruit, others for food and medicine. This seems to have been the order more or less until about the end of the Middle Ages, when some of the secluded gardens gave way to an orderly plan and cultivation for a more pleasing effect.

The idea of ornamentally laid-out gardens and parks for public recreation was a long while coming, and it is only within the last two hundred years that serious attention was given to floriculture as we know it today. The ceaseless search by planthunters in many parts of the world, and the application of Mendel's law of hereditary, have been largely responsible for the beauty which has been put into our parks and home gardens.

To illustrate his address Mr. Steward used sets of colour slides to great advantage, showing various examples of landscaping in some of Australia's famous gardens and parks, not forgetting some views of our own beautiful Botanic Gardens.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Steward for a delightfully interesting and informative address moved by Mr. C. C. Hazelwood was ably supported by Mrs. O. Schilg.

Albury's Elm Trees

Albury residents in general were alarmed by a recommendation recently put forward that the time-honoured elm trees fronting Dean Square be uprooted. As there was apparently no good reason for doing so, the suggestion was met by a spate of opposition from all quarters, and it was to the relief of all that the City Council at is last meeting wisely decided that the trees be allowed to remain.

It is, however, much regretted by historians and tree-lovers alike that two of Albury's oldest elms have died as a result of leaking gas underground and must necessarily be removed. These trees, which are situated in Olive Street north, had been planted in 1875 by the late Samuel Mudge, the Town Clerk at that time.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

ARRIVAL OF HIS EXCELLENCY SIR JOHN YOUNG. — Yesterday afternoon (May 3) a number of the townspeople proceeded along the Sydney road to meet the Governor and Mr. Bowie Wilson (Minister for Lands). At the boundary of the municipality His Excellency was met by a large concourse of residents of the town and district, and on receiving an ovation of cheers, was escorted to the Exchange Hotel. His Excellency, accompanied by the Minister for Lands, came to the balcony and thanked those who had shown their loyalty in coming to meet him and welcoming him to Albury. He trusted that his visit would not be in vain, but there was one thing he regretted, and that was that Lady Young did not accompany him. Three cheers were given for His Excellency and Lady Young.

The address from the Municipal and other bodies will be presented to His Excellency this day at the Exchange Hotel, at 4 o'clock. After this business has been got over His Excellency will spend the remainder of the day in visiting the various institutions of the town, and the vineyards &c.

On Sunday morning His Excellency intends returning to Wagga Wagga, from there to Yanko, and from that place *via* Conargo to Deniliquin.

Last Month's Speaker

Mr. John Dallinger, guest speaker at our last meeting, had a very appreciative audience of members and visitors for his illustrated travel-talk, "Around the World in Forty Days". The speedy air service by which he and his fellow-photographers travelled took them to several countries, and well-set plans along the route enabled them to see far more than Jules Verne would have cared to include in his scientific romance, Around the World in Eighty Days.

In two long hops after leaving Australia the party reached Rome, where some time was spent sight-seeing and experiencing the way of life in the ancient city. In quick succession, brief stays were made at other important cities of the Continent and Britain, and it is evident that our young tourist used every opportunity to secure select photographs of buildings famous architecturally or historically and other features of special interest. His colourful pictures of the daily life of the native mhabitants of the various countries he had passed through were of fascinating interest. A certain view of the vineyards in the Rhine Valley reminded one that it was from this region the ancestors of many of Albury's present-day residents came to plant vineyards in this district more than a century ago.



Wagga Wagga's New Museum

In announcing the opening of its Historical Museum, the Wagga Wagga and District Historical Society invites inspection by people visiting their city. The building, situated near the Botanic Gardens on Willans Hill, is a modern one and houses a fine collection of exhibits associated with the agricultural, domestic and cultural life of the district since its early settlement in the eighteen-thirties. A small charge is made for admission; and the days of opening are Thursday, Saturday, Sunday and holidays from 2.00 to 5.00 p.m., and Saturday from 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

Last Month's Speaker

An attentive hearing was accorded Mr. C. C. Hazelwood (the Society's President) in the reading of a specially prepared paper recording the closing chapters of Mohonga station, once the property of Robert Rand.

The eventual division of this large estate into two separate holdings was probably one of the most important chapters in the history of old Mohonga, and an account of the change-over was related in close detail by Mr. Hazelwood as he quoted from the diary of his father, the late Mr. H. Hazelwood, who for a long period had been manager of the Urangeline station.

Of the many trials which had to be faced by a pioneer stockman, there must have been few more testing than a severe drought in an area of low rainfall. Two such calamities were described by our speaker—one in 1907 and another in 1914.

With a pressing need of fodder to carry the huge flocks and herds through the lean period, long distances were travelled up-country for the purpose of securing supplies of hay, chaff and maize, all at rising prices. In the drought year of 1907 the station was able to secure good grass country in the Upper Murray area, where a chain of properties as far up as Walwa were leased to give agistment to 55,000 sheep, besides horses and cattle. Though the Urangeline sheep losses in that year numbered 5,000, this figure compared favourably with the losses on adjoining properties.

Nevertheless there were many bright passages in the story told by Mr. Hazelwood, showing that Urangeline was safe country and had carried on successfully down the years. Its stud of Wanganella sheep was renowned far and wide, and many prizes were won by the pure-breds in the shows of Sydney and Melbourne. Two of the station's finest records were a clip of 1000 bales of wool in 1908, and a crop of Zeeland wheat with the exceptionally high yield of 11 bags per acre.

A vote of thanks to the speaker for the delivery of a talk of extraordinary interest was proposed by Capt. P. Heywood (Vice-Pres.) and ably supported by Mr. R. Ellis.

The Turk's Head Museum

At the Turk's Head Museum building, Mr. D. W. Bolin, a former officer of the Sydney Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences, has been installed as resident caretaker. Following the laying of floor-covering and the completion of other preparatory work, the arrival of show-cases and exhibits are expected from Sydney.

So far as our own Society is concerned, however, it seems we must still mark-time and await a solution to the problem of apportioned floor space. The long delay occasioned in this respect is extremely disappointing, not only to members of the Historical Society and local residents, but also to the many tourists regularly visiting the city.

Passed On

It is with great regret our Society records the demise of Mr. Peter Seaton, who was a foundation member and a frequent attendant at monthly meetings. The Society extends it sincere sympathy to members of his family.



A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

NEW RIVERINE STEAMER.—In order to expedite the delivery to the Melbourne market of the produce of Albury district, the well-built new vessel, the *Jane Eliza*, was despatched from Echuca in an unfinished state, and arrived at Albury on Thursday (22nd) at 9 a.m. This commodious steamer is 104 ft. on her keel and 110 ft. from stem to stern, with 22 ft. beam and 7 ft. depth of hold. The saloon is between decks, and the ladies' cabin is to be built on the upper, or bridge deck, which, for the safety of the children, is well cased in with trellis-work.

PRESEVTERIAN CHURCH.—While this Church is undergoing repairs the congregation will worship in the Court-House. It is proposed to hold a bazaar and "Bruce auction" during November next in aid of the funds to repair the Church and to make additions to the Manse. Last Month's Speaker

Often as they may have previously viewed the Hume Weir, there must have been a number of people at our last meeting who realised for the first time that there was a great deal which they had never seen.

Taking the whole of the Murray River irrigation system as the subject of his address, the guest speaker on this occasion, Mr. H. Davis-Marks, imparted such a wealth of enlightening information that each one of his audience assuredly would have carried away a clearer understanding and greater appreciation of the work of the River Murray Commission.

As resident engineer of the Hume Weir, Mr. Davis-Marks spoke with much detail on this important dam and reservoir, the construction of which began in 1919 and with its completion is now capable of storing 2,500,000 acre-feet of water.

Aided by a series of colour slides, the speaker spot-lighted the several underground passages within the wall, and explained the purposes of the amazing amount of mechanism installed there.

Several maps and charts also were used to good effect by the speaker, while a large collection of photos depicting the weir in its progressive stages were placed on view.

An historic item brought along by Mr. Davis-Marks which drew much attention was the spade used by Sir Ronald Munro-Ferguson in the turning of the first sod of the weir. And as a companion piece to the last-mentioned item, Mr. Joseph Jelbart exhibited some of the same spadeful of soil, which he had formed into a solid tablet.

In tendering thanks to the speaker for a very informative address, Mr. N. Douglas complimented him on the excellence of his photographs and the completeness of the series of pictures.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

(Gleaned from issues of The Albury Banner for September, 1867)

RIVER TRAFFIC.—The *Cumberoona* arrived from Echuca at the Albury wharf on Thursday (5th), and left yesterday morning with twenty passengers and a full cargo of wheat and flour. At Howlong she is to take a barge in tow, laden with wheat for the Melbourne market *via* Echuca railway.

THE NEW CLIP.—The first wool of the season from the Upper Murray was taken down to Echuca from Wahgunyah a few days ago, by the steamer *Cumberoona*.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Levi Parish, formerly of Albury, a chain-maker and blacksmith residing near Mulwala, on the bank of the river, was engaged with his wife cutting wood for the steamers, and lingered until the flood surrounded and reached them. They must have been swept away if Mr. Shelley, the superintendant of the snagging party, had not "cracked on" on the Victorian snagging steamer and rescued them, their horses and effects from a perilous predicament, and landed them on high ground on the Victorian bank of the Murray.

OUR QUARTZ CRUSHING IN DANGER.—Negotiations have been entered into with a Sydney firm to purchase and remove the Lavington crushing machine. It is a shame to the enterprise of the Albury people to allow the prospect of a paying gold-field in the neighbourhood have no chance of being fully proved.

GUNDAGAI BRIDGE.—By proclamation the bridge over the Murrumbidgee is declared a Public Bridge, on which and after the 8th October next the following toll shall be levied: Foot passengers, 2d.; vehicles, 1s.; horses, 6d.; cattle drawing or not drawing, 4d.; sheep, lamb, pig or goat, 1d.

EMPLOYMENT OF PRISON LABOR.—The Committee of the Ovens District Hospital decided at the meeting Tuesday (3rd), on applying to the Sheriff for a gang of prisoners to be employed in clearing away trees and forming roads in the Hospital Reserve.

RAILWAY SERVICE NEEDED.—The question of railway communication between the markets of the coast and the principal centres of the pupulation in Riverina is one of the most vital importance, and it is one on which the people cannot too soon decide on agitating upon a broad and common basis. The separation movement has made but little progress lately, and the Government do not now fear that this is a project that will ever be realised, but the game is far from played out. Other cards are still in hand, and if separation cannot be obtained annexation may certainly be easily carried out.

N.S.W. MEMS.

The Earl of Belmore, our new Governor, will arrive in Sydney by the November mail steamer *via* Panama. Sir John Young returns to England by the homeward-bound November mail steamer.


The Government are making renewed and vigorous efforts for the capture of Thunderbolt, and the suppression of bushranging in the Northern districts.

Good Reading

A book of history that is certain to meet with wide appreciation is the recently published *Wangaratta Shire Centenary*, 1967, compiled by Mr. Colin Angus of El Dorado. Its comprehensiveness shows that a painstaking research was observed in the collating and sifting of a mass of material in an endeavour to present a complete and authentic record of a district with such an eventful and colourful past. There would probably not be another such area in Australia so rich and varied in history as the North-eastern district of Victoria.

In a style that is delightfully readable, Mr. Angus has turned out a book to be read and handed down, and treasured as any piece of gold that came out of El Dorado. Lustre is given to its covers and pages by many excellent illustrations, a number of which are reproductions of the writer's own paintings.

The inclusion of an index in this book adds greatly to its value as a source of ready reference—a feature so often lacking in a work of this nature.

Looking at Africa

At last month's general meeting our speaker for the occasion, committeeman Mr. J. J. Wright, was greeted by a large attendance of members from both Albury and Wodonga, as well as several visitors.

Drawing from his experiences during several months abroad, Mr. Wright described an extensive tour he had made through the states of South Africa, the whole of which he illustrated with an excellent series of moving pictures in colour.

So far as the white inhabitants of that region are concerned, he said that the way of life for them may be likened to that lived by Australians. Since the advent of self-government much progress has been brought about, with a happy co-operation amongst the different peoples. The natives are receiving education and are being encouraged to settle down to useful occupations. Many of them are now successfully working their own small farms by producing marketable goods.

One of the many places visited by Mr. Wright was the Victoria Falls, a remarkable feature of the River Zambezi. Its turbulent waters present an awesome sight and were photographed from many angles by this latter-day explorer—at times from such a nearness that he and his camera were drenched by the rising spray. The falls, which are within the territory of Rhodesia, were discovered in 1855 by David Ligingstone, to whom the Scots folk in Africa have raised a fine memorial.

Mr. Wright also ventured an inspection of Kruger Park, a huge reservation for native animals of the continent. Here he was again fortunate in securing some fine studies of lions, elephants, giraffes and others creatures in their natural surroundings. The whole area, however, was so jungle-like that many of its inhabitants were not to be seen.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

(Gleaned from issues of The Albury Banner for October, 1867)

THE FLOODS IN THE MURRAY.—Not for the last twenty years has there been such a flood in the Murray as the present one. It is scarcely, however, correct to call it a flood in the Murrayit is all over the Murray, for it is now a difficult task to say where the main stream really is, so far has the wild waste of waters extended on either side. At Albury the river is still rising. From Thursday to Friday it rose 8 in., and appears to be steadily on the rise. At the Union Bridge the gauge shows that the height is 14 ft. 5 in. above summer level. A large portion of the reserve between the town and river bank is a sheet of water flowing up to the old Hume Inn. At Roper's Point there is such an overflow that the settlers are preparing to desert their dwellings. The steamer Lady Daly, deeply laden with goods for Albury, has been unable to pass under the bridge at Wahgunyah from the extreme height of the flood. The late and present unseasonable weather has played some havoc on the telegraph line, which Mr. Walsh, our active line inspector, promptly repaired.

BELVOR* ENTERPRISE.—Communication being cut off with Victoria except by water, Messrs. Benson & Co. have, since Tuesday, built a strong punt of stringy-bark, with iron knees, for the safe conveyance of goods and passengers. The punt, *Perseverance*, will leave Belvoir for Albury at 7 and 10 a.m., and 2 p.m., and also from Albury (near the Bridge) at 8.30 a.m. and 12 noon and 4 p.m. for Belvoir, every day. As the punt will safely carry passengers at 5s. each, and at least 500 lb. of cargo, this will be a great convenience to the public. Messrs. Benson intend to build a larger punt for the service of traders.

*Belvoir was the official name of the town of Wodonga at this time.

ACCIDENTS ON THE MURRAY.—The riverboat Lady Daly left Albury for Echuca on Tuesday (22nd), and became snagged near the punt at Howlong. As she was settling down at a rapid rate, five pumps were set to work and after two hours' hard toil the vessel was repaired and made tight again. Whilst wheat was being taken on board at Howlong a portion of the river-bank gave way and carried away 30 ft. aft from the bows. The damage was smartly repaired, and the Lady Daily resumed her voyage without further mishap.

THE DENILIQUIN GALLOWS.—The gallows recently erected at Deniliquin gaol for a hanging will now not be wanted. The man Nicholls, convicted of murder at Collendina, who was reprieved a few days ago, is to be imprisoned with hard labor for life, the first three years in irons.

POLICE INSPECTION—Our indefatigable Superintendant of the Albury district police has completed his visitation of the very extensive district under his control. Mr. Singleton proceeded from Albury to Ten Mile Creek [Holbrook], Kyamba, Tarcutta, Gundagai, Jugiong, Tumut and Adelong, crossing by Tarcutta to Wagga Wagga, and from thence to Narrandera and home a circuit of upwards of 570 miles. Should Blue Cap and his bushranging gang succeed in forcing their way over the mountains, and make for Morgan's place of refuge, the Piney Range, we hope that Mr. Singleton may only get within pistol-shot of them.

MURRUMBIDGEE CRIMINALS.—The Wagga Wagga gaol is now "chock-a-block" with prisoners. His Honor the Chief Justice will give every attention to their individual cases on Monday (21st). The efforts of the "Murrumbidgee and Lachlan Horse, Cattle, and Sheep Stealing Prevention Association" has materially assisted in securing candidates for Cockatoo Island. The offer of £100 for information is wonderfully reforming habitual evil-doers.

RAILWAY SPEED ON THE MURRAY.—On Saturday afternoon the steamer *Cumberoona* left the Albury wharf at 2.20 o'clock and arrived at Howlong at 5.20 p.m., a distance of 68 miles in three hours.

APPOINTMENT.—We notice that Mr. I. A. Plummer, formerly teacher at the Thurgoona School, has been appointed assistant teacher in the William Street Public School, Sydney.

THUNDERBOLT'S ESCAPE.—On September 28 Senior Constable Shannon, stationed at Dungog, came in hot haste into Bandon Grove to secure the services of a black-tracker to enable him to follow on the track of the notorious Thunderbolt, with whom he had shortly before had an encounter. It being well know that this part of the country is Thunderbolt's home, it seems a great oversight that a party are not tracking him in this direction, as, however meritorious our constable may be, it is impossible that a couple of men (all that can be spared from other duties) can cope with a fellow who knows every inch of the country, steals the best horses at will, and is known to be the best cross-country rider in the district.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

THE DUKE OF EDINBURCH.—Upon receipt of the news by telegram of the arrival of H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh at Adelaide, the signal flag was hoisted above the time-ball at the Albury Telegraph Office. This was soon responded to by the fluttering of gay colours in the breeze and the firing of a royal salute of twenty-one guns from the battery which our gallant Police Magistrate, Capt. Brownrigg, R.N., had expressly prepared for this memorable occasion.

Another trip is as much as the steamers will be able to accomplish between Albury and Echuca this season. There is a likelihood of the *Cumberoona* being graced with the presence of H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh and suite for the purpose of taking a day's excursion on the Upper Murray.

MURRUMBIDGEE PASTORAL ASSOCIATION.—In our full report of the annual show at Wagga Wagga, readers will observe that the silver cup offered as first prize for the best thoroughbred entire was won by the Albury owner Mr. Thomas Field's threeyear-old "Castlereagh", by Snowdon out of Sultana, who also won the silver cup, the first prize for the best colonial-bred stallions.

ADELAIDE EXODUS. — The result of the Adelaide Germans forming such a strong liking for the Albury district is now extending to the English residents of South Australia. No less than nine English settlers have started already. The previous settlers from Adelaide say that there is no land in South Australia equal to what there is on the Billabong, in the Albury district.

NEW THRESHING MACHINE. — We understand that Mr. A. McEachern has purchased a first-class threshing machine made by the English firm of Clayton and Shuttleworth, and that he is prepared to thresh within the district at moderate terms.

RIVERBOAT SINKS. — The steamer Murrumbidgee has sunk in the river of the same name, five miles below Wentworth. She had on board 139 bales of Illawarra—69 of Severn brothers' and 40 of G. Fairbairn's. In turning a sharp bend on the river she canted over and rapidly filled. There was a strong current at the time. The wool was insured, but not the steamer. A heavy flood is coming down the river.



Annual Report of the Albury and District Historical Society, 1967

The past year has had its troubles for this Society; mainly the doubt about the allocation of space at the Turk's Head. I will refer to this again later.

The number of financial members for 1967 was 125, and there are 22 life members. We regret to record the deaths of valued members: Mr. Gordon Irwin, Mr. Herb Schneider and Mr. Peter Seaton.

Nine General Meetings were held with a good average attendance. Eleven Executive Meetings were held and the following is a record of attendances: Mr. C. C. Hazelwood 9, Capt. P. H. Heywood 9, Mr. A. Mitchell 3, Mr. W. W. Fielder 11, Miss L. Staton 5, Mr. O. Schilg 11, Mr. J. J. Wright 5, Mr. N. Douglas 7, Mr. A. Allan 1, Mrs. Schilg 2, Mrs. McDonald 3, Mrs. Hazelwood 9, Mr. P. Burrows was elected committeeman emeritus and attended one meeting. Mr. Wright was given leave of absence while travelling overseas; as also were Mrs. Hazelwood and myself while on a six weeks' visit to Western Australia; and the Minute Secretary, Miss Staton, whilst absent in Queensland. A special meeting of the Executive was called on June 6, at which the following were present: Messrs. Douglas, Mitchell, Burrows, Allan, Schilg, Fielder, Hazelwood, Capt. Heywood and Mrs. Hazelwood.

During the year, in company of Mr. Fielder and other members of this Society, I attended the Australia Day ceremony at Harrietville; and together with Capt. Heywood, our senior Vice-President, I had the pleasure of representing this Society at the opening of the Wagga Wagga Folk Museum. I also attended the special ceremony of unveiling a plaque in memory of a foundation member of the Corryong Historical Society, Mr. Dick McKenzie. At the request of the Rutherglen Historical Society, I was guest speaker at one of their meetings. This interchange of visits between kindred bodies is, I am sure, of benefit to all.

Interesting and informative speakers who addressed us during the year on a wide variety of subjects were: The Rev. C. S. Boyall, "Experiences as a World War II prisoner-of-war in Japanese hands"; Mr. Ray Steward, "History of Gardening" (illustrated); Mr. John Dallinger, "Round the World in 44 Days" (illustrated); Mr. C. C. Hazelwood, "Finalizing the Urangeline Station Story"; Mr. R. C. Knight, "Stories Told Me by My Parents"; Mr. Davis-Marks, "Hume Weir and Murray River"; Mr. J. J. Wright, "South African Travels" (illustrated); Mr. and Mrs. E. Monte, "A Ramble Round New Zealand" (illustrated); Mr. A. Frost, "Gold and Bees" (illustrated). During the latter half of the year we had a special showing of photos pertaining to the River Murray Paddle Boats, and river navigation generally, by

Mr. H. Godson, of Adelaide, who gave us an interesting address with colour slides to illustrate it.

We were not able this year to arrange a trip by the Society, as a body, to a place of interest, at a suitable time. We hope to do so next year, but this depends entirely, on the response of members, to enable travel arrangements to be made.

The Hovell Tree remembrance gathering was again sponsored by this Society, who were gratified by the response from the schools. Lavington Public School was this year's narrators, and the matter and manner of the two students, a boy and a girl, who were the speakers for the day was impressive. We thank the Mayor for his attendance and thought-provoking address. We also thank the Curator of the Gardens for providing the seats, speaker's stand, and for the flagpole and flag.

The Society is grateful for the many varied gifts throughout the year. Some of these you will shortly see on display, for we are, at long last, establishing a Folk Museum in the southern portion of the Turk's Head building, opening on Friday, December 15, at 2.30 p.m. This will be fully advertised and we hope for a representative gathering. We feel that there *is* a place for a Folk Museum, for to our pioneers and their way of life, we owe all we are today and, as you know, there has been a resurgence of interest in these things in our land.

Here I must pay tribute to members of the Committee and others, who have done a great amount of work at the Turk's Head. At the time of writing much work is still to be done, but I have no doubt that it will be finished. Mr. J. J. Wright has been appointed arranger of exhibits and is making a good job of the limited space available. I would like to point out that the first display is not necessarily final, as alterations will be made from time to time and exhibits changed. You will all keep in mind, won't you, that if you or your friends have anything that might be a suitable exhibit, contact Mr. Wright or officers of the Society. During the year, it was decided to ask all those who would be willing to help by acting at attendants as the Museum, to place their names on an official list displayed. This is still open and anyone who can help is asked to place their name on it at the Annual Meeting. The times of opening are still to be decided, but usually museums are open only on certain days, not the whole time.

Lastly, I want to express our very sincere thanks for the good publicity given us by *The Border Morning Mail*, radio stations 2AY and 2CO, and to television station AMV4. I conclude with my sincere personal thanks to all who have helped me as President of the Albury and District Historical Society, whether members or otherwise, and we look forward hopefully to another vear of interest and fellowship.

That honey pleasingly blends with Australian history was proved by Albury bee-farmer Mr. Alan Frost, who was guest speaker at our November meeting. Mr. Frost explained that, by a strange rule of nature, white-box trees (so favoured by the busy bees) grow and blossom most prolifically on the areas of rich goldfields. To-day on most of the old diggings throughout Victoria are to be found many prosperous bee-farmers. In his talk on the golden liquid, the speaker took his audience to many parts of the world, and by his descriptive commentary coupled with the showing of a grand collection of colour slides, he illustrated the differing methods of honey production as followed in various countries.

Arrangements by the A.H.S. to celebrate the anniversary of the coming of Hume and Hovell to the site of Albury were successful in every way, and drew a large attendance of schoolchildren, townspeople and tourists. In his address to the gathering the Mayor, Ald. Bunton, O.B.E., delivered an inspiring message to pupils of the several schools represented.

The capable manner in which the Lavington Public School carried out its part of the programme added much interest to the proceedings. In the shade of the revered old gum-tree marked by Captain Hovell, two of the school's pupils—Peter White and Nola Romero—shared in the reading of a narrative specially prepared by them for the occasion and detailing events of the remarkable expedition.
